HALF MILLION CHEVROLETS IN FOUR MONTHS

DETROIT Mich., May 9.—Evidence of the widespread popularity of the new six-cylinder Chevrolet was revealed here today in an announcement by R. H. Grant, vice-president of the Chevrolet Motor company, in charge of sales, that more than a half million of the new cars have been placed on the road since the first of the year.

A significant feature of this achievement it was noted, is the fact that Chevrolet in four months built a greater number of six-cylinder cars than any other automobile manufacturer has ever produced in an entire year.

This figure would have been even greater, Mr. Grant pointed out, if Chevrolet had been able to take immediate care of the tremendous volume of orders with which the factory has been flooded since the introduction of the new car.

"Nearly every month this year has seen a new monthly production record," said Mr. Grant. "In order to satisfy the demand for cars pouring in from nearly every section of the country our output has been increased as fast as consistent with the precision-manufacturing methods which Chevrolet employs."

To signalize the achievement of placing on the road more than 500,000 cars in less than four months' time Chevrolet secured John Philip Sousa and his world famous band for an hour's broadcast over a nation wide hook-up on Monday, May 6th. Only one day before has the celebrated marching band been heard on the radio. That was at the Hoover acceptance speech at Stanford University.

Although Mr. Sousa has played to more people than any other director in the history of band music, appearing once before a single audience of 153,000 people at the International Exposition in Glasgow America's grand old march king had one of the largest audiences that ever listened to one musical offering.

Thirty-nine stations, extending from coast to coast and from the Great Lakes to the Gulf were linked together for Sousa's Chevrolet concert.

Chevrolet officials expressed themselves as highly gratified that Sousa accepted the Chevrolet hour on the General Motors program to make his second appearance before the microphone.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 9. (UP)—Dorothy Ellington, the San Francisco girl who shot and killed her mother because "she wouldn't let her go to a party," will share in the estate of her mother.

Manuel Silva, attorney for the slain woman, told Superior Judge Thomas Graham today that he had discovered \$1100 in his client's name.

The court held that Dorothy was entitled to a share of the estate as she was sentenced to San Quentin on a manslaughter conviction and not murder.

LOUISIANA TO BUILD INTRACOASTAL CANAL

NEW ORLEANS, May 9. (AP)—Although only 37 miles long, one of the most important canals in the country soon is to be erected in Louisiana. It will provide a link between the deep water port at Lake Charles and the great Louisiana rice belt of the Acadia or "Evangeline country."

Construction of the intracoastal canal from the Mermentau to the Calcasieu river soon is to start. It will cost approximately \$2,000,000.

BUICK FLEET USED IN CAL. PRUNE SURVEY

Prunes—you'll have all your needs require following the harvesting of this fall's California crop.

And as for the prune grower—his prospects for the most profitable crop in many years lie ahead no farther than this fall.

And all this comes about through a series of fortunate happenings befalling coast prune orchardists during the past few months.

First of all, the bulk of the prune acreage in Northern California escaped the recent disastrous cold wave that seriously damaged other crops in that section. Secondly, with crops generally good the California Prune & Apricot Growers Association met with complete success in enlisting sufficient prune tonnage this year to secure its existence as a cooperative marketing organization. And, thirdly, through facts broadcast by the growers' association, increased use of prunes as a health food has resulted from a recent movement sponsored by hospitals and medical authorities.

A corps of agricultural marketing experts, sent out to survey the entire coast orchard area in a fleet of 1929 Buicks, learned from E. N. Thayer, secretary of the California Prune & Apricot Growers Association, that a great measure of the success of the prune orchardists' drive this year is due to an awakened health consciousness on the part of the public. During recent years, Thayer pointed out, the recognized health value of prunes sold have been brought home to the consumer through a variety of mediums. Scores of different prune recipes were broadcast to housewives with the result that a new army of buyers has arisen to create a demand which is becoming larger and more intensive each year.

OAKLAND SALES SET RECORDS

With March sales of new Oakland and Pontiac Sixes 7,900 cars above any previous month in Oakland history, the Oakland Motor Car Company during the first quarter of the year sold 81,938 cars. W. R. Tracy vice-president of the company, said today that this better the first quarter of 1928 by 8,000 units and nearly trebles the 23,000 Oakland and Pontiac Sixes sold in the first three months of 1927, Mr. Tracy stated.

March sales this year, according to figures reported to the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce, were 36,460 cars, setting a new high monthly record in the history of the Oakland company, the best previous month having been June, 1928, when sales touched 29,477 cars.

March of this year shows a gain of close to 30 per cent over the 23,302 Oakland and Pontiac Sixes turned out in the same month last year, and more than doubles the 16,974 units sold in March of 1927.

Current production schedules are at peak figures, Mr. Tracy stated.
