TALK GIVEN ON ALASKA CURIOS

A lecture on old Alaskan ivories and gold nugget jewelry, with slides and photographs in Alaska and accompanied by exhibition of a rare collection, was given for Mrs. Rowe's advanced high school class in art Thursday by Mrs. A. L. Delkin.

Samples of some of the oldest ivory utensils and ornaments from Eskimo-land, now on display in the Delkin jewelry store window with mastodon tusk samples and gold nugget jewelry made by Mr. Delkin, were brought out and shown to the students.

Some of the ivory utensils are very rare, according to Mrs. Delkin, because the Eskimos prize them so highly that it is hard to get them. Eskimo boat reproductions in miniature made by Eskimos themselves were shown.

The \$1500 watch containing a pound of gold in its makeup, all of which Mr. Delkin has and fashioned himself, in the making of the watch, was the most interesting piece of jewelry displayed. The gold for it was dug near Nome, Alaska by Mr. Delkin, who is now doing it, and the case was fashioned by him.

This watch is not for sale, said Mrs. Delkin, although she would consider selling the entire collection, which is now 20 years old. A gold nugget purp in which there are 200 nuggets and a gold chain worth \$4,000 were among the collection of nugget jewelry all of which were made by Mr. Delkin.

RIFLE BULLET PIERCES WING

SALT LAKE CITY, April 27, (UP)—Although Pilot Ray Elmore of the National Parks Airways, Inc., believes in preparedness he objects to being used as a target by some unknown person on the Great Falls-Salt Lake line who evidently has been practicing anti-aircraft marksmanship with a high-powered rifle.

After Elmore had returned from a Great Falls flight recently and was going over his plane as usual he discovered a bullet hole on the under side of the left wing. The bullet later was found lodged in the wing spar. Elmore said he did not hear the shot or feel the impact of the bullet.

"We naturally will conduct an investigation," Chief of Operations Felix Etienne said. "Of course it may be that some hunter was responsible, but that doesn't seem likely. From the angle the bullet entered the wings it appears that whoever was at the firing end of the rifle aimed at the engine of the plane and that the shot was deliberate. Had the bullet struck the engine or propeller, the results might have been disastrous."

"I understood," Etienne added, "that some time ago an Indian was arrested and fined for firing upon a plane in some part of Idaho, where we have reason to believe the shot was fired Sunday."
