Mr. Sartain, superince adent of the work planned on the Wall Street property, has unwatered the shaft, upon which he has installed a mining plant, and has commenced sinking.

e Duncan has for some years been gathering mining properties near his original purchase and his cyenide mill, and steted this morning that he has acquired such con-trol of this consolidation that he is now in his efforts to get help for development, able to most the demands of mining investors.

The possibilities of the properties are shown by ore specimens accaying over a dollar a pound, which are no exhibit in the office window. In the window also are samples of his Cripple Creek Telluride ore, mined over twenty-five years ago, whih was never gener-ally distributed, and which is no longer mined in quantities.
