

IDENTITY OF MAN THOT TO BE HYDE YET UNCERTAIN

The belief that the body of the man found dead in the Callville Wash yesterday was that of Glenn Hyde, lost Colorado River explorer was blasted today when the description of the dead man did not tally in any instance with that of Hyde.

Sheriff Sam Gay has ex. hausted every effort to identify the body up to a late hour this afternoon but declared that identification would be made by him before night.

Meager Clues

Grocery charge slips, found on the dead man's person may prove to be the only clue the sheriff's office may have to clinch identification. These slips indicate that purchases of food supplies were made by a man giving the name of Henry Esplin at Orderville, Utah. Whether or not the name on the charge slips is the name of the dead man is in doubt. The sheriff's office is inclined to believe that the deceased was employed as a sheep herder and was looking for a suitable grazing field when he became lost and died from starvation and exposure.

The body was found by M. J. Barone, an Italian naturalist and geologist, who is traveling with a burro on his way to St. George, Utah via the Coloraod River, St. Thomas and the Virgin River, in the Callville Wash. As he trudged along he came upon a small monument in the center of the road.

Find Note

Under a rock on the monument was a note. He picked up the note which read: "Slim, I am taking this road, it looks good to me. Young." At the side of the monument a trail led off up a canyon. Barone, wishing to get across the hills and still keep as close as possible to the river, replaced the note and took up the trail.

After folowing the obscure trail for a distance he saw that the canyon was blind and that there was no apparent outlet. He saill followed the trail and soon came upon the body.

Barone at once started back up Callville Wash in an effort to get to the plant of the West End Chemical Co. where he thought he could get into communication with Las Vegas. Night overtook him and he was forced to camp, going on to the West End camp Thursday morning. There he met Charlie etaker and told his story.

JOHN MILLS CLOSES LARGE SUBDIVISION

DEAL

Las Vegas real estate continued to be the center of sensational trading activity during the past week. Deals aggregating thousands of dollars have been closed and building plans were in the immediate offing.

John P. Mills, San Diego capitalist, heads the week's buyers with the purchase of the P. J. Sullivan property on the corner of Third and Fremont street for a price reported to have been in excess of \$30,000. The transaction was for cash and the deal closed after Mr. Mills had been in Las Vegas for but a few hours.

Buys 130 Acres

Mills added to his city holding by the purchase of 130 acres of raw land adjoining the Fairview Addition. This purchase was made from the Southern Nevada Townsite Company. More than \$500 per acre was paid for this property, setting a precedent in the value placed on unimproved land for subdivisions.

WILL BE BUILT

A \$200,000 non-metallic reinery built by a \$1,000,600 corporation will be erected, here, according to a statement made to The Age today hy Dr. Theodore Rodman, president of the Nevada Non-Metallics Company who has just finished the selection of a site for the proposed project.

Dr. Rodman stated that Las Vegas will be the third largest aluminum manufacturing center in the world as a result of the cheap power afforded by the Boulder Dam. He compared the industrial possibilities of Las Vegas with Niagar Falls and St. Louis.

Lauds Las Vegas

"In arriving at a decision as to the location of our plant we chose Las Vegas because of the ideal working conditions and the almost complete absence of atmospheric meisture so dangerous to our products," said Dr. Rodman.
