Ely Prosperous

"The Ely district is more prosperous than it has ever been before," said Mr. Pittman. "This is due to the fact that the production of copper is greater than it has ever been before. And the cost of production is less than it has ever been since the consolidated plant was built in 1908.

"The increased demand of copper during the past months due to the increased production of radios, telephones, airplanes and electrical equipment has brought about a steady climb in both mining activities and production," Mr. Pittman said.

Earning \$5 a Share

Mr. Pittman said that the Nevada Consolidated earnings for 1929 were estimated at \$20,000,000. He said that the McGill plant was treating more than 15,000 tons of ore per day.

The new 100-room hotel in Ely is near completion and this is adding impetus to property values in the mining city.
