

GREETINGS OF HOOVER READ AT SANTA FE

P. Squires, Publisher of the Age and Nevada Commissioner, Conveys Message to Meeting During Inauguration.

SANTA FE, Mar. 5. (Special)—At the very moment Herbert Hoover was being inaugurated President of the United States Monday, Charles P. Squires, publisher of the Las Vegas Age and commissioner from Nevada was reading a letter of greeting from Hoover to the Colorado River commissioners in the very room in which Hoover met in 1922 with the commissioners who wrote the Boulder Dam compact.

"Six years and four months ago," said Squires, "in this room sat Herbert Hoover as chairman of the Colorado River conference. Some of us were present at the conferences in which the Santa Fe compact was written. All of you are aware of the help and sympathy Mr. Hoover gave this movement."

"It is fitting that at this time, possibly the very moment when Herbert Hoover is taking the oath of office as President of the United States, I should convey to you his greetings. I have a letter from him in which he requested that I extend to you his greetings. I know that with this courtesy go his best wishes for the success of this conference, which may bring about the consummation of the great work in which he has had so large a part."

AT TROY LAUNDRY

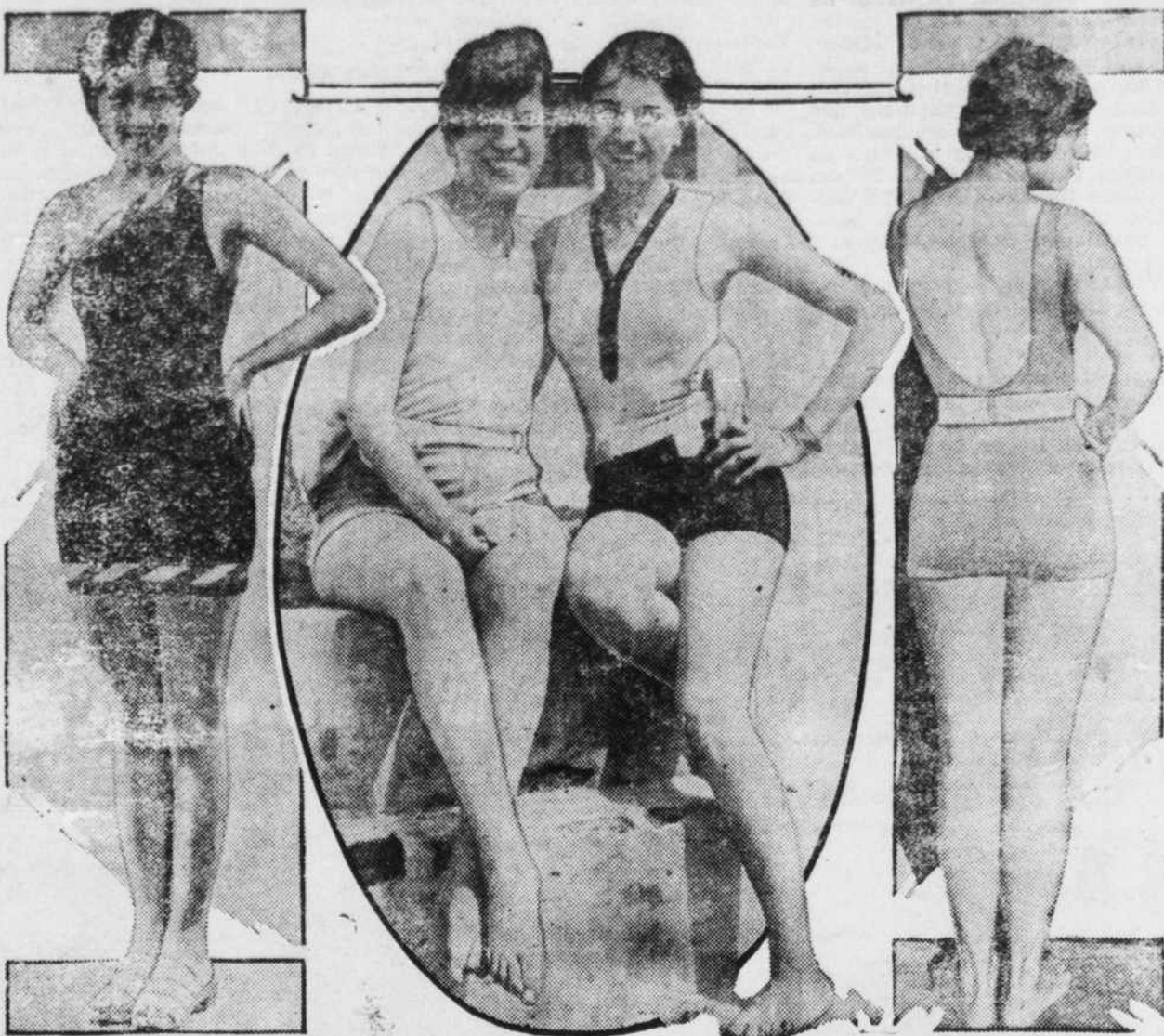
A new dry tumbler, patented less than a year ago, which dries clothes in fifteen minutes, was installed this week at the Troy Laundry.

Study of Body Sugars Mas Lead To New Ways of Disease Control

WASHINGTON, Mar. 7. (AP)—Scientific investigation of scores of kinds of sugar, which may lead in future years to new methods of treating diseases, is under way here in the hygienic laboratory of the Public Health service.

This undertaking has aroused the interest of scientists throughout the world, and has drawn Dr. Eugen Pascu, adjunct professor of chemistry in the Royal Hungarian university at Budapest, to Washington to participate in it.

He was given a fellowship last summer by the international education board and is utilizing it to work in association with Dr. Claude S. Hudson, head of the chemical

division of the laboratory, who was recently awarded the Willard Gibbs medal of the American Chemical society for his accomplishments in the study of sugars.

"We are concerned now simply with increasing our knowledge," the scientists explained. "Later on—we cannot even hope it will be within our lifetime—probably this knowledge will lead to new ways of treating nutritional diseases. It may also assist other scientists to isolate unidentified germs, such as the one which causes influenza."

Their hopes are based on the fact that in virtually every disease there is some disturbance of the

action in the body of the sugars which supply energy and perform other functions. They are concerned with studying the molecular structure of these sugars and the arrangement of the atoms in the molecules.

More than 50 sugars are now known to science. Some are distinctly bitter to taste. Some are known thoroughly, while of others there is scant information. Each is essential in the lives of some animals or plants.

The relation of the various sugars to the well being of the human body will be more completely understood, the scientists point out, when the knowledge of the sugars is increased. By applying this knowledge of the sugars to study of diseases which are caused by nutritional disturbances, it may be possible to find new cures, they suggest.

MEXICAN MASSES ABSORB CULTURE UNDER NEW PLAN

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 7. (AP)—President Portes Gil's campaign for cultural enlightenment of the masses is entering into a phase of intense activity. His announcement a few weeks ago that he intended to educate the people to a higher moral and intellectual level was followed by rapid and methodical development of a working program and today sports, high grade theatricals and good literature are being placed within the reach of everyone.

Establishment of recreation grounds and athletic fields in the crowded slums of Mexico City is going ahead steadily and publication of the "mural newspaper," a huge poster carrying pictures and articles of educational value, already has been started. The first edition has just come off the press and will be distributed throughout the country.

A new feature in the cultural advancement scheme has been made known. Theatrical presentations, written and acted by Mexicans and portraying the humor and tragedy of Mexican life, are to be sponsored by the government and put within reach of the poorer classes by means of low admission prices and use of transportable theaters which will be moved from one section of the city to another. These mobile theaters, called "carpas," are no novelty, for they have been a common sight in the capital for years, although until now the class of entertainment afforded in them has been of an inferior grade. The "carpa" resembles an American mobile election booth.

A "popular theater" section is to be created in the government of the federal district, which takes in Mexico City and the surrounding towns, and the literary genius of the country will be invited periodically to offer play manuscripts on a competitive basis.
