**Pursel Visits Carrara Mines**

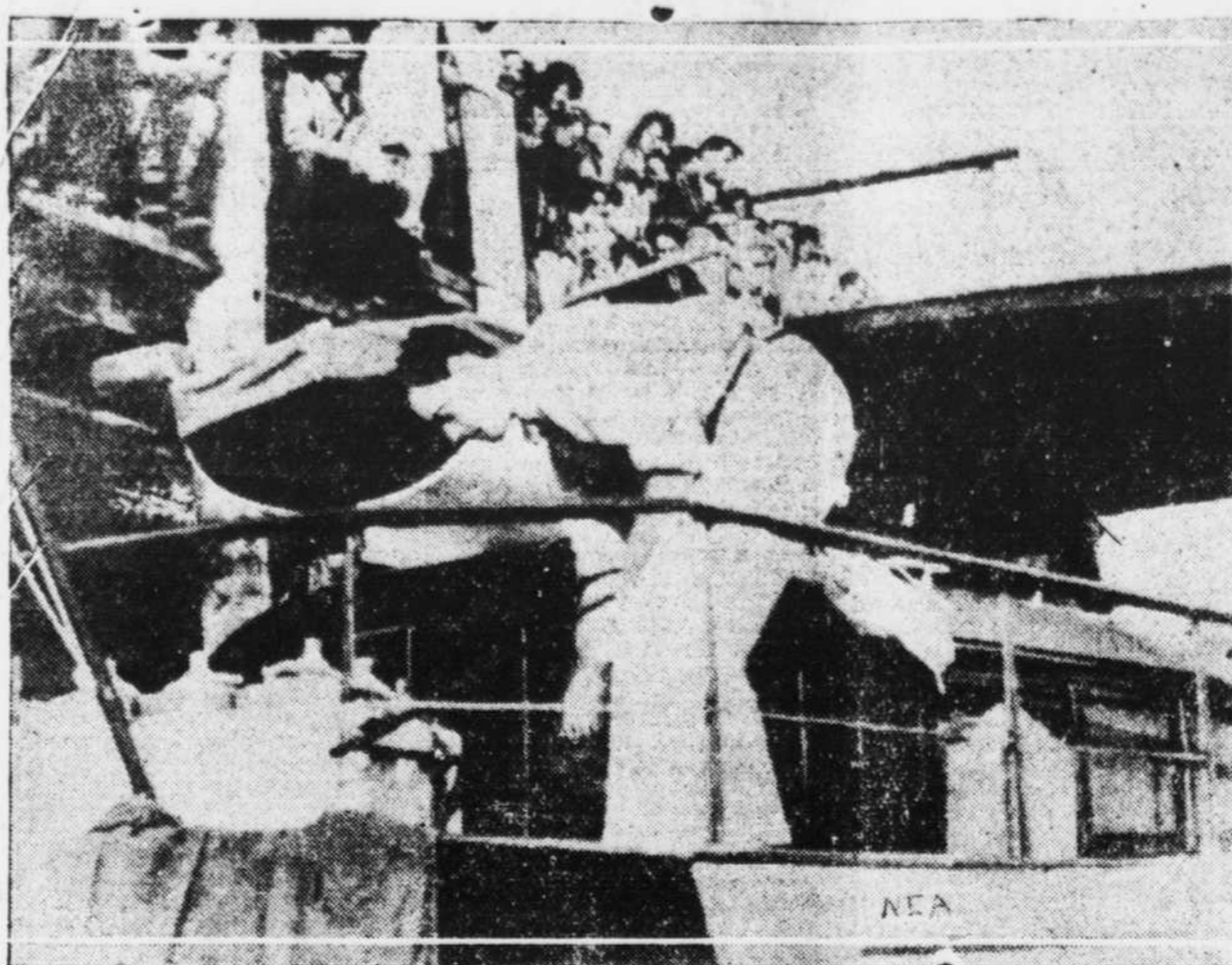
H. H. Pursel, prominent mining man, and Mrs. Pursel are in Vegas for a few days, having arrived Saturday morning.

**Long Hair Has Not Come Back, This Year's Beauty 'Pageant' Indicates**

**GALVESTON, Tex., June 10.** (UP)—Long hair hasn't come back—decidedly not! Nor do gentlemen if artists, sculptors and the like may be called that—take to the cuddlesome blondes.

For a composite of the entries for this year's International pageant of Pulchritude to open here today along Galveston's famous seawall boulevard indicates that a brunette with short locks, slightly above medium height and tending to staidness rather than cuteness will be "Miss Universe" of 1929.

Galveston has already welcomed eight Europeans and found them differing only linguistically from the short-haired, short-skirted girls one sees in America. Only two were blondes—Engelbord Grähne, Miss Germany; and Germaine Laborde, Miss France. The others—Rosario Valazquez, Miss Spain; Magda Demetresou, Miss Roumania; Lise Goldarbeiter, Miss Austria; Benny Bicks, Miss England; and Ketty Hipp, Miss Luxemburg, and

ohanna Koopmann, Miss Holland—all being brunettes as are Senorita Olga Bergimini De Sa, Miss Brazil and Consuelo Boujilosa, Miss Cuba.

There are slightly more than 40 entries this year with some 20 states and 10 American cities represented.

Pageant events proper include two parades, one today in sport frocks and afternoon in costumes and the other tomorrow in bathing costumes. Monday and Tuesday night two big stage shows are to be held at city auditorium at which internationally known judges will pick winners. Wednesday night a banquet in honor of the new Miss Universe will be held.

Lawn fetes, boat rides, teas, balls and other entertainments have been arranged for the girls while they are here.
