CARBIDE WILL BE MADE AT VEGAS-BALLIET

Important Industrial Manufacture Destined for Southern Nevada with Power Development, Says Balliet.

THIS CITY AND REAL ESTATE COME IN FOR SHARE OF COMMENT IN ARTICLE BY MAGNER WHITE OF SAN DIEGO IN CURRENT ISSUE OF MAGAZINE RELEASED HERE TODAY; MINING POSSIBILITIES STRESSED BY AUTHOR.

"The Boom at Boulder" is described in an illustrated article by Magner White, San Diego journalist, in the March 23 issue of the Saturday Evening Post.

"The Boulder dam project will rank second, as a government project, only to the Panama Canal," says Magner. "Now add these facts and translate them into terms of individual hopes and ambitions. The project is in the West—the romantic, mystic, luring—colorful, adventurous West. The health-giving, climatically superb West. This fact alone will draw the attention of enough adventure seekers to populate a small city."

"Adventure, excitement, wealth, vastness—a financial and geographical vastness so vast that the law of probabilities has lots of room to operate in; anything might happen to an individual with the slightest modicum of luck. 'Go West, Young Man!' The last big frontier job in America! 'Whoopee! and ki-yi!'"

The real estate situation in this city comes in for a great deal of comment in White's article. "All Las Vegas rises early in these times," he says. "Then minutes may mean as many thousands of dollars, more or less, in a real estate deal. "There is a feeling that Las Vegas boom, though hectic in spots, is to some extent justified. On account of its nearness to Black Canyon dam site, it will undoubtedly be the first city to feel the direct effects from the added population and attendant commercial demands when construction is under way."

COMMISSION BILLS PASSED IN LEGISLATURE

Nevada Governor to Appoint National Advisory Representative; Commission Cut to Three.

Provisions for the appointment of Nevada's member of the advisory commission to act with the secretary of the interior as provided for in the Boulder Canyon Project Act passed by Congress, and for the changing of the Colorado River Development commission of Nevada from six to three members, are contained in two bills passed this week by the Nevada State Legislature.

The advisory commission appointment bill was introduced by Senator Henderson. The advisory board provided for in the federal enactment is to consist of members chosen by the ratifying states. The person appointed to represent Nevada will be appointed for a period of four years, and will receive \$1000 a year and expenses, these moneys to come from the funds of the Nevada commission.

The bill setting forth the amendment to the act creating the Colorado river development commission of Nevada provides that after expiration of the present appointive members' terms the commission shall consist of the governor and two other members to be appointed by him. There is no stipulation as to who other members must be. These members are to be appointed within 30 days of the passage of the act and they are to hold office for two years or until their successors are appointed and qualified.

FLOWERS JOINS BOULDER DAM TOWNSITE FIRM

Chamber of Commerce Assistant Secretary to Enter Realty Business When He Relinquishes Post to Hill.

W. J. Flowers, assistant secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, will be sales manager for the Boulder Dam Townsite Company, of which C. D. Baker is head, and will take charge of the realty sales, listing, insurance and bond business of the firm, upon relinquishing his Chamber of Commerce duties to William M. Hill, new secretary of the Chamber, on April 1.

Flowers will continue to work as manager of the Vegas Credit Bureau, he stated this morning.

William M. Hill, an active of St. Louis, Missouri, came to Las Vegas from Long Beach, California, where from July 1, 1928 to January 31, 1929 he was Assistant and Service Officer for the Long Beach post of the American Legion.

He was a sergeant-major in the 294th Aero-squadron during the war, stationed at Mather Field, Sacramento, California.

S. R. Whitehead, county recorder and auditor, who was elected first vice president of the Chamber February 22, is retiring secretary. Whitehead has long been one of the stalwarts of the Chamber," said Flowers today. "He has given unstintingly of his time and the policies he advocated have been largely the policies of the Chamber."

In connection with his work with the Vegas Credit Bureau, Mr. Flowers outlined the purposes of the bureau as not only protection of the business man by making credit safe for him, but also making credit available to those entitled to credit, by transferring past credit status from other communities here.
