**SEMI FINAL**

Kid Miller of Las Vegas, vs. Emmet Wade of Las Vegas. Announced as six three minute rounds, the fighters weighing in at 122 pounds.

Round 1. The round opens with Miller on the aggressive. There is lively fighting. Miller forcing and Wade on the defensive. Miller lands considerable punishment to Wade's face and has his nose bleeding. More lively exchange with Wade on the defensive.

Miller's round.

Round 2. Miller opens the aggressive and lands a vicious one on Wade's face early in the round, sending Wade momentarily to his knees. Wade is quickly up and opens a furious offensive. Wade lands heavily on Miller's jaw. Miller is dazed and hangs on to the ropes, a helpless target for the battering blows with which Wade beats him down.

Miller's seconds throw up the sponge and Wade wins by a K.O. Wade's victory, coming as it did so quickly following his disadvantage was roundly applauded by the crowd. But again, when Miller was able to leave the ring, he received applause hardly less hearty than that accorded the victor.

**SPECIAL EVENT**

Round 3. Opens slowly but soon quickens, both socking with vigor. Furious infighting and exchange of body blows. Hernandez attempts to force fighting. More body fighting. More clinching. Both are tired at end of round and honors are fairly even.

Round 4. Opens with furious infighting, both raining body blows as they go into clinches. Hernandez lands a hot one on Rubio's face. Rubio clinches and hangs on. Hernandez forces the fighting. Rubio dazed but still trying hard at end of round. Hernandez' round.

Referee Cragin lifted Hernandez' hand in token of victory.

**SECOND EVENT**

Johnie Smith of Las Vegas, vs. Geo. Kelly, of Cleveland, Ohio. Four three minute rounds announced. Fighters weigh in at 138 pounds.

Round 1. It opened savagely. Smith put Kelly down twice during the lively fighting, but was unable to end it all.

Smith's round.

Round 2. Smith repeated his performance of the previous round, having Kelly at his mercy and sending him down to the canvas twice before the referee called it off and awarded the palm of victory to the Las Vegas lad. Kelly tried hard to make a comeback but was clearly outclassed.

**FIRST EVENT**

Razz Tartar of Las Vegas, vs. Jimmy Harris of Boston. Four scheduled rounds with fighters at 123 pounds.

Round 1. Started as a vicious slugging match. Harris went down under Tartar's rain of blows but came up at 6 and went at it again with vigor. Harris thirsts for vengeance and careless of his defense, is presently at the mercy of Razz, who puts him down for the count at the end of the first two minutes of the fight. Tartar wins by K.O.

It was fast and furious while it lasted, but rather one-sided.
