First Night Airplane on New Schedule Carries Record Mail Cargo

WESTERN AIR **EXPRESS OPENS NIGHT SERVICE**

Added Transcontinental Mail Service Means Much To Las Vegas.-Larger Field Needed.

More than 500 air mail covers destined to be saved and sold and hoarded by stamp collectors in years to come as missives among the first to leave Las Vegas by regularlyscheduled night air mail service went out in a special

pouch last night. Post office clerks were kept busy yesterday for hours preparing the historic pouch, which contained letters sent from all parts of the country to be mailed on the initial

Zooming out of a dark sky, the big Boeing ship, piloted by "Jimmy" James, veteran pilot of the Western Air Express, landed at the Vegas Airport last night on scheduled time, and a few minutes later was off again for the next stop, Salt Lake City.

This new mail service will bring the Pacific Coast within one business day of New York. The regular passenger service will be continued as in the past. Recently the Western Air Express reduced its fares one third

in this mode of travel. With this increase in air transportation for Las Vegas, we are impressed all the more by the urgent need of a more modern air-field and hope that the time will not be far off when we can boast of a field second to none.

The east bound mail arrives here at 9 p. m. and the west-bound at 2:15 a. m.
