LAS VEGAS H. S. BOYS WIN MEET AT NEEDLES

Local Track Team Gives California, Arizona Squads The Dust; Brings Home Cup From Tri-State Contest.

Winning more points than their three rivals combined, the Las Vegas high school track team carried off the tri-state meet against Needles, Kingman and Parker Saturday at Needles in great style.

The local boys came off the field with 69 points. Kingman, next in line, took 38 markers. Needles had to be content with 11 and Parker made 10.

And the boys brought home the cup.

Now they'll start training in earnest for the state meet.

BASEBALL, GRID DRILL COMBINED

ATLANTA, Ga., April 23. (AP)—Georgia Tech's cooperative coaching system is given as one reason why the school's athletes have fared well in professional baseball.

When football players become slow they are sent into the spring baseball work to gain speed, and when baseball players move slowly, they get speeded up by working on the football squad in the fall.

Seven members of last fall's Calden Tornado are on the baseball team this spring.

"Coach Alexander often has found that he could improve a football player's speed by having him work with the baseball squad in the spring, rather than by spring football practice," says Kid Clay, Georgia Tech baseball coach.

"The result was that I got some fine baseball material. On the other hand, I have sent some of my baseball men to Coach Alexander in the fall to let them gain speed and they have developed into good football players. All but one of my baseball men who have gone up in professional ball were football players, too."

Bob Reeves, now with Boston Red Sox, was a football player and baseball man of ability.

Ed Crowley, football captain in 1927, joined the Baltimore Orioles recently.

Another former Tech football man now is with the Chicago Cubs, Tom Angley, captain of Tech's diamond team in 1927, went from Atlanta of the Southern association to the Cubs. John Brewer, first baseman and halfback, is with New Orleans this year.

David (Red) Barron went to the Boston Braves, later played with Providence and now is coach of an agricultural college at Monroe, Ga. Joe Palmisano, who went to Cleveland and later played with Mobile and Nashville, is cited by Coach Clay as the lone example of a baseball player who went up from Tech and was not a gridiron man.

On the other hand, Joe Guyon, famous football star at Carlisle and Tech over a decade ago, was one player who made good at professional baseball without playing the game at Georgia Tech.

Seven of the 1928 football team which defeated University of California in the Rose Bowl classic, are on this year's baseball team.

GIVING OF SWIM LESSONS BEGUN

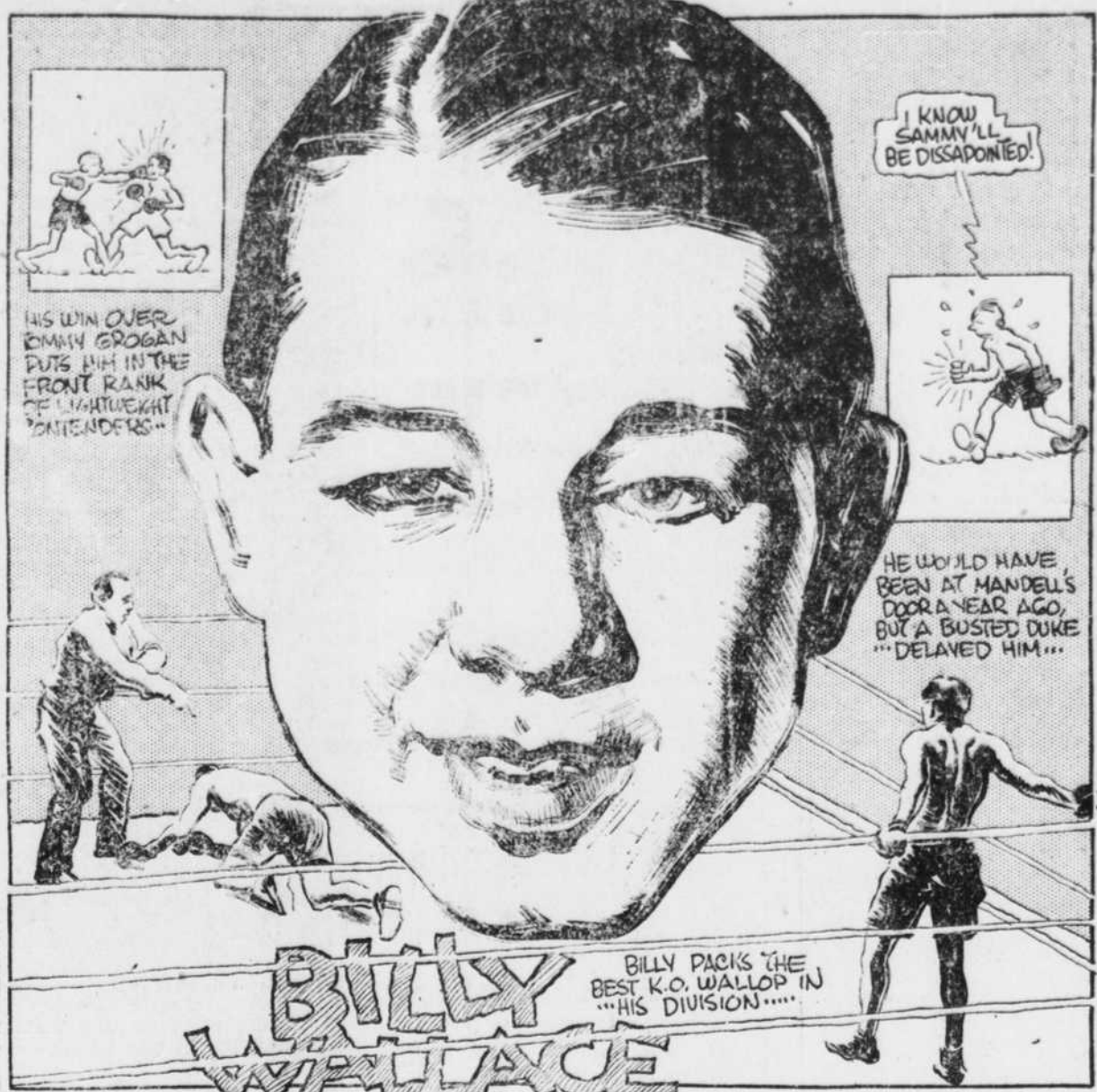
Swimming lessons are being given at the Mermaid Pool under the direction of an experienced instructor.

You will find the wise-cracking great-getter on almost every course. He will yell back "Five" or "Four-ninety-eight" when you courteously warn him of a shot by yelling "Fore."

Golf to him is a brand new game which furnishes bright cracks. He has an idea that the grand old game with its romance and its stories is going to profit because he and his wit have finally taken it up. He never misses a chance to call back a crack to anyone warning him.

"Fore"—a warning cry to any person in the way of the stroke or the ball. That's the rule book definition of the word.

Learn when to use it. Nothing so quickly marks a player a duf as the misuse of the warning. Call it when your partner is at the top of his swing; yell it before you shoot to a green 300 yards away, and see how quick they hop on you. Many unpopular golfers in clubs can trace the fact back to the days when they went around the course like human foghorns, yelling "Fore" at everybody and everything.

If a member of your foursome strolls into your line of play, call "Fore."

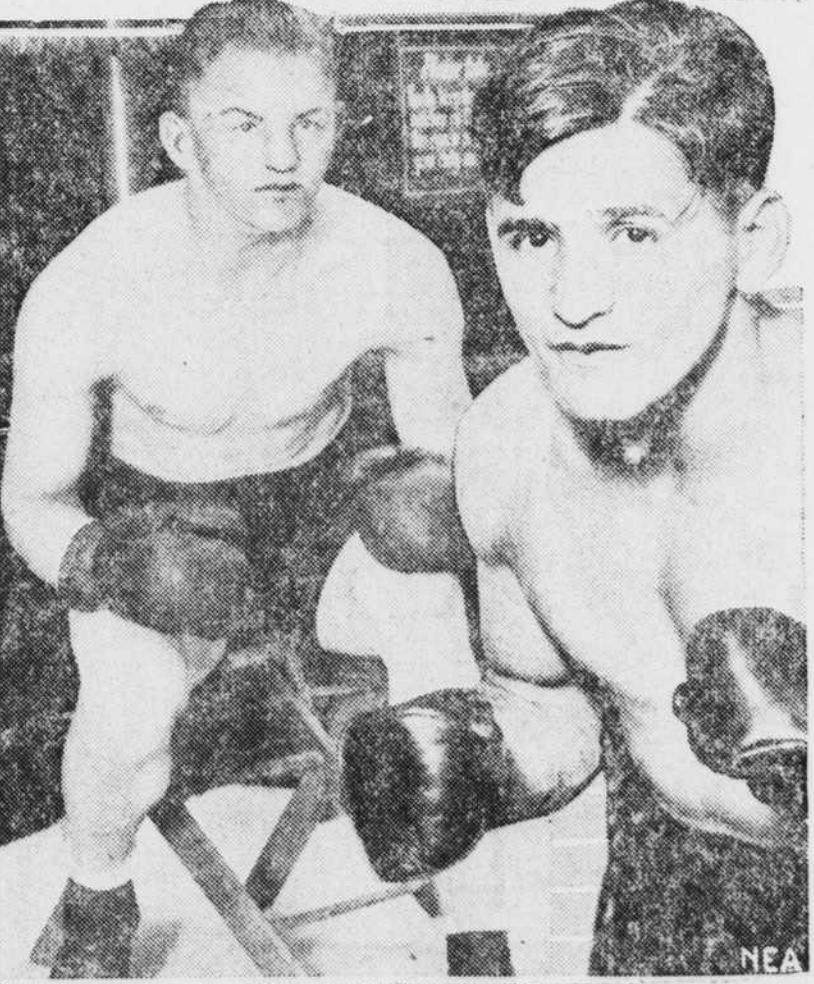
If a golfer on the green doesn't notice you are back of him, call "Fore."

If a golfer, by mistake, starts to play your ball, call "Fore."

If you're driving through the foursome ahead by permission and you slice into them, yell "Fore."

In fact, remember that "Fore" is a warning call to any person in the way of the stroke or the ball.

GIBSON TALKS HOOVER AGAIN COMMON SENSE WARNS AMERICA

GENEVA, April 22 (U.P.)—"The United States is willing to agree to any deduction of armaments, however drastic, which leaves no type of war vessel unrestricted," Hugh S. Gibson, American Ambassador to Belgium, to the League of National Preparatory Disarmament Commission today.

The American delegate to the commission put the discussion on an entirely new and common sense basis by offering a concrete proposal on which negotiations might proceed.

Gibson said, "The United States as a compromise, would accept the French thesis of limitation of total naval tonnage as a basis for discussion."

NEW YORK, April 22 (U.P.)—President Hoover, taking the second step in as many days in an apparent deliberate policy of submitting all national problems direct to the people, warned the nation today that the American scheme of government must fall unless all citizens unite to observe and force observance of law and order.

It followed closely his statement of Sunday on his objections to the senate's farm deventure plan, which he appealed to the farmers as well as to the politicians to defeat.
