1 tablespoon finely chopped onion.
1/4 cup chopped sweet pickles.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/4 teaspoon paprika.
1-3 cup salad dressing.
Mix and chill the ingredients and serve in a bowl lined with lettuce leaves.

2 cups Graham flour.
1 cup flour.
1/2 cup sugar.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1 egg.
1/4 cup molasses.
1/2 teaspoon soda.
1 teaspoon baking powder.

1 tablespoon fat, melted.
Mix the ingredients and pour into a well greased mold. Cover tightly and steam for 1 1/2 hours. Unmold and dry in a moderate oven for 20 minutes.

SUGAR MIXTURE

1/2 cup sugar.
1 teaspoon cinnamon.
1/4 teaspoon cloves.
1 tablespoon flour.
Mix the ingredients and sprinkle over the top of the rolled out dough. Press it into the dough so it will not fall off during the baking.
