HUNDREDS FLEE FROM FLOODS

Texas Town Totally Destroyed By Tornado; Seven Dead, Many Injured

NOTHING LEFT OF TEXAS FOWN

Rescuers Searching Ruins For Many Missing; Storm Cuts Half-Mile Swath.

PALESTINE, Texas, April 24. (UP)-The town of Slocum, Texas, was totally destroyed by a tornado today, not a single building being left standing. Seven persons are known to

have been killed and twenty five critically injured and many more hurt slightly. Many are unaccounted for to-

night as the ruins are being searched Estimates place the property loss at more than a quarter million dollars. Communication lines are cut. The storm cut a swath half a mile wide and ten miles long. Red Cross workers from Palestine rushed food and supplies to

the stricken area tonight. The known dead are Mr. and Mrs. P. E. McDaniels, Mrs. Ben Kirkwood and her two sons; Claude McIver, aged seven, and Mrs. Bud Gatlin.

The new Las Vegas Creamery Company, Inc., store and creamery being built and equipped at 306 South Third street will be open for business May 1, according to the present plans of Paul D. Hosman, engineer in charge of the construction.

To work in harmony with local milk producers in the distribution gestion of Chamber; Boul- aim of this concern, which is now being incorporated, according Hosman. All milk produced by Foremaster's dairy and milk from other dairies will be distributed, on morning and afternoon routes.

Will Make Ice Cream The new dairy will be equipped to handle 500 gallons of milg daily and to produce 200 gallons of ice cream daily. It will have storage capacity for 800 gallons of ice cream. Both wholesale and retail selling will be handled by the creamery, and various dairy products will be delivered along with milk and cream, according to Hosman. There will be both pasteurized

products. The plant will be strictly modern, it was stated, and a temperature of 36 degrees will be maintained in the milk cooling rooms, which will prevent souring during the hot months.

Ready May 1 The building of the plant was started April 17 and is 100 feet by 20. The land was purchased from Joe Smith by Hosman and is being leased to the creamery company, which is being incorporated at \$50,000.

Hosman, engineer in charge of the construction, and who is to be active in the firm for some time. was formerly building inspector for the city of Alhambra , California. He is a graduate engineer, having taken his degree at the University of Illinois in 1917. His father is in the creamery business in Nebraska. Hosman has leased a residence at 105 East Lewis street, and will live there with his wfie and two children in the near future.

PLANS FOR NEW STAGE TERMINAL

Company Purchases Lot at First and Ogden for New Depot to Be Built Here

Plans for the construction of a stage depot in Las Vegas by the Pickwick Stage company on the new lot recently bought by the company on the corner of First and Ogden are being laid by the Pickwick people, it has been announced, and will be started soon.

The structure will be a one-story building facing on First street, on which side the lot has a 75 foot frontage. A restaurant and several store rooms will be housesd in the same building, it is stated.
