Machine Guns Mow Down Two Agua Caliente Gambling Resort Guards

MEXICAN, SHOT FOR DEBT, WILL LIVE, BELIEVED

Hemorrhages Result from Bullet Wounds Inflicted in Street Shooting, But Victim Out of Danger.

After having been shot twice by another Mexican who said a \$200 debt was the cause of his shooting the other, Clementi Mena, Mexican, was reported beyond the danger point by attendants at the Las Vegas hospital late last night.

E. Moreno, assailant, who is said to have hit Mena on the head with the butt of his revolver after having shot him twice is lodged in the county jail and undoubtedly will face a charge of assault with intent to kill.

Witnesses held the man who had done the shooting, sent for officers and took the wounded man to the hospital, believed at the time to be in serious condition.

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LINDY ON VERGE OF MATRIMONIAL TAKE OFF ON HOP ANNIVERSARY

NORTH HAVEN, Me., May 20 (UP)—The second anniversary of the start of his epochal New York to Paris flight found Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh today approaching another take off—this time into matrimony.

Just as the eyes of the world were focussed upon him on May 20, 1927, so was the center of the news spotlight today, for all the world loves a lover, and, as everybody knows, the Colonel is planning to marry Miss Anne Morrow sometime, somewhere, soon.

As Colonel Lindbergh quietly reflected that two years had elapsed since he flew to fame in the "Spirit of St. Louis", residents of this little island town continued to speculate over the air idol's wedding plans.

ZION-CARMEL TUNNEL ROAD SOON TO OPEN

Unique Mountain Engineering Feat in Utah to Be Completed in Summer; Two-way Tunnel 1 1/2 Miles Long.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah — A giant stereoscope—whose lenses are side galleries from a 1 1/2-mile two-way tunnel, high on the side of an unscalable mountain, and whose "views" consist of six observation galleries, which look out over colorful vistas of Zion National Park—is to be put into use this summer with the opening of the new Zion-Carmel highway in southern Utah.

The new automobile highway, which is being built by the United States Bureau of Public Roads and the State of Utah, will connect Grand Canyon, Bryce Canyon and Zion National Parks, the Kaibab Forest and Cedar Breaks. It is estimated that the electrically illuminated tunnel section, with its 200,000 a mile, is estimated to cost approximately \$2,000,000. It is estimated that the big buses which serve the region will reduce their running time one half by the use of the new road giving tourists more leisure in the national parks as they pass through.

Some of the engineering problems encountered in the building of the tunnel called for new precedents in the manner of their solution. Since no human being had ever been at either point where the tunnel was to emerge from the mountain side, these points being high on the unscalable side of a mountain surveying could not be done in the usual way. Neither could engineers reach the top of the mountain to do their surveying. The difficulty was solved, however, by resorting to "triangulation," and the tunnel was surveyed without the engineers going near the mountain through which the bore was to run—Christian Science Monitor.

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HOLDUP NETS \$86,800 FOR THREE BANDITS

\$6,800 Cash, \$80,000 Checks in Loot of Bandits Who Leave Money Car Bullet-Ridden.

TWO GUARDS ARE SHOT

\$5,000 Reward is Offered for Machine Gun Murderers Dead or Alive.

SAN DIEGO, May 20 (UP)—Spurred on by the \$5,000 reward offered by Wirt G. Bowman, president of the corporation owning the Agua Caliente resort, for the capture of the bandits dead or alive, 125 police officers guarded all exits from San Diego tonight.

SAN DIEGO, May 20 (UP)—The most intensive man-hunt of recent years in this vicinity was organized today in an effort to capture three young bandits who killed two guards of the fashionable Agua Caliente "money car" near here shortly afternoon and escaped with \$86,800 in cash and \$80,000 in checks.

The small automobile in which the bandits rode from the scene of the robbery was found abandoned on the outskirts of San Diego and a man told officers he saw three men transfer to another machine. Eye witnesses to the daring holdup and others who saw the robbers in flight said the men were between 25 and 30 years of age.

Use Machine Gun Two women, Mrs. D. C. Handley of Chula Vista and Mrs. John Stanley of National City, who were driving a short distance behind the bandits, gave officers a description of the holdup.

According to their story, one of the bandits stepped out of the running board of his automobile as the "money car" was approaching. He started pumping bullets into the resort automobile from a machine gun, it was said.

When the Agua Caliente car stopped, the man ran around the side and shot the two guards with a revolver, it was said.

The two women stopped their automobile when the shooting started, they said, but when the bandits fled after securing their loot, the women followed for a mile before the robbers eluded them.

The robbers took their guns with them when they transferred machines but left a roll of dimes, some ropes and a box of red pepper behind. It was believed that they had first planned to blind the guards with the red pepper, but later decided to use the surer method of machine gun and revolver bullets.

The abandoned automobile was identified by a San Diego garage-man as a car stolen a few days ago.

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He Threatened Suicide Unless Wife Made Better Living, Claim

A husband who threatened to commit suicide unless his wife made a better living for them has been found, according to the complaint of a recent applicant for divorce through district court here.

Because his wife would not buy him an automobile it is alleged in the complaint, filed yesterday, the husband went and turned on the gas and was saved from death just in time by his wife.

Not only did this husband refuse to earn the living, but he spent on himself money she gave him to pay their bills with, and then told her nothing about it, according to the charges in the suit for divorce.
