LONDON, Jan. 22, (AP)—It is officially stated that King George will go to Bognor, popular bathing resort in Sussex on the South coast of England, for convalescence. The date of his departure is not definitely fixed.

Physicians issued a bulletin saying his temperature was normal and his appetite returning, solid food being eaten. Although his general condition is showing steady improvement, doctors said there is as yet no increase in weight.

COURT APPEAL BY RECALLERS

Writ of Mandamus Served on City Clerk and Commissioners To Require Showing.

As an aftermath of the recall petitions five of the petitioners filed a mandamus proceeding yesterday evening in the District Court demanding that William L. Scott, as city clerk, hold a special election for the purpose of determining whether the people shall recall Mayor J. F. Hesse, and that Mayor J. F. Hesse, and City Commissioners W. B. Mundy, O. J. Smith, W. C. German and Roy Neagle provide for such an election.

The recallers are F. E. Matzdorf, W. H. Elwell, C. A. Bryant, J. J. Curtis, and Joe Laravey, and A. A. Hinman appears as their attorney. Judge Wm. E. Orr signed an alternative writ of mandamus which gives the respondents the choice of holding the election which is demanded, or else showing cause for such default February 4th, at 10 o'clock a.m.

The complaint sets forth the statements that the recall petition containing the names of 425 qualified electors was duly filed, and that since its filing the city clerk has neglected, failed and refused to call the election demanded.

Mayor Hesse, when interviewed by the Age this morning, said: "City Clerk Scott, I am informed and believe, made an absolutely accurate and impartial check of the names on the recall petitions and found the number not sufficient to meet the requirements of the law for a recall election. If his check is correct it appears to me that there is no valid ground for this proceeding."

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 22, (AP)—The state rested its case in the bribery trial of Asa Keyes and five co-defendants at eleven five today, after having presented its final two witnesses.

PITTMAN TELLS ELY'S PROGRESS IN INDUSTRY

That the State of Nevada will be second in copper production in the world and that Nevada will be the pivot of all copper production, was the gist of an interview given the Age last night by Vall Pittman, publisher of the Ely Times and brother of U. S. Senator Key Pittman.

Ely Prosperous
"The Ely district is more prosperous than it has ever been before," said Mr. Pittman. "This is due to the fact that the production of copper is greater than it has ever been before. And the cost of production is less than it has ever been since the consolidated plant was built in 1908."

"The increased demand of copper during the past months due to the increased production of radios, telephones, airplanes and electrical equipment has brought about a steady climb in both mining activities and production," Mr. Pittman said.

Earning \$5 a Share
Mr. Pittman said that the Nevada Consolidated earnings for 1929 were estimated at \$20,000,000. He said that the McGill plant was treating more than 15,000 tons of ore per day.

The new 100-room hotel in Ely is near completion and this is adding impetus to property values in the mining city.

The appointment was made by Judge Frank H. Norcross of the U. S. District Court.

Commissioner Hooper will attend to the business of Uncle Sam at his office in the Park building.

How Schools May Serve Democracy Is Meeting Topic

CLEVELAND, Jan. 22, (AP)—How the public schools may serve democracy better will underlie all discussions and addresses at the fifty-ninth annual convention of the department of superintendence of the National Education Association here February 24-29. Dr. Frank D. Boynton, superintendent of schools of Ithaca, N. Y., and president of the department, has arranged the gathering and will preside.

In the same week, there will be conferences of approximately 30 other educational groups—departments of the National Education Association or separate organizations.

Nearly 4,000 school administrators are expected at the department of superintendence meeting. Meetings of allied groups will put the total attendance beyond the 10,000 mark. Principal sessions will be held in the public auditorium.

The main theme of the convention will be discussed, on successive days after the opening, under four sub-topics—financing public education, the articulation of the units of American education, the

teaching staff, and character education.

Among the outstanding educational leaders who have been invited to speak are John Dewey, professor of philosophy, Columbia university; William J. Boggs, superintendent of schools, Chicago; Joseph M. Gwinn, superintendent of schools, San Francisco; George D. Strayer, professor of school administration, Columbia university; Edward C. Elliott, president of Purdue university; Herbert S. West, superintendent of schools, Rochester, N. Y.; Paul V. McNutt, death of the law school, Indiana university, and national commander of the American Legion; Frank P. Graves, state commissioner of education for New York; William C. Bagley, professor of education, Columbia university, and John T. Tigert, president of the University of Florida.

R. G. Jones, superintendent of the Cleveland schools, will be official host. Sherwood D. Shankland, executive secretary of the department of superintendence, with offices in Washington, is arranging clerical details.

TOLEDO STREET CAR HITS BUS IN STORM, KILLING SEVENTEEN

TOLEDO, Ohio, Jan. 22, (AP)—At least seventeen, probably more, persons were killed, and a number of others injured, when the west-bound Lakeshore Interurban struck a bus of the Greyhound line in a blinding snowstorm today. Four of the dead were women.

No one in the electric interurban was reported injured.

CRUDE OIL OUTPUT RECORD IS SMASHED

TULSA, Jan. 22, (AP)—The daily average light and heavy crude oil production of the United States reached a new peak total, during the week ending January 19, of 2,649,530 barrels.

As in previous weeks the high mark was due to deep test production in the Santa Fe Springs field in California.

BIG FIRE IN GREECE KILLS AND DESTROYS

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 22, (AP)—Several persons were burned to death and one killed, and a thousand buildings were destroyed in the populous Greek district of Tavala in Constantinople by a terrific fire fanned by a high wind today.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22, (AP)—President-elect Herbert Hoover left today for Florida where he will be the guest of J. C. Penney until the inauguration March 4.

Hoover will go directly to the Penney estate on Belle Isle after leaving the special train which will take him and his party to Miami. He will arrive at Miami tomorrow afternoon.
