NEW YORK, Mar. 2—It might be called an Avenue of Nations, so many different ones are represented by its people. Or the east side's Broadway. But its name is Second avenue.

Below Fourteenth street, Second avenue is the ghetto's white way, something to stir jaded interest. And New Yorkers, ever looking for and imagination, are discovering this rhapsody of Rumanian restaurants and Jewish theaters.

Molly Joon, the darling of the neighborhood, is the chief attraction. Molly, the "it" girl of the east side, was born there, and lives near the theater where she plays in "Hello, Moly," billed as a Yiddish operetta.

But other Jewish musical comedies also seem to attract uptowners. "A Galician Wedding," enticed 170,000 persons to its first hundred performances, despite competition from two other theaters, at one of which something with the title "A Litvisher Yankee" has been running for quite a while.

At the foot of Second avenue is another popular institution, the National Winter Garden, where one is invited to "take a private car to the heights of pleasure." The car is an elevator to the roof, where burlesque may be seen and heard in traditional form, even to the comic's inflated bladder.

**Triple Surprise**  
Theater parties are so commonplace that actors seldom are aware of them, but Violet Gale, ingenue of Christopher Morley's "After Dark" company in Hoboken, reports one that almost stopped the show.

One night recently the cast was startled to see, tramping into the balcony, a dozen couples attired in costumes of the '90's, some almost duplicates of those worn by the players.

It developed afterward that a society matron had invited a score of friends to an 1890 costume party. As a surprise the guests were taken in a chartered bus to see the old melodrama. It was hard to say who were the most surprised, the guests, the actors, or the audience of New York whoopee-makers.

**Relic**  
The gold pen with which Abraham Lincoln signed the proclamation freeing the slaves has become a legacy which will be turned into cash February 27.

The pen is on exhibition here preliminary to its sale at auction on that date. The owner is W. B. Tucker of Lansing, Mich., grandson of Louis Burgdorf, White House messenger who held the proclamation while Lincoln was signing it. President Lincoln himself gave the pen to his messenger who was one of the few witnesses of that historic event of January 1, 1863. An ordinary gold pen, in a wooden holder, it now is valued at more than a thousand dollars.

HOLLYWOOD, Mar. 2—Hollywood's greatest show is free with standing room only and not much of that. It has been called the film colony's "pet whoopee," the Hollywood premiere, and it is. By the time the stars and other celebrities' swank limousines begin to arrive, the vicinity of the theater is packed. As the renowned ones step forth, their names are put "on the air" and transmitted by loud-speaker to the mob by the radio announcer, and the crowd cranes its collective neck a bit further, to the accompaniment of Ohs, Ahs, and Gees.

DYING INDIAN TRIBE IGNORANT OF ORIGIN BLACKWELL, Okla., Mar. 2—Linguists have set out to record the language of that unusual tribe of American Indians, the Tonkawas. This unit among the 2,000 tribes and 54 linguistic stocks found west of the Mississippi for years has baffled students of Indian lore. Now, with only 42 survivors in the Tonkawa clan, the American Association for the Advancement of Science is trying to trace the tribe's history. Never were the Tonkawas related in language or customs, so far as is known, to neighboring Indians whom the white man found when he came into Texas. They were known as a more primitive people. The Spaniards called them cannibals. The remaining Tonkawas, now living on a reservation near here know little of their forefathers. Most of the tribes were killed when their Indian enemies banded together and slew nearly 600 in a raid during the civil war. Students of other tribes have been puzzled by peculiarities in the Tonkawas' tongue not found in any other Indian language. Their aloofness from other tribes prevented any spread of the Tonkawa speech, which is now being studied.
