PROVINCETOWN, Mass., May 14. (UP)—Provincetown children, ranging in age from 6 to 17, now have their own art club.

MAN NEARLY BUFFALOED

But Perseverance Wins and Milk Finally was Obtained from Animal.

GREAT FALLS, Mont., May 14. (UP)—Few men have milked a buffalo cow and lived to tell of their experiences. Frank Rose, warden on the bison reserve in Lake county is one of the few, and he's probably the only man in the Northwest who ever tried to say "so-o-o bossy" to a buffalo.

Rose received a request from Salt Lake City for some bison milk for laboratory purposes. He obtained the milk, but declared that the operation would have to be performed by somebody else hereafter.

So far as he could determine, nobody had ever written a book of instructions telling the novice how to go about coaxing a lady buffalo in being milked. He found that milking a buffalo cow was somewhat different from milking the average dairy animal.

First herding the reluctant and rebellious cow into a crate, Rose made an attempt to obtain the milk. One side of the crate was smashed away, and the milk pail was kicked across the lot. Rose then tied a leg of the cow on each side of the crate. No better results. All four legs were tied, but the buffalo continued to object. Then a maze of ropes were passed around the cow's body and she was trussed so completely that she could neither kick, bite, butt, rear nor cast about in any direction.

Rose obtained a pint of milk from the indignant animal.

The milk tested 79 per cent butter fat and had only half the sugar content of ordinary cow's milk.

FALLON GIRL IS CONTEST WINNER

CHICAGO, Ill., May 14.—Selection of Miss Eva Ginn, of Fallon, Nevada high school girl, as champion of the state of Nevada in the sixth national meat story contest in which high school girls of every state took part, has just been announced by a committee of prominent home economics women who served as judges.

Miss Ginn's story was on the subject of "Priscilla Tells the New-lweds." Other subjects ranged from meat production to cooking methods.

The meat story contest is conducted annually as an education feature by the National Live Stock and Meat Board in cooperation with high school home economics instructors. More stories were submitted in the contest just closed than ever before, it was said.

The national championship was awarded to Miss Ruth Cullen of La Grande, Ore. The champion in the central district was Miss Emily Ellis of Ida Grove, Ia. in the southern district, Miss Genevieve Molt, Sherport, La., and in the eastern district, Miss Elizabeth Wescott of Marlton, N. J. Prizes were awarded in every state.
