NEVADA WHEAT CROP IS SMALL
RENO, Nev., May 20. (UP)—Nevada's wheat crop for 1925 will total approximately 2,800 tons, according to a report issued by the United States department of agriculture. The acreage is estimated at 4,000 acres.
In 1928 the crop amounted to 3,100 tons which was harvested from 4,000 acres.
On May 1 the report estimated that 22,000 tons or three per cent of the 1928 crop remained on Nevada farms. The condition of hay was estimated at 80 per cent of normal on May 1 as compared with a rating of 82 per cent last year.
