E. S. McGinnis is this pioneer's ame, and he lives now at the county poor farm, having failed in his endeavor to obtain a government pension for his activity as an ndian fighter in the frontier days. McGinnis first came to Vegas Valley in '65, he told an Age repcentative, as he sat with his cane ross his lan. That was the year G. Smeath, who had made reat wealth with a store in San rancisco, came out to establish nother store in Nevada. He chose he location to which Colorado River boats came for years aftervards, and built his warehouse here, stocking it with \$30,000 worth of goods, according to Mclinnis, with which he hoped to establish a thriving business in a

Had To Sell Out The thinly populated district, however, did not warrant such an ambitious store, and after a year of lagging, Smeath decided to sell ut his stock of goods. He sent Meinnis to Salt Lake City to get hree teams, comprising 12 animals ive hundred miles of desert waste. were used for the hauling of a great share of the merchandise some of which was sold enroute ack to Salt Lake City.

"We sold good calico at 5 cents bolt," he said. McGinnis lived in this valley to ee as many as ten mule teams of mules each in a train carrying ods from Southern California hrough Vegas Valley bound for

Montana, he said. "That was before the railroad vas built, and before there were many in the valley," he reminisced. "I was the first man to plant alfalfa and fig trees in the state of Nevada, I've been here 70 years and have had a good many opporunities I should be a millionaire by now, but I've seen quite a few nen with more brains than I have hat didn't ever make millionaires
