LAS VEGAS WELCOMES OFFICIALS

LAS VEGAS RENO AIR LINE TO START SOON AS FIELD READY HERE

Nevada Airline Will Start on Regular Schedule in a Few Weeks, Says Boggs

Regular airplane service between Las Vegas and Reno will be started as soon as the new Las Vegas Nevada airport is completed, which it is expected will be within two or three weeks.

C. Ray Boggs, president of Nevada Airlines, Inc., which company will initiate the service, made this statement to the Age late yesterday during a brief visit in this city with Capt. Roscoe Turner, manager of operations for the company.

Regardless of whether or not the privilege of carrying the mail is granted, the service will be started, Boggs said. Although, for the time being at least, no mail contract will be granted Boggs' company, it is possible that permission to carry the mail between here and Reno will be granted without contract.

The seeking of a conference with Senator Oddie in regard to this possibility motivated Boggs' trip to Las Vegas yesterday from Carrara. Senator Oddie had not as yet arrived in this city, however, and Boggs stated he would return some time today to see the Senator in Las Vegas. He returned to Carrara last night by plane with Captain Turner.

L. A. Line Grows
The line which was started by Nevada Airlines, Inc., between Reno and Los Angeles, the "divorce special," as it was dubbed by Los Angeles newspapers, since its start May 15 has grown from a tri-weekly service into daily service according to Boggs, and now six trips are made each week each way between the two cities.

The service between Las Vegas and Reno will be inaugurated on a two-or-three-times-a-week basis, with Lockheed-Vega monoplanes having capacity for four passengers. The company owns three such planes, which are to be used on the two lines, according to Boggs.

The fare from Las Vegas to Reno will be \$50, with no reduction for round trips, Boggs stated, and planes will probably connect with the Los Angeles-Reno line east-bound. The schedule will depend entirely upon demands, and on whether or not the mail-carrying privilege is granted, said Boggs.

The plane probably will leave Reno at 1 p. m., immediately after the arrival there of the plane which left Los Angeles at 9 that morning. It is expected to reach Las Vegas at 4 p. m., stopping off at Tonopah and possibly at Carrara. The return trip will be made the next day, according to present tentative plans, leaving Vegas at 5 a. m. and arriving at Reno at 12 noon.

Trial of Hesse, Lake, Ferguson, Neagle Started

McClellan, Ferguson Found Guilty of Conspiracy; Goodwin and Leroy Guilty Only on Nuisance Charge.

RENO, June 12.—(AP)—Charged with conspiracy to violate the prohibition laws J. F. Hesse of Las Vegas and three other defendants went to trial in federal court at Carson City today.

R. E. Lake, former chief of police of Las Vegas, Roy Neagle, former police commissioner of Las Vegas and James Ferguson, reputed bootlegger king of Clark county and of the Boulder Dam district, are the other defendants.

Ferguson was convicted yesterday on two counts charging conspiracy and maintaining a nuisance. He will be sentenced Tuesday on the conviction obtained yesterday.

C. W. Bradshaw, whose 9-year-old son was shot and killed a year ago when riding with his father in an automobile pursued by Lake and another officer, was the first government witness called and told of being convicted three times for bootlegging, and said his arrest and conviction came after his refusal to pay \$50 per month protection to Ferguson.

RENO, Nev., June 21.—(Special)—Yesterday Goodwin and Leroy pleaded guilty to the nuisance charge on the Green Lantern saloon, their conspiracy charge on the same place was dismissed. Goodwin was fined \$250. Leroy's sentence was deferred 90 days on account of his sick wife and he is out on bail in the meantime.

Bill Farrimond, alias Speck, and McCormick pleaded guilty of a nuisance at the Senate resort. Their conspiracy charge at the same place was dismissed. Farrimond was fined \$300 and McCormick \$25. None of the above defendants were given jail sentences.

Yesterday Ferguson and McClellan case went to the jury at 3:00 o'clock and a verdict of guilty was returned after an hour's deliberation on both counts of conspiracy and maintaining a nuisance. Both defendants will appear for sentence Tuesday. Their co-defendant, Box Ingersoll, turned state's evidence.

The Hesse, Neagle, Lake and Ferguson trial on a conspiracy charge started at 3:00 o'clock yesterday. A jury was obtained at 4:00 o'clock and court adjourned.

The government called C. W. Bradshaw, Daisy Bell, Edith Burgess, Daryl Burgess, all Las Vegas characters, and U. S. Agent Seavers as witnesses.

The government has not yet closed and a half day session will be held tomorrow. There are several witnesses yet for the government.

John Schaefer of Los Angeles, A. W. Ham of Las Vegas and N. J. Barry of Reno, are representing Hesse, Charles Cantwell of Reno, is representing the other defendants.
