Las Vegas To Have 100-Ton Custom Mill

Modern Flotation Plant To Be Built Nearby in 90 Days, Say Foster & Thomas.

Machinery On Ground Mill To Make Possible Bigger Exploitation of District's Mines.

Foster & Thomas are now building a 100 ton flotation plant at Potosi mine, and half of the machinery is already on the ground, and advices from Los Angeles by the Western Machinery Company state that final 1 set of all equipment will be completed Monday.

It is planned to have the mill in operation within the month of June. Dr. O. D. Thomas, senior member of the firm of Foster & Thomas, has been in this vicinity quietly lining up contracts for the past ten weeks.

Dr. Thomas makes his headquarters at the Gateway hotel and advises that Foster & Thomas is particularly interested in developers of small properties, and will be glad to talk with those having any holdings of ore.

Dr. O. D. Thomas was one of the organizers of the Bureau of Mines in San Diego and Imperial counties and Lower California districts.

Mr. Foster and Mr. Thomas spent Friday with Union Pacific officials in making selection of proper site for terminal facilities here.

Ore from within a radius of a hundred miles which is now being discarded because of smelter penalties due to the complexity of the ore will be milled here by the new plant this increasing greatly the productivity of the mines of the district, in the ultimate.

39-Room Hotel Finished Soon

Proprietor to Open McDonald Hotel Soon after First; 25 Rooms with Baths.

The new 39-room two-story McDonald hotel at 209-211 North Fifth, will be ready to open for business on or shortly after June 1, according to plans of A. H. McDonald, proprietor, who is owner of the Roosevelt hotel at Twenty-seventh and Hill in Los Angeles, and who will run the hotel here personally, it is believed.

The structure will have twenty-five rooms with shower baths and the remainder will have wash basins and "pubic" baths, all those on the south side having showers.

The building, which is said to have cost \$600,000 or \$650,000, is of frame and stucco construction, and is 116 feet long and 60 feet wide. It will be steam heated, and has modern plumbing throughout.

The construction of this building was begun March 14.

Foundation For New Sullivan Building Begun

Pouring of Concrete for Addition to New Post Office Will Start This Week.

P. J. Sullivan will start pouring cement today or tomorrow for the foundation of his one-story, "five-story" building to be constructed adjoining the new postoffice building at First and Carson, just completed by him.

The preliminary work is virtually completed and Sullivan, who has been in the contracting business here for some time, is doing the construction himself.

The building will have 100 foot frontage on Carson street and will be 70 feet deep. It will be so constructed that one or two more stories can be built on later when the growth of the city warrants the expansion, according to Sullivan.

The building will be in the same style of architecture as the new postoffice building, except that it will not have the heavy joists. The foundation and columns will be strong enough for additional stories, however, and the front will be plate glass.

The building will be completed about the middle of August or September 1, said Sullivan, and it will be occupied immediately, several of the spaces already having been spoken for.

Firms negotiating for leases on the spaces include a shoe company, a drug store, a delicatessen, an ice cream manufacturing company, a meat market and a barber shop. Leo McNamee will have charge of the leasing of the building.

Two of the stores will have 25 foot fronts, one will have 20 feet and the other two will have 15 feet.

John H. Sullivan, of Glendale, California, cousin of the owner-contractor, is doing the architectural work for the building, which is of reinforced concrete and stucco.

County Jail Has 'House Cleaning'

Two Prisoners Taken To State Prison, One to Ogden, and One Released.

The county jail had a "house cleaning" Sunday morning, according to the term used yesterday by Undersheriff R. G. McCubrey.

New Style Fraud Is Perpetrated

Mrs. H. M. Delkin, jeweler, has unearthed a fraud of a new style in this vicinity. Though not a direct financial loser by the fraud, Mrs. Delkin is much disturbed by the discourtesy to her patrons which the matter falsely indicates.

Twenty or thirty peremptory notices from the United States Credit Bureau, Los Angeles, were sent to Las Vegas people demanding immediate payments of accounts alleged to be due to Mrs. Delkin.

Investigation by Mrs. Delkin indicates that some unscrupulous solicitor for the credit bureau had turned in a list of fictitious accounts for the purpose of collecting a percentage from the bureau.

The United States Credit Bureau on being notified of the matter wired today to Mrs. Delkin stating that they will write letters of apology to all those to whom the phony notices were sent and state they are making further investigations.

Mrs. Delkin is much troubled by the unwarranted use of her name in such a manner and wishes the people of Las Vegas to know that she is in no wise responsible, but is the principal sufferer in the matter.

Ann Morrow and Lindbergh Wed

Only Immediate Members of Family Are Present at Very Quiet Ceremony

ENGLEWOOD, N. J. May 27 (UP)—Miss Anne Morrow and Col. Charles A. Lindbergh were married at 4 p. m. today at the Morrow home here.

The couple left immediately in a motor car for an unannounced destination.

Only immediate members of the family attended the ceremony, Miss Morrow was not attended by any bridesmaid and Lindbergh had no best man it was said by the secretary of Ambassador Dwight W. Morrow after the ceremony.

The announcement came so unexpectedly as to catch friends of the family and newspapermen off guard. There had been no signs of unusual activity at the home of the Morricks, but there was no intimation that the ceremony was to take place this afternoon.

It had been rumored for several weeks that the arrival of Ambassador Morrow from Mexico City would be followed closely by the announcement of the date and place for the wedding.

Most friends of the family, however, believed elaborate preparation would be made and that a large number of prominent guests would be invited to the ceremony.

It was considered possible that Lindbergh and his bride may be en route to the Morrow summer home at North Haven, Me., a seahorefront had believed the wedding might be held.

The ambassador, however, remained as silent as his son-in-law about the wedding plans. When met at the train yesterday, he gave no intimation that the wedding of his fier, "I have absolutely nothing to say."

Marriage License Mark Falls Again

Fisher Plans For Boulevard

Property Owner Suggests One Hundred Foot Width For Charleston Blvd.

M. J. C. Fisher of St. Louis, who with his family has been spending the winter in Hollywood, makes the timely suggestion that Charleston Boulevard should be made to fit its name and be converted into a real boulevard one hundred feet in width.

In the following letter, Mr. Fisher goes back to somewhat ancient history to recall to our minds the first futile attempt to open Charleston boulevard to a width of only 60 feet:

"On the 3rd of April, 1913, I received from the District Attorney, O. J. Van Pelt, the following letter: 'Dear Sir: 'Enclosed herewith for your signature, find grant of right of way to Clark county. The County of Clark has established a public road through your property (Charleston Blvd.), running along the Section line thereof, thirty feet on each side of the section line, and is making arrangements to build and maintain a good public road which is needed in the section of the County where your property is located, and which, when completed, will greatly enhance the value of your property. 'The County did not condemn the property, as all owners who reside here have expressed a willingness to give the County a grant of right of way, provided the County will use the same as a public highway and will build and maintain a public road over the right of way granted to it. The property owners who reside here have been before the Board of County Commissioners for the past year, urging the County Commissioners to establish a good road through their property, and I trust that the non-resident land owners whose property will be benefited by reason of a good road, will cooperate with those who are residents here, and assist all they can in getting a good road through this part of the County. 'Please sign the enclosed deed before a Notary Public and return at your earliest convenience to this office. 'Yours very truly, 'O. J. VAN PELT. 'District Attorney.'

"I signed a deed for 30 feet, one mile long, on the condition following: 'Provided, however, that the land herein conveyed is to be used as a public highway, and if discontinued or abandoned by the grantee, the exclusive enjoyment reverts to the grantor, his heirs and assigns. 'I do not know whether Mr. Ladd, and others whose property adjoins mine in Section 2, gave 30 feet as I did, but the fact is the County has never established this road and the rights granted have been forfeited. 'While the City Planning Commission is trying to work out plans for the future development of Las Vegas, it seems to me that Charleston Boulevard is a very important link in the chain. 'I think this boulevard should be 100 feet wide, and I will make my contribution of 50 feet, if other property owners will do likewise. 'I called the attention of Mr. Ferron, Chairman of the Planning Commission to this, and I hope you will aid him by publishing this letter. 'Yours truly, 'J. C. FISHER.'

Time Changes For Passenger Trains Given

Excess Fares for L. A. Limited to Be Banned When Schedule Is Altered.

New Lineup June 9 Arrival, Departure Times Will Change Hinman Case Today or Tomorrow

The scheduled time for five of the eight passenger train stops in Las Vegas will be changed on June 9, it has been announced by officials of the Union Pacific.

Also, excess fares, now charged on the Los Angeles limited, Nos. 7 and 8, will be withdrawn, rates to be the same as on other trains, according to Trainmaster A. J. Tompkins.

The westbound trains which now arrive in Las Vegas at 3:30 a. m. and 5 p. m. and the eastbound trains which arrive at 5:10 a. m. and 9:25 p. m. and 11 a. m. will have their schedules changed. The others will remain the same as at present.

Number 7, the Los Angeles limited, westbound, will arrive at 10:40 p. m. as now, and leave at 10:50 p. m.

Number 8, Los Angeles limited, eastbound, will arrive at 3:45 a. m. and leave at 3:55 a. m. as at present.

Number 21, formerly 25, Pacific Coast limited, westbound, will arrive at 8:35 p. m. and leave at 9:05 p. m. as at present. The remainder will be changed:

Number 22, formerly 28, Pacific Coast limited, eastbound, will arrive at 6:05 a. m. instead of 5:10 a. m., and will leave at 6:15 a. m.

No. 30, formerly Gold Coast 28, now Continental limited, eastbound, will arrive at 8:05 p. m. instead of 9:25 p. m., and will leave at 8:15 p. m.

Number 4, local, or Utah Express, eastbound, will arrive at 11:10 a. m. instead of 11 a. m., and will leave at 11:40 a. m., allowing time for lunch as there is no diner on this train.

No. 3 changed Number 3, local, or Utah Express, westbound, will arrive at 2:30 p. m. instead of 5 p. m., and will leave at 3 p. m., allowing 30 minutes for dinner, for there is no diner.

There are chair cars, fourists and standard sleepers on all but Numbers 7 and 8, there are observation cars on all but Numbers 3 and 4, and there are diners on all except Numbers 3 and 4, according to the trainmaster.

Letters addressed to Chief Cook, Chief Clerk, Clerk and Chief of Structural Iron, Boulder Dam, have "Boulder Dam Railway," "Las Vegas," also missives addressed via Los Angeles, Las Vegas, California, Las Vegas Colorado, Las Vegas, Arizona, and so forth.

Construction Foreman, Boulder Dam; Steam Shovel Foreman, Boulder Dam; To the postmaster of this office, Las Vegas Post Office, Reno, Nevada," are some others. The one which takes the cake, according to Griffith, is as follows: "Midland, Texas, Kind Postmaster: Have you time to spend a moment to drop me a line I want to come out there I seen where that boulder dam passed in the courts in Jan but they didn't say when they would start it I also heard it would be close to your town. Please write if you no any thing about it where they will start to work I am writing the chamber of commerce of your town but didn't whether you had one or not so I decided to write you hope I haven't taken up too much of your time and thanking you—"

Letter writers should spell out the "Nevada" in the address, Fred Wilson, of the post office, pointed out, for "Nev" often is mistaken for New Mexico's abbreviation, or "Neb."

Eyes of Vegas On Harmon as Case Is Studied

District Attorney To Give Decision on Hinman Case Action in Several Days

While a continuous succession of callers streams into the court house to confer with District Attorney Harley A. Harmon during office hours, the eyes of Las Vegas are upon the district attorney and Las Vegas is waiting to hear what sort of charges, if any, A. A. Hinman will face as a result of having been caught in a compromising position with a woman from the red light district and accused by her, in a sworn statement, of criminal conduct.

District Attorney Harmon is still delving into all angles of the case and promises a written statement within a few days, in which the stand to be taken by his office will be set forth.

The local attorney has no comment to make for public consumption among the fact that Chief of Police Percy Nash and Officer Tom Ginnocchio found him in his law office at 2:30 a. m. Friday with a woman from the "Red Front," with but little wearing apparel and the woman bruised and covered with marks which she alleged to have been made by him.

Officials are continuing to investigate the circumstances surrounding the meeting of Hinman and the woman on Thursday night, their taxi-ride to the Clark building, and the happenings in the locked room in the presence of the liquor bottle and the loaded automatic.

What the outcome of the affair will be depends very largely upon the stand taken by District Attorney Harmon.

Post Office Box Changes Announced

Changes in the numbers and order of boxes at the new postoffice are among the fact that Postmaster Robert B. Griffith, who is consummating plans for the shifting of the office to its new home on First and Carson Streets.

The furnishings will be entirely new, made to order in San Francisco, according to post office specifications, said Griffith. The boxes will be the most modern key-locking boxes, and a maximum of three keys will be allowed each box owner.

There will be 815 boxes, and they will be numbered progressively, some numbers being omitted, but with numerical progression for those of each section within the section.

Griffith expressed a desire to remove the public letters postoffice mailer at the postoffice upto 8:15 p. m., and still go out the same night. The mail boxes at the depot will not hold all the mail which is posted after six, and that is the reason for the extension of time for delivery, he stated.

Saturday, June 1, patrons will walk into the lobby of the new building for stamps and mail, instead of the present office. The present post office site will be divided into two or three store spaces, by the new owner, Robert B. Griffith, the corner one to be occupied by a cigar store.
