

Portuguese Airwoman Is Without An Airplane



Maria de Lourdes Braga Teixeira, Portugal's only woman flier, learned aviation in army planes which she may no longer fly alone. Her countrymen are seeking to procure an airplane in which she may attempt the Atlantic crossing.

LISEBON, Mar. 9. (AP)—Maria de Lourdes Braga Teixeira, Portugal's only air-woman is like a bird with clipped wings. "I want to fly, but I have no plane," she told The Associated Press correspondent who talked with her at her father's office. "Sitting at home with my pilot's diploma on my lap will get me nowhere." Some day Maria de Lourdes wants to own a big hydroplane and fly it across the Atlantic to America, but at present she would be satisfied with a baby plane. Portugal's airwoman is in an un-

usual predicament. Although a licensed pilot she cannot fly alone, and that is her great ambition. Portuguese regulations will not permit a civilian to fly alone in military planes, and as these were the planes in which Maria de Lourdes received her training, she must have someone with her even if she takes full control of the machine. To assist the Portuguese girl in realizing her ambitions, the newly organized Portuguese Women's Association has inaugurated a fund for the purchase of a plane for her.

International Women's Society Plans June Meeting in Geneva

GENEVA, Mar. 9. (AP)—World feminists have received an urgent invitation to attend an international gathering to be held in Berlin in June. The occasion will be the observance of the 25th anniversary of the international alliance for the suffrage and civic and political action of women. It was at Berlin that the organization was started under the name it carried until the congress of Paris, namely, "International Alliance for Women's Suffrage." It had then only a handful of adhering societies; now it is a vast federation with affiliated associations in 42 countries. In inviting all friends of the cause to assemble at Berlin on June 17, the executive committee has issued a proclamation which

declares that the league of nations still has as one of its big tasks the suppression of the white slave traffic. Enumerating causes for joy, the committee points out that there is now not one continent where women do not vote, that women are now admitted to all the professions and that the principle of equality of wages for equality of work and production is advancing slowly, but surely. The manifesto continues: "Our chief object now is to instruct women of all countries in their duties as citizens, whether or not they have the right to vote. Women should learn that they can give to the state and to society a contribution which men cannot furnish in the same form."

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STATE GAS TAX MUST ALL GO FOR U. S. ROADS

Nevada Legislature Should Pass Enactment Giving All Instead of Half of Proceeds, Says State Highway Engineer.

The Nevada legislature now in session must amend the present state highway law by placing the entire proceeds of the gasoline tax in the state highway fund so that adequate funds—directly under the legal control of the state highway department—may be available to meet the states' share of the cost of constructing, reconstructing and maintaining federal aid highways within the state, says S. C. Durkee, state highway engineer.

Under the existing highway law 50 per cent of the gasoline tax reverts to the counties and is placed in the county-state highway fund. This fund is in turn used by the state highway department to care for the state's share of the cost of construction and reconstruction of federal aid highways within the counties, as the state taxes from an source apportioned to the state highway fund are just sufficient to care for the maintenance of state highways.

The legal advisers of the department of agriculture have informed me that the county state highway fund in the Nevada highway laws does not conform with the provisions of the federal aid highway act, as passed by Congress, as these funds are not under the direct control of the state highway department.

Since the present state highway fund of Nevada is not sufficient in amount, it will therefore be necessary for the present session of the Nevada legislature to provide sufficient state highway funds for the construction, reconstruction and maintenance of Federal aid highways in order that the state may continue after July 1, 1929, to take advantage of the federal aid funds allotted to the state of Nevada.

RODEO PERFORMERS TO USE BUICK CARS

Through the courtesy of Mr. James Cashman, local Buick distributor, the performers at the rodeo to be held here April 6 and 7, will use a new Buick in the bulldogging event.

Rodeo people prefer a Buick for its sturdiness and adaptability in this event and its high speed in second gear, says Chub Morgan. Cowboys say the Buick automobile comes the nearest to handling with the ease of a well trained cow horse.

A Buick is placed in second gear and kept there as there is no time for shifting gears. The car must be able to stop, turn with the steer, and leap ahead on a second's notice until at the right moment the cowboy leaps onto the steer's horns.

THREE STUDENTS ENJOY COLLEGE ON \$30 MONTH

PULLMAN, Wash., Mar. 9. (AP)—You can be collegiate and get an education on \$10 a month and still not miss a thing—if you know how. Three students of Washington State College do just that. Carl Ellingsen, varsity three-sport athlete; Ralph Carlton, frosh basketball star, and Kenneth Kadow are the three musketeers who bag a cheap education together.

They get free room, light and heat for caring for a furnace. Food and incidentals total \$30. Carlton and Ellingsen earn \$20 by working in the college gymnasium, while Kadow's job as stage electrician in the school auditorium nets the other third of the expenses.

The Swanton, Vt., airport, located seven miles from the Canadian border, is being advanced as a possible airport of entry by its sponsoring officials. It is claimed that much air traffic between eastern Canada and New England cities would pass in the immediate vicinity of Swanton.

The Ogden, Utah, airport is now complete and available to air traffic. Three runways have been provided, the shortest of which is 3,400 feet. Another runway is to be constructed in the spring so that landings and takeoffs may be made in any one of eight directions. Lighting equipment is scheduled for early installation. Ogden is a mail stop on the Salt Lake City-Great Falls air mail route.

Newport News, Va., is working on preliminary plans for a suitable airport. The chamber of commerce, sponsor of the program, has enlisted the aid of influential citizens in furthering the campaign to put Newport News on the air map. The federal government sent a representative to inspect several sites under consideration and his recommendations soon will be made to officials of the city.
