California-Arizona Meeting Beneficial To Boulder Dam, Says Californian

BOULDER DAM ISSUES ARE CONSIDERED

Frank Discussion of Points Concerning Boulder Dam Agreement Conducted At Informal Meeting.

LOS ANGELES, April 6, (A) Although terming the meeting yesterday of Arizona and California Colorado River Commissioners as entirely unoffi-cial, W. B. Mathows, California member, termed the meeling as 'very beneficial."

In the absence of the Nevada members the meeting was not official, Mathews said, but "our talk was very informal and frank. We went over papers and decuments together and expressed our views on some of the important points."

Those present at the meeting were John Mason Ross, Charles B. Ward and A. H. Favour of Arizona, and Earl C. Pound, John L. Basen and Mathews of California. The tri-state conference will be resumed in Albuquerque April 17.

LOS ANGELES, April 6, (Special)-Ground adjoining the Gold Ace Mining company's sensational gold findings at Carrara is changing nanus rapidly, and the country is beign staked and monu-


