

### **DELEGATION SAYS DAM BILL WILL TAKE AWAY CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHTS**

Tri-State Conference at Washington, D. C., Closes With Arizona Definitely Out of Tri-State Pact; Refuses to Include Gila River in Provisions of Agreement.

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)-With the contentions of all factions set forth fully, the tri-state Boulder Dam negotiations closed their sessions here tonight. Arizona had announced that she had never and would

never include the Gila River in the pact provisions. She asserted that the Swing-Johnson bill and the Seven State Pact would take away her constitutional rights and the use of the Colorado River. She declared that the Gila River should be free from Mexican burden. The Califorda delegation had quoted President Hoover as authority that the Gila River must be included as a tributary to the Colorado River. Nevada contended that the Gila River should be subject to Mexican burden.
