### Speed Work on Seadrome For Atlantic



Construction of the first of a chain of "floating airports" to span the Atlantic ocean is scheduled to start in July. WILMINGTON, Del., April 27. (AP)—Edward R. Armstrong, Wil-  
mington engineer, is rounding out  
plans for construction of the first  
of seven "floating airports" be-  
tween the United States and Eu-  
rope, which, he says, will make  
trans-Atlantic airplane service a  
reality.

Operation of the first seadrome,  
75 miles off the coast of New  
York, would make possible six-hour  
airplane service between New York  
and Bermuda. Construction is  
scheduled to start in July, with  
the units to be built ashore, car-  
ried to sea and anchored half way  
between New York and Bermuda.

Negotiations now are under way  
to sound the bottom of the ocean  
at 35 degrees 59 minutes north  
latitude, 69 degrees 0 minutes west  
longitude, to determine the extent  
of the two-mile deep plateau now  
shown on hydrographic charts, ap-  
proximately half way between New

York and Bermuda.

The seadrome, developed by Arm-  
strong after 15 years' study on its  
problems, resembles an aircraft car-  
rier in many of its principles. An-  
chored to the bottom of the sea, it  
will head into the wind continu-  
ously to make only one runway  
necessary. It is above the reach of  
the highway wave action and has  
its foundation below surface waves.

Spacious hangars, as well as  
restaurants, hotel accommodations,  
waiting rooms, cafes, bars and  
other conveniences for the travel-  
er are included in plans for the  
first seadrome.

The landing field will be 1,200  
feet long, with a central portion  
400 feet wide and the ends 200 feet  
wide. This has been considered  
sufficient for the largest planes.

Cost of the first seadrome is es-  
timated at \$1,500,000.

Details of the procedure for re-  
fueling at sea and taking on sup-  
plies are being developed by a  
Philadelphia oil company, Louis

**SPIDER MAN'S FRIEND, SAYS CUBAN PADRE**

HAVANA, May 2. (AP)—Spiders in  
Cuba are found by Padre Feliciano  
Frangillo, S. J., of Helen college to  
protect man from the ravages of  
other insects.

He says that Cuba need not wor-  
ry about insect pests, because the  
spiders eat all other varieties of  
insects and are so numerous as to  
afford total protection. He has found  
more than 700 varieties of spiders  
in Cuba alone.

"No one," he says, "should fear  
the sight of a spider, for it never  
bothers a human voluntarily."  
The spider, he says, is the dread  
tarantula bites a human by-  
ing, and even then the cases of  
mortal bites are virtually un-  
known. The only fear of people  
regarding the bites of spiders  
is a false superstition. "A  
great part of it is pure fiction."  
"The reaction of loathing and  
repugnance at the sight of a spider  
should not be, because the spider  
really is a friend of mankind, de-  
stroying harmful insects, and in so  
doing making life more bearable."  
Padre Frangillo's opinions on  
spiders are based on many years'  
study, which began in Spain. He  
has collected a total of 1,500 kinds  
of spiders, from those the size of  
a human hand to some barely  
visible.

Ecceles Field, the Seattle, Wash.,

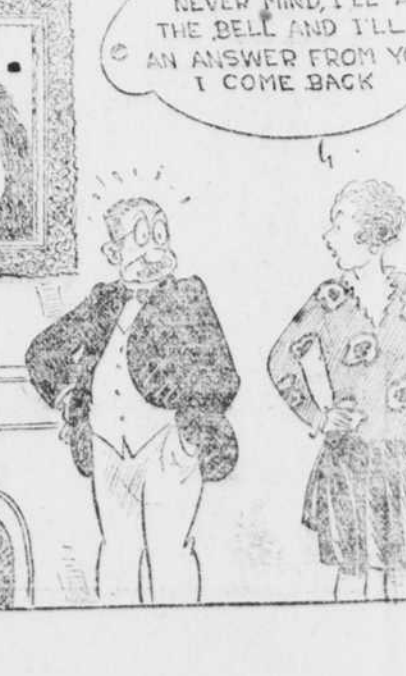
