Woodard's New Garage Planned

Two-Story Structure Will Be Built within Few Months at Fifth and Clark; More Storage Space Assured.

Plans for J. Warren Woodard's new \$20,000 two-story building to be erected within the next few months at Fifth and Clark are rapidly taking shape. A. L. Worswick, Las Vegas architect, is drawing up the plans for the structure, which, it is planned, will be one of the finest buildings in the city.

The new building will furnish much more storage space than is available at the present plant on east Fremont, most of the second floor being devoted to storing of cars, it is planned.

There will be also a Duco plant and possibly an auto top shop on the second floor. It is planned, the lower floor being devoted to sales room, stock room, office and service department.

There will be a four-pump service station, with driveway "cut into" the corner of the building.

The building will be of reinforced concrete, probably of Gothic architecture, and probably will have neon signs.

Woodard has the Goodyear tire and Pennzoil agencies, besides that of Chevrolet.

Shoot to Be Big Event in Elks' Convention Here

Lodge Men From Country Over Expected to Take Part in Contest for Array of Prizes July 4, 5 and 6.

Elks from all over the United States will take part in the trap shoot to be staged here during the Elks' convention July 4, 5 and 6, according to Leonard Blood, manager of the program for the Nevada conclave.

Lodges in every state have been invited to participate, and many stopping over, on their way to the national convention in Los Angeles, because of the interest in Boulder Dam, are expected to contest for some of the prizes to be offered for the shoot.

There will be four grand prizes, which will be on display at M. W. Davis' jewelry store in the near future. The first prize trophy will be a silver Elk's head with fourteen-inch antler spread, mounted on an ebony plaque. The second will be similar, with an eight-inch antler spread, and third and fourth prizes will be large silver loving cups.

There will be 40 additional individual medals and a number of cash prizes.

The shooting will start the first day of the convention and continue each of the three mornings of the festivities, the prizes to be presented on the last day, Saturday, July 6, according to Blood.

The trap shoot will be but one feature of the entertainment being planned. Ball games, wrestling and boxing will be other sports on the schedule, it is planned.

Helping the Homemaker

MENUS FOR A DAY

- Breakfast**
Chilled Grapefruit
Poached Eggs
Buttered Toast Coffee
- Luncheon**
Mixed Egg and Pickle Sandwiches
Iced Tea Sugar Cookies
- Dinner**
Spinach Timbales and Cheese Sauce
Bread Peach Jam
Vegetable Salad
Strawberry Pie with Meringue
Coffee

- Spinach Timbales**
2 cups chopped spinach
1/2 teaspoon sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon paprika
2 eggs

Beat the eggs and add the rest of the ingredients. Pour into buttered timbales or small patty pans. Set in a pan of hot water and bake in a moderate oven for 25 minutes. Unmod and surround with hard cooked eggs and cheese sauce.

- Cheese Sauce**
3 tablespoons butter
4 tablespoons flour
2 cups milk
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon paprika
1/2 teaspoon celery salt
1-3 cup cheese, grated or finely cut

Melt the butter and add the flour. Blend well and add the milk and cook until a creamy sauce forms. Add the rest of the ingredients. Cook slowly and stir constantly, until the cheese has melted. Serve at once.

- Strawberry Pie, with Meringue**
1 baked pie shell
2 cups strawberry, washed and hulled

- 1/2 cup sugar
2 tablespoons flour
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 egg whites, stiffly beaten
4 tablespoons confectioner's sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Mix the egg whites, confectioner's sugar and vanilla Beat until creamy. Spread on top the berries which have been mixed with the sugar, flour, lemon juice and salt and place in the baked pie shell. Bake in a slow oven for 12 minutes. Serve cold.

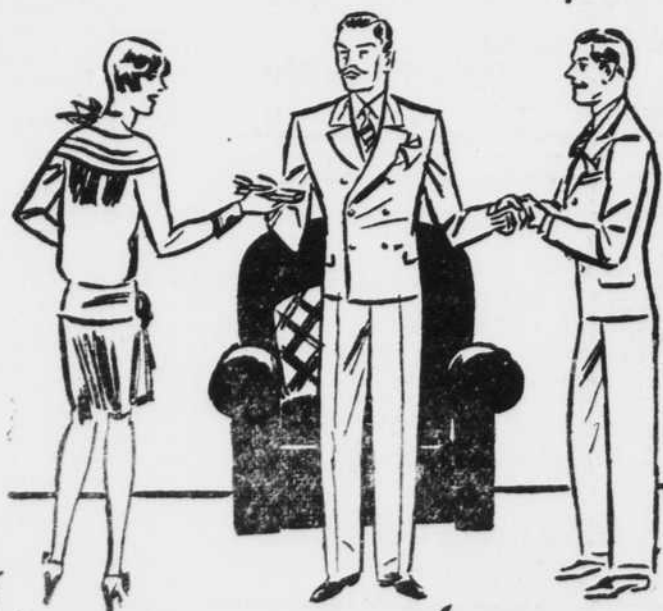
