

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22, - On Tenth street of the national capital, just a few blocks off Pennsylvania avenue, is to be found one

Captain Oldroyd started his work

When a boy of nineteen, he operated a news stand in the back of his father's store in Mt. Vernon, Ohio. One day there came to him in his package of papers a Wigwam edition of "The Life, Speeches and Public Services of Abraham SHOWS ITS POWER Lincoln." He took it home with him. After reading it he determined then and there to save every-

his way. The task has not been an easy one. Money was scarce and he was forced to resort to every possible means to keep his collection growing. The story of how he acquired the old Lincoln family Bible is typical of his hardships.

Began At Chicago Fair

In 1893 he attended the world's fair at Chicago. Here he saw the old family Bible. It was taken to the exposition by a Kentuckian, and was exhibited in a tent outside the grounds. He approached the owner and was told it would take \$150 to buy it. That was a great deal more money than he www. had. Still determined, he sped to a telegraph office and wired a friend for a loan. The money came and he proudly bore his prize

Fortune rewarded the captain in later years. His collection now is the property of the United States He was paid \$50,000 for it. Previously he had rejected larger sums
