Designers Await Spring Approval of Styles

(Associated Press Staff Writer) NEW YORK, Mar. 30. (AP)—This is fashion time for America and for the luxurious salons of the curriers in uptown New York to the bargain basements of the department stores farther downtown, there rises the hum of human activity impelled by the seasonal urge for new wardrobes.

For these thousands of women, whether they choose a large bid- get of gowns, coats and hats from the creations of fashionable Fifth avenue establishments or spread a slim allowance over a few simple selections at the more commonplace stores, it is only the beginning of another style season. To that army of men and women engaged in the highly technical business of filling the style needs of the nation, however, it is an important climax in an endless chain of designing, scouting, creating, manufacturing and, most important, selling.

Art for art's saks has no place in this business of style. The totals on the sales sheets at the end of a season tell the story of success or failure. Unlike the couturiers of Paris, who know the answer to their question almost immediately after the commercial buyers' showing, America's system involves a long and anxious wait until the wearer-buyers have made their decisions and the much-sought volume has been attained.

When madame chooses a creation displayed to her either draped about a lively mannequin or on a lifeless, headless plaster mold, she casts her vote in the really important election of what is and what is not the season's mode. Demand makes the style.

Trained stiffs maintained by the couturiers, stores and manufacturers are charged with the financially-vital problem of deciding not only the trends of fashion from season to season, but the even more important applications of that trend to specific gowns, coats, hats and accessories. Their organization extends over Europe and America and includes scouts, observers, stylists, designers, creators, buyers, merchandisers and photographers.

No source of information is overlooked. Fashionable winter and summer resorts, hotels, theaters and society gatherings are constantly under their scrutiny, not particularly to find specific models, but to distinguish the trend. From this mass of information, the designing and buying organizations must make deductions and forecasts of the gradual changes

in lines, colors and silhouettes. Woe to the designer whose changes are too radical, for the American woman at large will not accept revolutionary developments within a single season.

The influences of Paris, Fifth avenue, Palm Beach, Michigan avenue and a host of others are blended and harmonized to create a style that retains the characteristic of the various sources. The style-determining machine works with the precision of the engineer geared to the flair of the artist, but there are no callipers to check human performance and its errors will hang in the store-rooms unsold at the end of season.

RADIO GROWS POPULAR IN LAND OF CANNIBALS

SUVA, Fiji Islands, Mar. 30. (AP)—A generation ago the Fijians were notorious cannibals. Today many of the natives in the larger towns are radio fans.

To prevent interference with broadcast reception the radio telegraph station at Suva is being modernized. Continuous wave transmitters, new engines and new aerials are being installed and the use of the spark transmitter will be discontinued. A call bell has been installed by which any ship within 50 or 100 miles of Suva can in an emergency arouse the operators during the hours when no watch is kept.

WILD RABBITS SPREAD TERROR IN SARDINIA

CAGLIARI, Sardinia, Italy, Mar. 30. (AP)—Cardania, like Australia some years ago, is now waging fierce combat against wild and predatory rabbits.

The long-eared and long-toothed animals have already wrought grave havoc among the wheat fields and vineyards, and the island's farmers' federation has earnestly besought the minister of national economy, Signor Martelli, either to send over experts from the Italian mainland to aid in the destruction of the pests or else to relax the hunting laws so the suffering peasantry may apply its own justice to the unwelcome visitors.

"Winter ale," an experimental beer produced by state breweries in England has proved a success. Herr Eckstein, the dean of Berlin claquers, has celebrated his twenty-fifth anniversary as a paid applauder.

WILL BROADCAST LATIN AMERICAN GEMS OF MUSIC

WASHINGTON, Mar. 30. (AP)—The biggest broadcast in history of Latin American music will be given the evening of April 2 when the naval station NAA and a Columbia network transmit a concert at the Pan American union here.

NAA will broadcast the entire concert from 8:30 to 11 and the Columbia chain from 10 to 11 o'clock.

The United Service orchestra of 30 musicians under the leadership of Capt. W. J. Stannard of the army band and Lt. Charles Yenter of the navy band, will play some selections never before heard



in this country. A feature number will be "The Voice in the Streets," by the Chilean composer Allende.

At the last concert the assisting artists were from Argentina, Brazil and Chile, all below the equator. At the April 2 concert artists from north of the equator, representing Cuba, Colombia and Mexico, will be featured. They are Margarita Cueto, Mexican soprano, Ernesto Lecuona, Cuban composer-pianist and the Hernandez brothers trio of Colombia.

Miss Cueto sang leading roles in the opera company at Mexico City and Mr. Lecuona, recently returned from concert engagements in Paris and Madrid, comes to the United States especially to take part in the program. The Hernandez brothers have been touring Latin American capitals for a number of years. They sing folk songs of their native land using for accompaniment the bandolita, tiple and the harp guitar, popular instruments in Colombia.

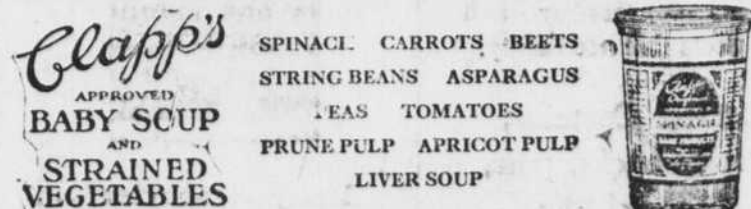

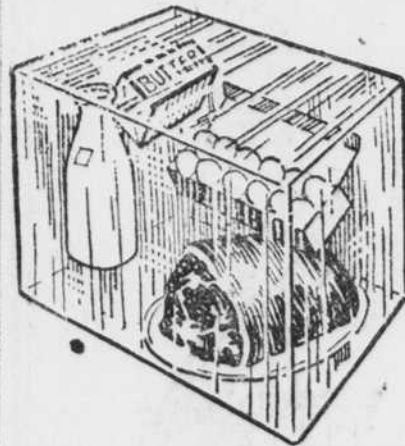
