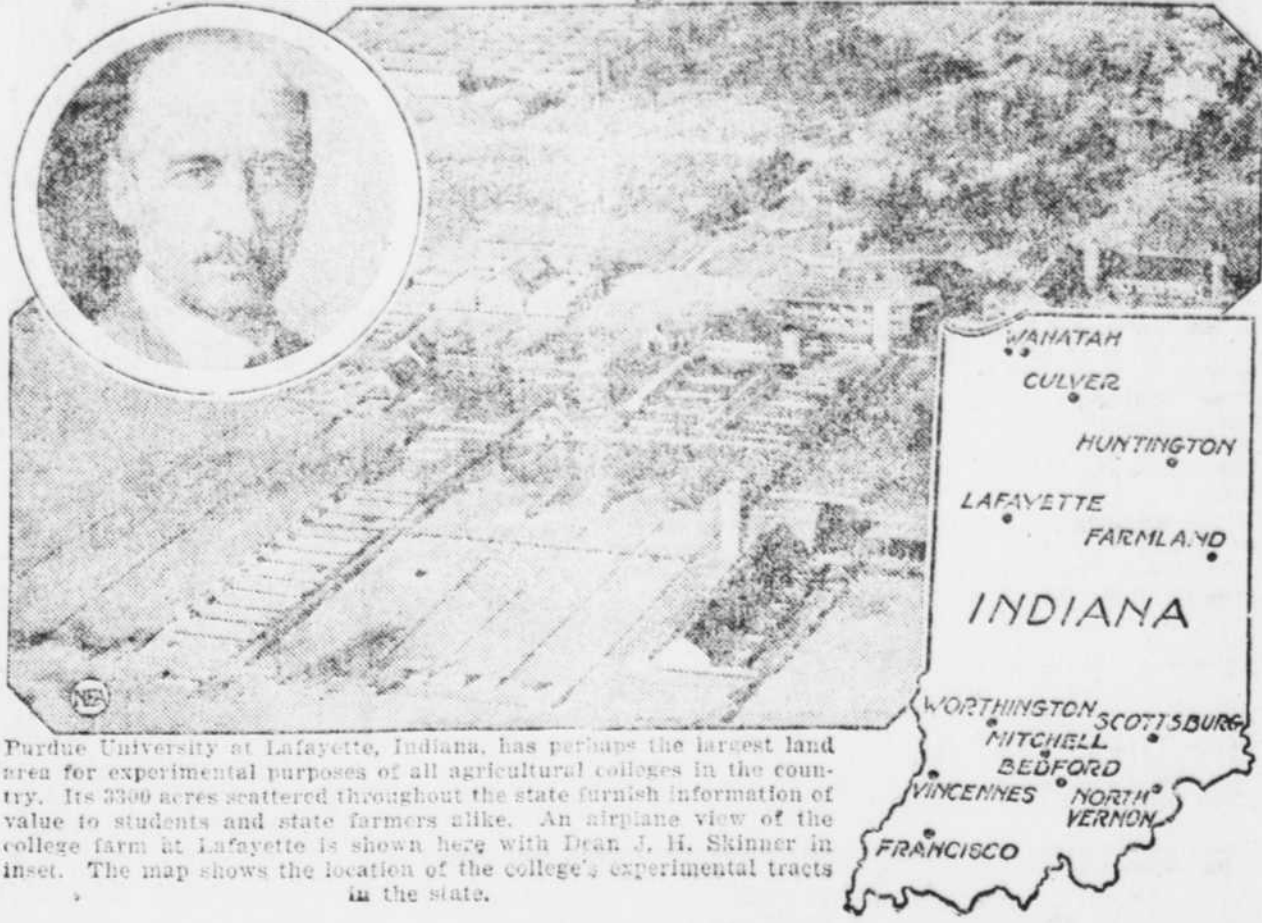

MISSOURI RIVER FLOODS CAUSE DAKOTA SURVEY

HOT SPRINGS, S. D., May 7. Army engineers have begun a survey of the drainage area of the Cheyenne river, investigating the possibilities of flood control through construction of dams. A large reservoir at Jackson narrows is urged by local interests who contend that the project, by impounding surplus water in the Cheyenne, would lift a large burden from the Missouri river during the flood periods. Irrigation and water power projects also are being considered here at the government survey progress.

away shortly after the civil war have its confines echoed to martial tread. It now is a state park, and tourists camp beneath its tree where sentries alert for the war cry of Indian braves once walked their posts.

Just a cannon-shot away, across the waters of Lake Superior is the imaginary line separating Canada from the United States.

Never once in the life of the old fort was a gun fired from its confines in hostility. Fort Wilkins was established in 1844, temporarily abandoned in 1846, reoccupied in 1869 and finally deserted in 1870.

The post was built at the end of Michigan's north, the Keweenaw peninsula, as a protection to early copper miners and settlers against Indian aggression. These, too, looked in the minds of officials at that time a possibility that the United States some day might need to defend its northern frontier.

The first garrisoned troops, who built the post, hewed the logs from virgin timber. Later the buildings were clapboarded, and when the state took over the post the fort was well preserved.

Protecting the enclosure on the north and east was a stockade of wooden posts. Lake Fanny Moore provided protection on the south side, and there was a rapidly flowing stream on the west.

The post, although somewhat incumbered by the summer's flow of motorists, remains a page out of the past in the industrialized present of Michigan's copper country.

TOMMY ATKINS GETS CHANCE FOR EPAULETS

SANDHURST, England, May 7.—An English army reform, revolutionary in this country of class system, is planned by the British general staff. Under it every private soldier will have a field marshal's baton in his knapsack, but whether he gets a chance to use it will depend upon himself. The plan calls for promotion from the ranks by merit with the hope of replacing inefficient subalterns who hitherto have been selected because of social position, wealth, proficiency in sports, horsemanship and similar "parade" qualifications. In the old days commissions were purchased but that was finally abolished. Always, however, one of the chief attractions of a British army commission was the social status that went with it.

Under the new plan infantry units smaller than a company will be led by efficient non-coms developed from the rank and file. From the best of these men candidates will be selected for higher education at Sandhurst, the West Point of Great Britain.

These changes are a direct result of the world war which taught the British general staff the need for higher efficiency among the subalterns, many of whom were imperfectly trained and who relied on the superior technical knowledge of their top sergeants to pull them through. The new system will be introduced gradually.

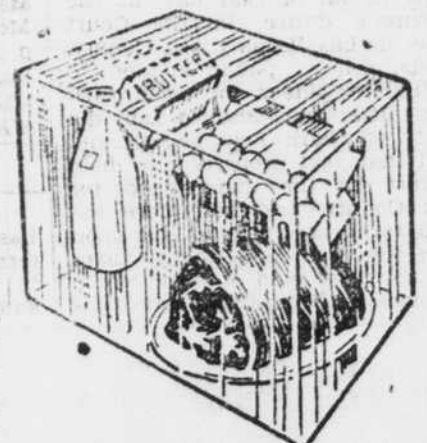
Probably the first group of non-commissioned officers to benefit under the new plan will be received at Sandhurst next term.

As an ultimate result of the changing aspect of the British Army, there will be fewer officers but they will be highly educated, highly skilled and more apt in the reception of new ideas. Already at Sandhurst more attention is being given to turning out officers of advanced education.

The post war army too seems to be attracting to the ranks a larger proportion of young men of fair education. The advantages of elementary and secondary schooling offered to Tommy Atkins and the development of mechanical science in warfare make for that.
