VEGAS TO HAVE WORLD CHAMP MAT BOUT SOON

Ira Dern, Light Heavyweight Title-Holder Expected to Meet Well Known Californian at El Patio This Month.

A world championship wrestling match for Las Vegas this month! This is the plan of Jack Harbertson, promoter and business man of this city.

Ira Dern, light heavyweight world champion, and Leo Papias, of California are the men. May 16 is the date tentatively set, and El Patio, new open air theater at First and Carson, now nearing completion, is the place.

Harbertson, formerly famous himself as a mat performer, has had the promise of both these big wrestlers for some time that they would wrestle here, and the problem of a place adequate for such a match has now been solved by the construction of the new theater. Hence Harbertson's decision to slate the match for this month.

Local Boy to Perform George Batalis, local boy who showed some great stuff in cleaning up two matches at the recent carnival here, will meet either Earl Stoker of Ogden, now located in this city, or some good man to be brought from Salt Lake City or Los Angeles.

These two matches will furnish mat fans a real high class entertainment, and set off with a battle royal, between five Union Pacific employees and a certain group of five husky wrench-wielding plumbers, should be worth the \$1.50 to be charged for admission, stated Harbertson last night.

Ira Dern is one of the best-pulling big wrestlers in the country today, having drawn a \$20,000 house in conjunction with Joe Stecher, former world's champion in the heavy class when the two met and argued for two hours and five minutes to a draw in Salt Lake City two weeks ago, at which bout 7,000 fans were turned away from the gate.

Has Promises Dern, who is a close friend of Harbertson's, assured the local man that he would meet Papias or anyone Harbertson chose to pit him against, in Las Vegas at any time that could be arranged without conflict with his other bouts. Therefore he is expected to wire back "yes" to Harbertson's proposition for the staging of the go here.

Papias, who was specifically mentioned in Dern's letter to Harbertson, also wrote Harbertson he was willing to wrestle the champion here, and now the date is the question upon which everything hinges. It will likely be May 16, and the machinery is already in action for the putting over of the biggest athletic event Las Vegas has seen in this class.

Batalis, who weighs around 165 pounds, wrestles in the middle-weight class. He has wrestled such men as Louis Miller, Pacific coast champion and Ray McConnell, the Kansas City having won over the latter in 15 minutes. He wrestled Jack Ganson, Olympic Club champion at San Francisco for one hour to a draw.

The complete cast for the re-showing of the three-act play "Kempy" at the grand opening of the new open air theater, El Patio, has been chosen, according to Director William Street, and the show-time of "Kempy" will be scheduled as soon as the new theatre is finished, which will be about May 10, it is expected.

Miss Laura Wilson will play the feminine lead, the part carried by Mrs. Gladys Powers as Kate Bence, in the presentation, and E. B. Edwards will take the place of Raby J. Newton as Duke Merrill in the play. Otherwise the same cast will appear in the play.

Roofing of the stage has been completed, the dressing rooms are virtually done, and the installing of electric lighting equipment is now being consummated by Vann Electric.

There will be facilities in the new theatre for the accommodation of large dramatic and musical companies, according to Street, who has had much experience in open air presentations.

LOCAL LANDING FIELD IS NOTED

New Standard Oil Guide Book Contains Descriptions of All Pacific Coast Fielding Including Vegas.

"What goes up must come down," they say—and where sky pilots are concerned good landing fields must be provided to do it with. Their number is rapidly increasing, according to the new Standard Oil directory supplement now being distributed.

Some 60 new fields, added to the 270 listed in the edition of last June, brings the total for Pacific western states up to 25, counting out certain discontinued airports. Along with more new landing fields the ones already established are being rapidly improved, particularly as to lighting facilities, the guide states.

Standard Oil's giant new beacons at Seattle, Portland and San Diego are described in detail, with maps showing position of nearby airports. The new directory includes a description of the local airport as follows: Rockwell Airport—Also used as golf course—size 2640 ft. x 2000 ft., elevation 2040 ft.; 2 8-10 miles south of city and Standard Oil plant marked "Las Vegas."

No confirmation of the report could be obtained from the Morrow home at Englewood, at which Miss Morrow and her sister, Elizabeth, and Mrs. Wright Morrow, her mother, are now staying.

BECKLEY FLATS SCENE OF FIRE THIS MORNING

Fire gutted the two-flat apartment house owned by Will Beckley at 121-123 North Fourth street shortly before five o'clock this morning.

WALLACE WINS CLOSE FIGHT BY DECISION

Wade Puts K. O. On Miller in Semi-Final. — Smith Batters Kelly in Second Event. — Tartar Quickly Puts Kelly to Sleep.

Contrary to the expectations of many, Mickey Wallace, the Las Vegas favorite, weathered the storm and gained the decision in the six round main event on last night's American Legion fight card.

Tim Charles of Louisville, Ky., was heavier and had a sleek, white appearance that roused the suspicion that he was too fat to fight his best. Mickey, as usual, was slim and trim and appeared to be trained to condition.

The fight was a good one on both sides, but throughout there was nothing of a decisive nature. It appeared that Charles had a wicked overhand swing which he couldn't land on Mickey, but he distressed him with heavy body blows Mickey landed more blows than Tim did, yet they seemingly did but slight if any, damage.

The decision of Referee Cragin, which was technically correct on points, gave the rather indecisive contest to Mickey, while a large portion of the crowd seemed to think that the decision should have been a draw.

Opened slowly, but soon livens and Mickey lands some business like blows on Tim's jaw. Furious infighting during clinches. Mickey lands one on Tim's face and the latter trips in backing away and goes to his knees for an instant, but comes up fighting. Cautious tactics are followed to the end of the round. Mickey's round.

Round 4. Opens with some dancing around. Both lead and will result in bringing many visitors to the Charleston Mountains the coming summer.
