HOLLYWOOD, Feb. 14. — Since dialogue pictures became the rage around Hollywood, it may not be long before a movie player's importance can be measured by the slimmest or bulk of the typed manuscript carried under the arm on entering the studio of a morning. The larger the script, the more "meaty" the part. The necessity for knowing lines before facing the microphone has caused much "homework" to be done, just as in school days. But players who lament their difficulty in memorizing should take comfort on viewing the task which Lois Wilson and Edward Everett Horton have assigned themselves. Both are combining legitimate stage engagements with talking picture work, appearing nightly in leading parts in a Los Angeles theater and working daily in different pictures at the studio.

Talkie Comeback
Lois Wilson is an outstanding example of a silent screen player for whom the talkies proved professional salvation. Hers was a rather hectic career in voiceless movies, begun when she won a beauty contest in Alabama and as a result was given a part in a Universal picture. But she was released immediately afterward and was on the way home when Lois Weber, who was making a picture in Chicago, asked her to take a small part. She stayed in movies, but secured only bits and extra work until J. Warren Kerrigan, then a leading idol, selected her for his leading lady. In 1918 she was signed by Famous Players, remaining there until 1926. Sometimes she seemed to progress, then to slip backward.

Her Day Arrived
Then, always having had an exceptionally good speaking voice, she went on the stage here, making her debut with Horton. When the talkies came along, she was ready to step in, and she did—to a right merry tune.

appeal is transmitted to the General Land Office for action.

If the applicant feels that it is useless to appeal, he may withdraw his application by filing what is known as the "Relinquishment Blank," and have his money refunded immediately, or let it go by default. In the latter case after the 30 days have transpired, the application is cancelled on the records of this office and the money refunded. Pittman applications vary again in this respect. Fees for application under the Pittman Act are immediately transferred to the Treasurer of the United States. If a refund is due under this act, it is necessary to file an application for repayment—there is a form for this purpose—and this application is transmitted to the General Land Office for action. Naturally the applicant must wait longer for his money.

Filing an application on withdrawn land will give you no preferential right to that land when it is restored to entry.

Every restoration or withdrawn land that has reached this office since the World War has given all soldiers of that war a preference right of 91 days for filing on said restored land.

I again wish to emphasize the fact that any one doing any work of any kind, or any improvement on a homestead or desert application before the same has been allowed is taking a risk, and may lose all they have expended. The same is true of a Pittman application, make no improvements or surveys until your permit has been issued. Respectfully, (Signed) CLARA M. CRISLER, Register. ROTARY CELEBRATES 24TH ANNIVERSARY

CHICAGO, Feb. 14. (Special)—The spirit of friendship and service, seeking expression in the minds of four friends gathered in Chicago on February 23, 1905, has spread to all corners of the world where more than 140,000 Rotarians in over three thousand Rotary clubs are celebrating this week the 24th anniversary of the founding of Rotary.

The first club was formed in Chicago by Paul Harris and three friends with fellowship, cooperation high business principles and service to others as the foundation. Two of the original four, Paul Harris and Sylvester Schiele, are still active Rotarians.

Today 140,000 Rotarians bring the spirit of fellowship to the common table each week in the cities and towns of 44 nations. The Rotary club has given to the business or professional man of any city in the world a place where he can meet other men on the basis of friendship, high ethical principles, and international goodwill. The idea of the service club today is universal.

This simplicity and frankness are gradually disarming the critics of the service club. Definite programs for the social betterment of their communities throughout the world have answered for Rotary the criticism that its objects are but platitudes, itself only a luncheon club. Wherever a Rotary club has been established, it has added something vital to the community, not to duplicate but to assist in the work of existing community organizations, or to supply a need where no such leadership exists.

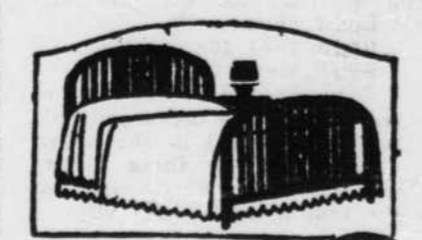
