CAMBRIDGE, Mass., May 2. (AP)—Track is far and away the most popular form of athletics at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

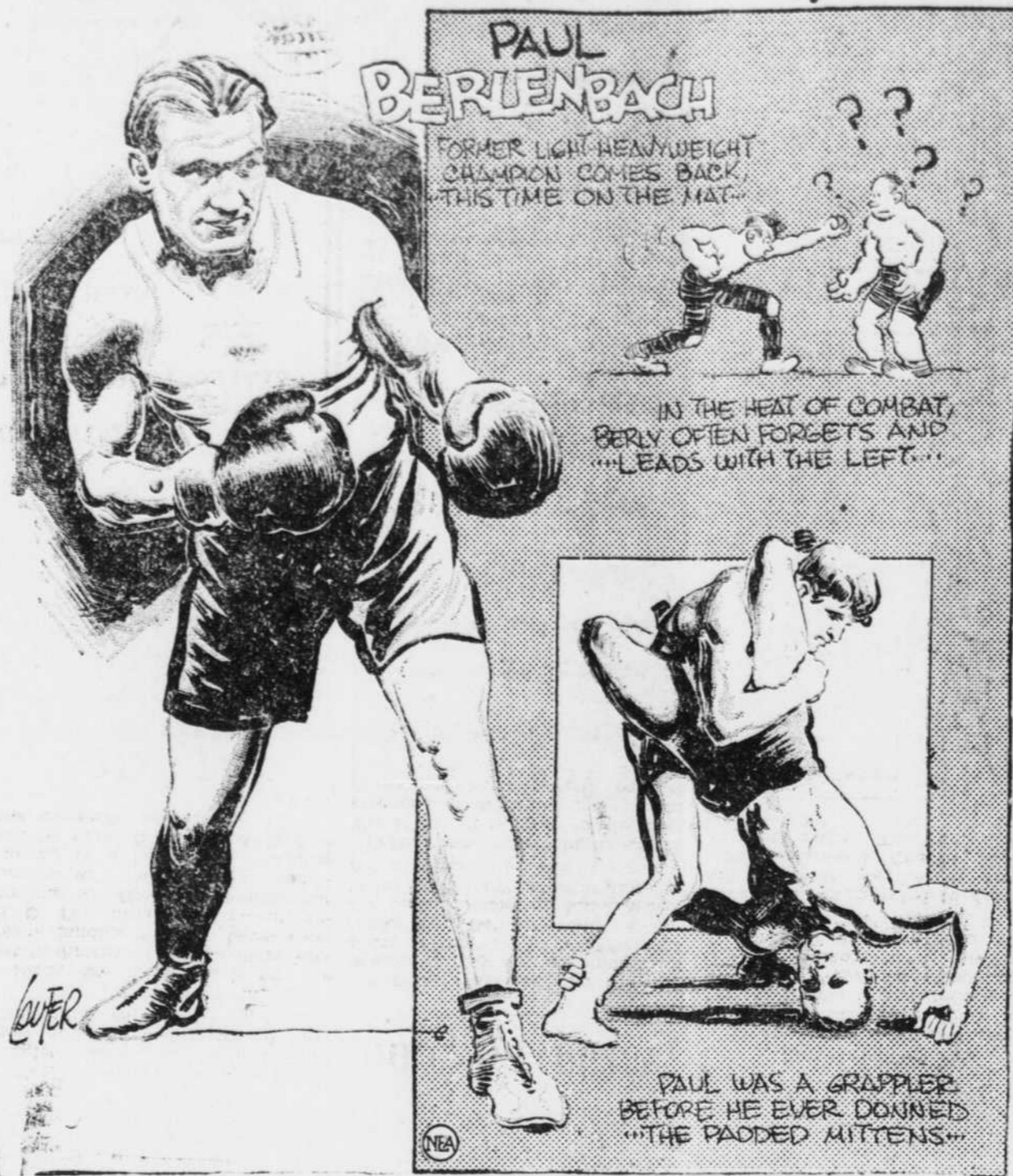
