100 STATIONS MAY USE ONE RADIO WAVE

RADIO COMMISSION ALLOWS CONCERN PERMIT FOR SYNCHRONIZATION EXPERIMENTS

WASHINGTON, April 12. (AP)—Permission to construct four experimental stations in Virginia to demonstrate the feasibility of operating many broadcasting stations on the same wave length by synchronization has been granted the Continental Broadcasting Corporation of New York by the federal radio commission.

The commission was granted on the condition that the waves be used temporarily for synchronization tests only and that upon the expiration of the license there may be no assignment of any frequency to the Continental Broadcasting Corporation.

In addition to convincing the commission that the method will work successfully in every day operation, the company must overcome the barrier of a shortage of high frequencies by which it is planned to effect synchronization. If the project is approved, the company plans to establish a chain of broadcasting stations on a single channel. It is proposed, says P. H. Thurston, vice president of the corporation, to link up 100 low power local broadcasters in every part of the country.

The plan, he says, is to employ two short waves to create a broadcast band frequency. By modulation at each local station the high frequency waves from two high power key stations would be picked up and amplified to sufficient strength to serve the particular community. Individual stations would broadcast from special records. By means of a reproducing unit each station would begin its broadcasting on the same channel at the exact time and with the same photographic reproductions. Records are cylindrical, 18 inches long and 7 inches in diameter and contain an hour's program. Titus says. No program would be broadcast from the two 50,000-watt key stations. They would merely "manufacture" the carrier wave, and local stations would amplify this wave and broadcast recorded programs in synchronization.

The experimental permit calls for two stations located in Richmond and Alexandria for actual broadcasting and two stations at Fredericksburg operating on short waves. The frequencies assigned are 3,257, 3,256 and 4,795 kilocycles in the short band to be used simultaneously, producing a resultant "heterodyne" frequency of 1,539 kilocycles.

Engineers of the commission say that while the project might reduce congestion in the broadcast band it would necessitate the use of short waves, for which there is a great demand by other services. To cope with "skip distance" and various atmospheric conditions four to six high frequency channels would be needed to insure effective transmission at different times of the day and night, says Capt. Guy Hill, broadcasting engineer for the commission.

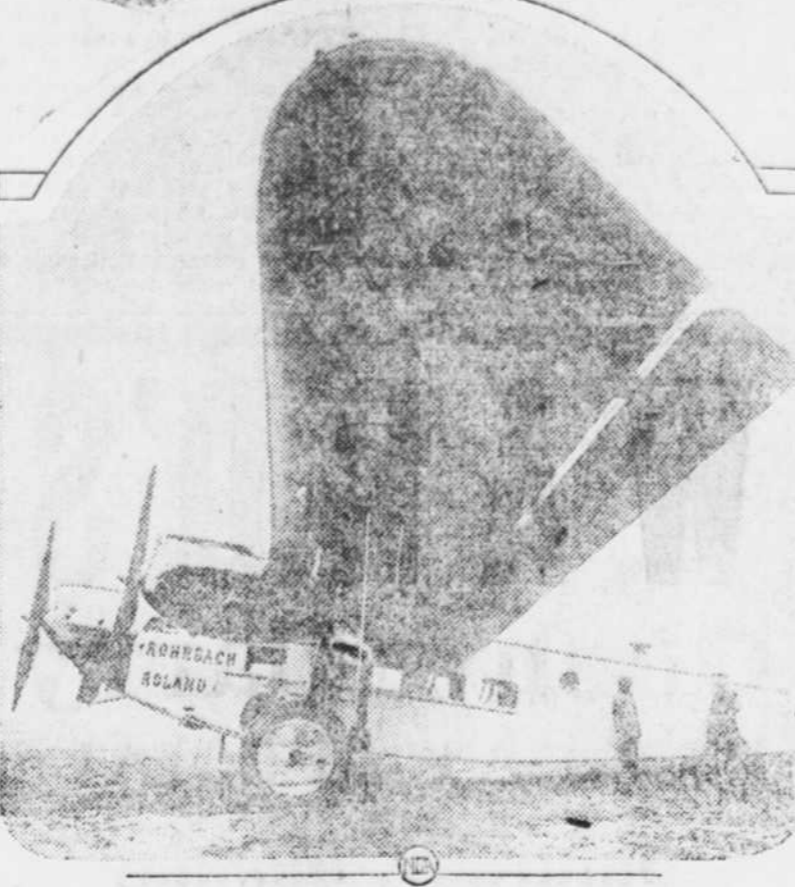
Mrs. Prescott, mother of the young midshipman, has taken a house in Annapolis and will entertain a party of young ladies during the academy's commencement season.

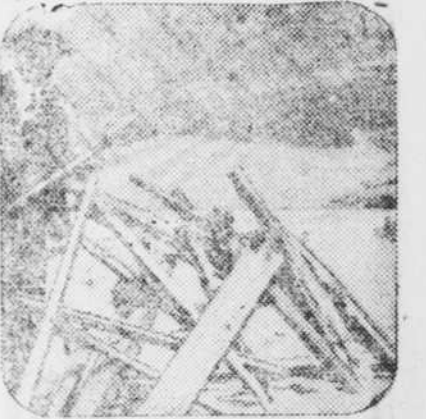

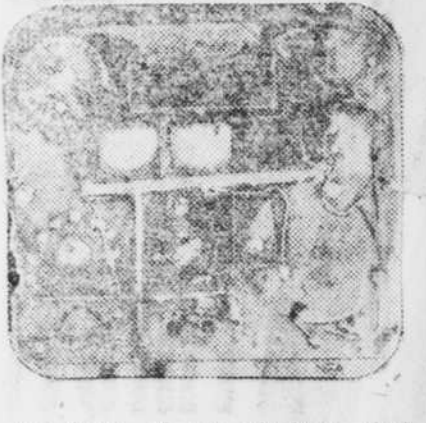
