The Month In The Skies January Winter Stars

URBANA, Ill., Jan. 15, (AP)—The brightest constellations in the whole sky are displayed above the eastern horizon in the early evening in January. They are the winter constellations, so-called because they are visible throughout the winter nights, rising in the east in the early evening, southing at midnight and sinking in the west at dawn.

Orion is most brilliant of all the constellations and, next to the Big Dipper, the best known. It has the form of a rectangle with three stars in line in the middle, the Belt of Orion which points downward to Sirius and upward to the V-shaped head of Taurus. The great red star in the corner of the rectangle farthest to the left is Betelgeuse. It is a giant star, having a diameter of 250,000,000 miles. Yet the most powerful telescope shows it only as a point of light, so great is its distance from us.

Sirius, the Dog Star, came into view at 7 o'clock in the evening on the first of the month. It is a white star and the brightest of the stars. But when it is not far above the horizon on a clear, frosty night it flashes rapidly all the colors of the rainbow in succession. The Little Dog Star, Procyon, is to the left of Sirius and slightly higher. Once cannot fail to find

this bright star, for it forms an equilateral triangle with Betelgeuse and Sirius. Above Procyon is the rectangle of Gemma, the Heavenly Twins, which contains the twin stars, Castor and Pollux.

Still higher is the five-sided figure of Auriga, with the great yellow star Capella in its upper left corner. Capella has the same color as our sun, but it is a larger body than the sun and would appear fifty times brighter if they were both at the same distance.

The star in the lower right corner of Auriga really belongs to Taurus; it is the tip of his upper horn. The head of the Bull is marked by an conspicuous V of stars, with the red Aldebaran as his fiery eye. Above in his shoulder are the familiar Pleiades, or Seven Sisters.

Of the fifteen brightest stars in the heavens one-half are in this small area of the sky. It is as though nature had tried to make amends for the feeble winter sun by decorating the nights skies more attractively than to any other season.

As an added attraction the planet Mars now appears near the tips of the horns of Taurus. It is distinguished from the stars by its more vivid red color and its steady light. Mars is now receding from the earth and becoming fainter, but during January it will still remain one of the brightest objects in this part of the sky.
