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Law Enforcement Move of Hoover Gains Support

Delegation Visits President to Pledge Aid in Seeking to Make Prohibition Measure More Effective.

A delegation of ministers and ruling elders of the Presbyterian church called at the White House and promised loyal support.

Mayor Lodge of Detroit said federal authorities have had and will continue to have complete cooperation from Detroit police although he declared lives must not be endangered by prohibition shootings.

Peculiar Actions Get Man Jailed

He did not resist arrest, having been found crouching behind some boxes, according to the officers.

LOS ANGELES, June 19. (AP)—William Loren Tallman, handsome operator, was named as the murderer of Mrs. Virginia Patty in a grand jury indictment returned here late yesterday.

The true bill supplanted a district attorney's warrant sworn out the day Mrs. Patty's body was found hanging in a clothes closet in the Chamber apartments.

Tallman has been sought by authorities all over the Pacific coast since he escaped from the S. S. Admiral Benson after the death of Mrs. Patty was discovered.

Mead and Arentz To Visit Valley

Hope to Secure Aid of Government in Conserving Water and Increasing Production in Moapa Valley.

Congressman Samuel S. Arentz, who for some years has been advocating the construction of a reclamation project in the Moapa Valley, will accompany Dr. Mead to that region probably Sunday.

Dr. Elwood Mead, commissioner of reclamation, contemplates a trip to the Muddy Valley during his visit in Las Vegas, to examine these valley lands, to learn first hand how an adequate water supply may be obtained and to what extent drainage must be carried on to bring back to production water-logged lands.

Congressman Arentz has long had this important project in mind and believes that Dr. Mead will, through a personal examination of the land, add his great experience to a solution of these problems.

Congressman Arentz, a member of the committee on Irrigation and Reclamation believes in Federal aid to such projects as the Muddy Valley lands present. Should Commissioner Mead recommend the creation of a Federal irrigation district in the Muddy Valley Congressman Arentz can be counted on to do his utmost to pass the necessary legislation and obtain an appropriation to carry on the project.

In an interview today, Congressman Arentz said "The farms in the Muddy Valley are an essential adjunct to the Greater Las Vegas that is to be. People must eat, and all the vegetables and fruit, grain and hay, live stock and dairy products raised in the Muddy Valley are necessary to the prosperity of Las Vegas."

Interior Dep't Executive Here

Mr. W. H. DuPuy, executive assistant to the Secretary of the Interior in charge of publicity, was in Las Vegas all day Tuesday gathering information to serve as a basis for publicity concerning Las Vegas and Boulder Dam.

Mr. DuPuy was a guest at the meeting of the Chamber of Commerce luncheon Tuesday noon, after which he was taken to the Black Canyon Dam site by Jim Cashman in automobile and boat. On his return he conferred with a number of Las Vegas men and was given the Las Vegas idea of the dam highway and other features pertaining to the project which touch the interests of the city.

Arrangements were made to supply file for the use of Mr. DuPuy's department, containing photographs and written and printed matter which he may give out for the use of eastern newspapers.

Lindy on Job as 'Safe Airplane' Contest Trustee

Pair of Newlyweds Make First Public Appearance Since Honeymoon Cruise, Take Flight Together.

MITCHELL FIELD, N. Y., June 19.—(AP)—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh made his first public appearance as a husband and provider today when he arrived here "on the job" as a trustee of the Guggenheim Aeronautics Fund to see the beginning of the fund's \$150,000 "safe airplane" competition.

His bride of less than a month, the former Anne Morrow, arrived at the field with him, and they had not been here long before they took their first "duo" flight together since courtship days in Mexico City.

Lindy flew first. Lindbergh went up alone first, however. He was giving out an interview in the field offices when he saw through a window a Brunner-Winkle monoplane, the first entry to the competition, being wheeled from a hangar. That terminated the interview. In a few moments Lindy, goggles and hatless, was circling the field in the new plane, while Mrs. Lindbergh gazed upward from an automobile.

He descended after a five minute flight and hurried to the car where a domestic consultation took place. A result of this was soon apparent. Lindy borrowed helmet, jacket and parachute. He paced his bride in a Curtis-Façon two-seater and adjusted her parachute. A moment later he climbed in and they were off.

Pose For Pictures. They took only a short flight of about fifteen minutes. The newlyweds, just back from their honeymoon along the Maine coast, made no effort to conceal their happiness and high spirits and even posed for photographers beside the plane.

They left the field in a closed car for New York. Lindy's reply to the only personal question "by the way, Colonel, where are you living now?" just before his departure, was a broad grin.

Open Sessions Rule Is Passed By U. S. Senate

WASHINGTON, June 19.—(AP)—After 140 years of secret executive sessions, the senate entered today upon a new rule providing for the consideration of presidential nominations and treaties with foreign countries in the open.

A rule expressing this change of policy and providing a formula for working it out was adopted yesterday by a vote of 80 to 3. It will have its first application late today when, just before the senate starts on a two weeks' recess, it will confirm recent nominations sent to it by President Hoover.

Although the battle against the old secrecy system was launched as far back as 1895, it was not until exclusive publication last January by the United Press of a secret senate roll call of the nomination of Former Secretary of Interior Roy O. West, that a concerted movement was started.

Senator Wesley L. Jones, assistant republican leader then introduced an amendment to abolish secret sessions. This languished on the table until more recently the United Press published the secret vote on confirmation of Former Senator Irvine L. Lenroot to be judge of the United States court of customs appeal.

The Lenroot publication caused a senatorial investigation during which the senate rules committee unanimously questioned Paul B. Stewards, W. W. Cogswell and H. G. Marsh.

The new rule, framed by Senator Robinson of Arkansas, democratic floor leader, provides all executive business shall be considered in open session, unless a single senator objects, if seconded, his objection automatically will close the doors of the senate and then the senate will vote as to whether it should keep the doors closed. A majority can decide the issue in any case.

Friends of the publicity movement say it will prevent secret sessions except in rare cases.

A \$15 a month increase in the library budget makes possible a raise of the librarian's salary from \$30 a month to \$75, it was reported yesterday, after passage of the ordinance for same by the city commissioners.

June 22, at 10 a. m. is the time set for the taking up of the ornamental lighting ordinance passed recently by the city commissioners. Objections will come before the council at that time, if there are any; the ordinance will go into effect at that time if there are none.
