**Fly Pest Perils U. S. Fruit**



Recent discovery of the Mediterranean fruit fly near Orlando, in Orange county, Fla., gives fruit farmers of the United States cause for worry. The pest, discovered by J. C. Goodwin, a member of the State Plant Board of Florida, attacks nearly all kinds of fruit. The picture of the grapefruit orchard, apparently illustrating destruction by the pest, and two of the pests are pictured in the lower inset.

**BIG STAR PULSATES AT EXPLOSIVE SPEED**

**ITHACA, N. F., May 9, (AP)—**Flames that surge for a distance of 1,000,000 miles at a speed of more than 4,000 miles a minute have been found in the bright star, Beta Cephei, which shines nightly near the north pole star.  
 New studies of this star, which is one of the famed "giants among suns," are made public at the Fuertes observatory of Cornell university.  
 They deal with the mysterious phenomenon of "pulsation," by which some stars swell rapidly and then contract as quickly, repeating with clocklike regularity. The cause is not fully understood. Beta Cephei, from a size of about 10,000,000 miles in diameter, swells in a fraction more than four hours to a body of fire estimated at 11,000,000 to 12,000,000 miles in diameter.  
 What started the pulsations is not even guessed, but the principle that keeps the flaming gas in motion is that of a pendulum. Some-where between its smallest and its greatest diameters is the limit where the surging fire some day may come to comparative rest.  
 S. L. Boothroyd, professor in charge of the Fuertes observatory, says a new test of the nature of pulsations now is possible by use of the radiometer, which measures the heat of stars, and he adds that heat experiments probably will be undertaken.  
 This great star in less than 4,000 years is due to become the north pole star because of slow movement of the earth's axis, which causes the phenomena known as precession of the equinoxes.

**CHARACTER TEACHING PLANNED BY SCHOOL**  
**PONTIAC, Mich., May 9, (AP)—**An innovation in public school procedure is to be launched here next fall when a directorship of character education will be established. Plans for the new office and what it is hoped will be accomplished have been announced by James H. Harris, superintendent of schools.  
 "Because of its complexity there has been wide difference of opinion as to methods of dealing with character education," he says. "The growing laxity of morals, the increasing disregard for law, the lessening of home and parental authority through conditions of modern life, the increase of crime, the break-down of religious sanctions, all unite to force conscious consideration of this problem."  
 To place the plan under actual test the board of education at Pontiac has engaged Kenneth L. Heaton who is at present studying at the University of Chicago, as the first director of character education.  
 The Pontiac school officials have drawn up a tentative plan, which is threefold:  
 First—The director shall plan to educate and train teachers in the technique of handling personnel problem cases.  
 Second—It will be his task to coordinate all the forces and activities that at present in an unorganized way make for good citizenship and character development and bring them to an awareness of their place in the total scheme of things.  
 Third—The director will interest himself in case work—in the specific problem of the boy or girl who makes the initial misstep and perhaps may be prevented from further errors if the right methods are employed.

**PUBLIC WARDS GROW TREES TO END FLOODS**

**SPRINGFIELD, Ill., May 9, (AP)—**Under a plan advocated by Rodney H. Brandon, state director of public welfare, convicts and insane persons in public institutions may help block floods by growing millions of young trees for reforestation purposes.  
 He proposes that the state buy tracts of land near penal institutions and hospitals for the use where tree propagation could be carried on.

**RAILROADS PLAN VIOLATION OF OLD AGREEMENT**

**TOPEKA, Kan., May 8, (UP)—**Officials of the Santa Fe Railroad yesterday started working on a new schedule which will cut five hours from the running time of their trains between Chicago and the Pacific Coast.

The move is seen by railroad men here as another step toward a railroad passenger war for business between Chicago, Kansas City and Los Angeles, and San Francisco.  
 The Union Pacific has already announced a similar cut in the running time of its fast trains, and the Rock Island has removed the extra fare charge for its DeLuxe service.  
 The action of these three railroads violates the agreement which has existed for years which provided for a 63 hour run between Chicago and the coast, and a 14 hour run from Kansas City to Chicago.  
 The Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul and the Chicago and Alton competitors to the Union Pacific, Rock Island and Santa Fe, for the Kansas City-Chicago business, have not indicated change from the 14 hour schedule.

**TINTED TALKIES ARE DEVELOPED**

**NEW YORK, May 9, (UP)—**Tinted "talkies," which may open a new emotional range of the art of sound motion pictures, have been developed in the research laboratories of the Eastman Kodak company at Rochester, it was announced yesterday at a meeting of the Society of Motion Picture Engineers.  
 The tints do not destroy the sound-reproductive qualities of the film but closely simulate the general coloring of interior or exterior scene.  
 In a paper to the engineers, Lloyd A. Jones revealed that the sound films will be enabled to project scenes in 16 different tints.  
 The new development would give the blue of the sea to views needing that quality yellow brilliancy to sunlit scenes cool green to the forest and repressive dark blue to murky nights.  
 Miniature planes released at an altitude of 3,000 feet are targets for artillery men at Fort Story, Va.
