

STUDY NEVADA TURKEY CROP

Nevada's turkeys have achieved such a high reputation on the Pacific coast that the California agricultural extension service is sending its poultry specialist, W. E. Newton, to Nevada early in May to study production methods used in this state.

Accompanied by V. E. Scott, poultry and dairy specialist of the Nevada service, the Californian will spend several days on the Nevada project, where he will study especially artificial and natural incubation and brooding.

Extensive brooding on the alfalfa range and intensive brooding with 1,000 or more young turkeys per acre will be observed by Newton.

While in the state, he will study also the pool plan of marketing the bronze birds, which the farmers of California are putting into effect this fall because of its successful operation in Nevada.

STUDENT FARMS BRING INDIAN BOYS PROFIT

CHILCOCCO, Okla., April 23. (AP)—Individual student farms, once considered a foolish experiment, have solved the problem of training youthful Indian farmers.

Nearly 40 Indian boys now cultivate separate tracts, ranging from 63 to 75 acres a piece, at the Chilcocco Indian agricultural school. Four thousand acres are under student cultivation.

Justice E. Correll, superintendent, aroused interest by telling the Indians the ground held "buried treasures." Each boy assigned a tract of ground averages \$200 profit annually—one quarter of what he produces.

Younger boys are allowed to cultivate smaller tracts. The school either buys the grain for its own use or sells it at the market.

The Chilcocco school's venture has been adopted as a model by Indian schools throughout the country.

GERMAN AIR LINE IS 10 YEARS OLD

BERLIN, April 23. (AP)—Germany's youngest traffic institution celebrates its tenth anniversary this month. In February, 1919, during the German National assembly at Weimar, a small company with one Junkers airplane established a service between Berlin and Weimar, carrying members of the convention back and forth.

This service proved a big success, so it was decided to form the "Lufthansa" company and establish a similar link between the more important centers in Germany.

Until 1926 the Treaty of Versailles did not allow Germany to build larger planes and stronger motors, but in spite of that the company was busy developing and organizing the service in Germany and establishing connections with the neighboring countries. In the course of these ten years a network of regular lines has been built up leading to all European cities, from Moscow to Madrid; from Oslo to Rome, etc. During 1928 the Lufthansa extended its schedule so enormously that 38,000 kilometers are flown daily by the company's planes.

As far as finances are concerned, the company is not yet making any profits, so the German government granted the company a yearly subsidy. These difficulties will soon be overcome with the advent of these ten years a network of regular lines has been built up leading to all European cities, from Moscow to Madrid; from Oslo to Rome, etc. During 1928 the Lufthansa extended its schedule so enormously that 38,000 kilometers are flown daily by the company's planes.

MALDEN, Mass., April 23. (AP)—Radio has bobbed up in probate court as a factor in divorce proceedings.

Mrs. Sarah J. Edgett, seeking divorce from her husband, introduced evidence to show that five different radio stations have broadcast pleas to Ernest J. Edgett, to reveal his whereabouts. In spite of all this, she said, she has had no word from him since he went to work one day in 1923 and failed to return. Detectives also were employed and with a lack of success.

The court granted Mrs. Edgett a decree nisi of divorce on grounds of desertion.

CRIPPLED MAINE MAN OPERATES BIG FARM

EAST LIVERMORE, Me., April 23. (AP)—Although an accident in the woods eight years ago cost Stanley H. Morrison one leg and rendered the other useless, he still runs a 180-acre farm and has devised enterprising methods of merchandising.

Mr. Morrison uses a wheel chair which carries him about the house and on which he can descend to his piazza or the ground.

The coming of his disaster was at first a severe setback to this active man who had already transferred the farm, his family home, into a vastly improved place. He cast about for new ideas. The canning business appeared to be an opening. He installed equipment which he has expanded. Last year the jelly he put up amounted to 18 tons. In addition, he puts up mince meat from his own recipe, apples for apple pies, tomatoes, mustard pickles, sweet and sour pickles and other farm products.

IDAHO TOWN PLEDGES SALARY TO PHYSICIAN

OAKLEY, Idaho, April 23. (AP)—After being without a physician for several years because there were not enough sick people here to support one, residents of this city pooled their resources and engaged a doctor.

The medical man was brought here under a contract which specifies that any month his fees fall below a specified "proper income" he will be paid from a fund made up by assessments on citizens.

As an initial reserve, each family was assessed \$20 and the money was placed in a local bank for the physician to draw upon. The town's population is 1,100.

SOUTH BEND, Ind., April 23. (AP)—Alfred E. Smith, democratic presidential candidate last fall, will join a company of distinguished Americans, when he receives the Laetare medal from the University of Notre Dame.

The medal has been given each year since 1882 to the "lay Catholic of the United States who has achieved such distinction in his field of special endeavor as to reflect glory upon the Catholic faith."

Warriors, statesmen, writers, jurists, orators and one actress, Margaret Anglin, have been given the Laetare medal.
