NEW YORK, June 5.—(U.P.)—A group of 24 business men, including Thomas A. Edison and Henry Ford, has issued "a message to the American people urging support of President Hoover in his plea to give prohibition a fair trial."

The message was issued yesterday by the Rev. Charles Stetzel, mentioning Mr. Hoover's law-enforcement program, the message said: "Our whole system of self-government will crumble either if they elect what laws they would enforce of citizens elect what laws they will obey. There would be little traffic in illegal liquor if only criminals patronized it. We must awake to the fact that this patronage from large numbers of law-abiding citizens is applying the rewards and stimulating crime. We believe that prohibition should be given an honest trial, that it was enacted for the protection of the American home and that the moral force of the country is behind President Hoover in his endeavor to combat those forces which are attempting to frustrate that effort. Let us give the 18th amendment an honest chance for complete enforcement."

Spinsters Boost Business For French Matrimonial Agencies

REYNOLDS PACKARD United Press Staff Correspondent PARIS, June 5.—(U.P.)—Matrimonial agencies in France are making fortunes these days attempting to procure nuptial felicity at moderate fees for great numbers of French spinsters. According to an estimate just published there are 2,000,000 or so more women than men of marriageable age in this country.

The number of marriage bureaus in France has increased five times since before the war while advertisements regarding farm implements, pigs, cattle and horses in the country newspapers and magazines are being crowded out with appeals for mates. In the larger cities, including Paris, periodicals devoted entirely to the finding of matrimonial partners are enjoying tremendous sales.

These magazines in Paris are as a rule of saucy appearance. The cover generally portrays a smiling bride in gorgeous costume, holding a huge bouquet of flowers, or a happy mother playing with her children while a handsome and tender husband hovers close at hand. The advertisements are a strange admixture of sentimentality and finance, in which the girl describes her ideal and adds that she has a house, a farm, or several thousand francs for a dowry. Two such magazines in Paris are entitled "Hymen" and "Marriage."

The matrimonial agencies are now being managed with great skill and subtlety. Some of them give dances and parties to which men are invited, not knowing that they are to be appraised as prospective husbands. If marriages result from such maneuvers, the agency receives a commission based on the financial value of

Each Match. If a girl does not secure a husband she is obliged to pay a small fee for the experiment.

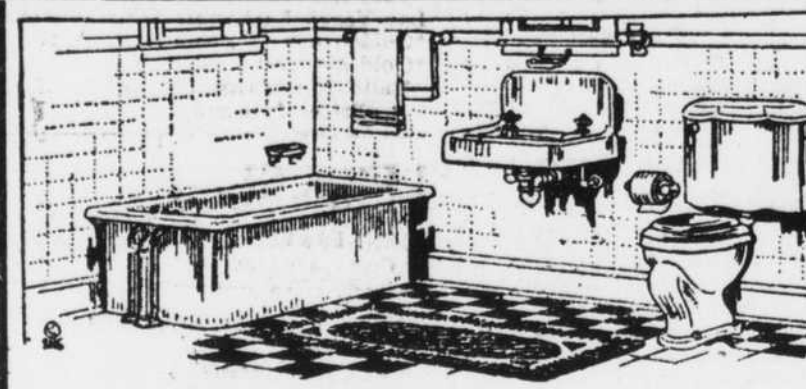
Other agencies maintain lists of eligible men and arrange private meetings between the couple or else carry the affair through to a finish much the same as a lawyer might settle a case out of court. But the advertising method is by far the most popular. It entails little expense and practically no embarrassment since the letter writing is carried on under fictitious names until an understanding is reached.

Typical advertisements in the Parisian journals are the following: "Lonesome blonde, aged 29, with 50,000 francs, seeks a serious man, any age, of good character, who might make her happy in marriage."

"Intelligent brunette, speaks forty, with a home in the country, would be disposed to consider marriage with a retired businessman. He must be fond of music and like children."

"Intelligent brunette, speaks English would like to have correspondence with an American with view to marriage."

The advertisements in the farm journals in the provinces are more practical. In these, the parents generally bluntly state the dowry, saying they will marry their daughter to an experienced farmer. Many of the rural "ads" specify that the applicants must be religious, pious and handy at milking cows. Often the prospective husbands must show their worth by working on the farm several months before getting the daughter in marriage and the dowry in compensation.

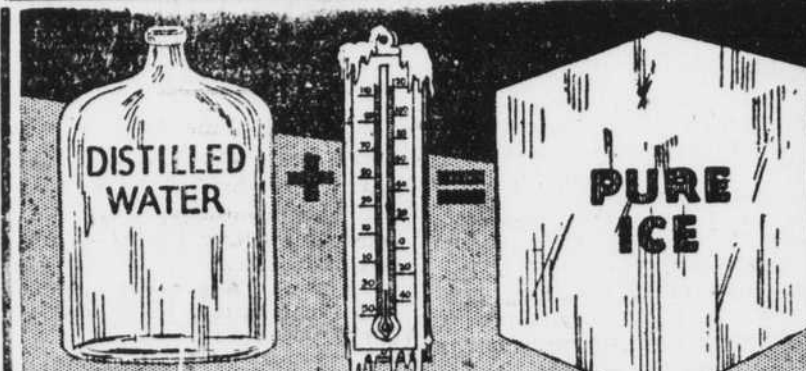


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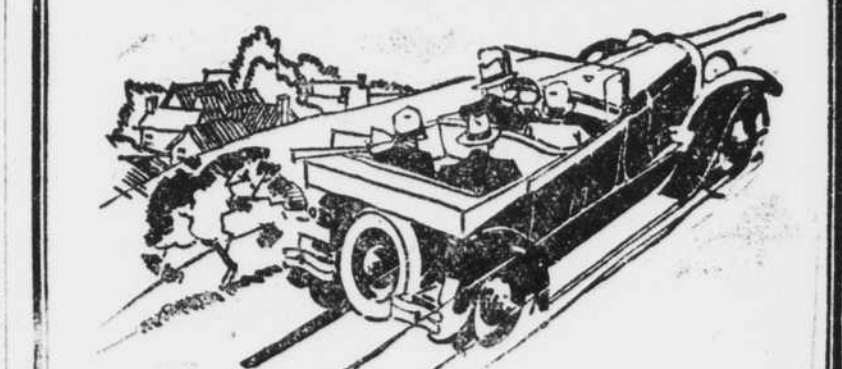

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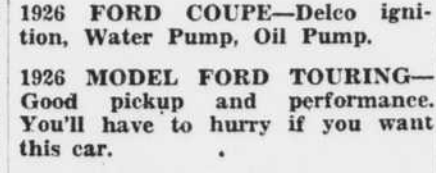
