Operators Ask Wage Raise 60, 70 Per Cent

NEW YORK, June 25, (U.P.)—Wage increases ranging up to 62½ per cent—with a few 70 per cent—are asked in a proposed wage contract submitted to the United Press today by the Commercial Telegraphers Union of America.
 A wage of \$60 a week for day operators—printer operators and Morse telegraphers alike—and \$66 for night operators is demanded with a \$5 a week additional to operators employed in bureaus, and \$7.50 to those working in relay offices.
 Double time for overtime, a substantial increase in the Saturday night wage scale, additional holidays and separate offices for all operators are among the proposals made by the union.

President's Proclamation



President Herbert Hoover, who yesterday issued a proclamation that the Boulder Dam legislation passed six months ago by congress is now in effect. President Hoover has ever been one of the staunchest workers for the project.

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 4 (A) of the Boulder Canyon Project Act approved December 21, 1928 (45 Stat. 1075), it is hereby declared by public proclamation:

(A) That the states of Arizona, California, Colorado, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming, have not ratified the Colorado River Compact mentioned in Section 13 (A) of said act of December 21, 1928, within six months from the date of the passage and approval of said act.

(B) That the states of California, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming have consented to waive the provisions of the first paragraph of Article XI of said compact, which makes the same binding and obligatory only when approved by each of the seven states signatory thereto, and that each of the states last named has approved said compact without condition, except that of six-state approval as prescribed in Section 13 (A) of said act of December 21, 1928.

(C) That the state of California has in all things met the requirements set out in the first paragraph of Section 4 of said act of December 21, 1928, necessary to render said act effective on six-state approval of said compact.

(D) All prescribed conditions have been fulfilled, the said Boulder Canyon Project Act approved December 21, 1928, is hereby declared to be effective this date."

Testing Plant Site Will Be Chosen Soon

Choice of the location on which the testing plant to be established here immediately by the Bureau of Reclamation will be built will be made by Raymond F. Walter, engineer in charge of the construction of Boulder Dam, according to Walker R. Young, engineer who had charge of preliminary surveys of the dam site recently completed, and who left Tuesday evening for Ellensburg, Washington, where he is construction engineer for the Kittitas division of the Yakima irrigation project.

The choice of the site has been narrowed down to several, according to Young. It is planned to have the plant erected within six weeks or so. Dr. Elwood Mead, director of the Reclamation Bureau, stated Monday just before he left for Los Angeles.

Resumption Gas War Presaged

SAN FRANCISCO, June 25 (U.P.)—Resumption of the gasoline price "war" was foreseen here today with the Retail Service Dealers' association issuing an ultimatum in connection with charges of alleged surreptitious price cutting by big oil companies.

The companies will be given until Wednesday noon to comply with the demands of the retail dealers. If they refuse to accept responsibility, it was predicted, price slashing, which carried gasoline down to 10 cents a gallon two months ago, will be resumed.

George Potter's Foot Hurt by Wheel

Did 60 Cases of Beer Burn Tues. Night-Question

Shortly after upwards of sixty cases of beer are said to have been moved in, a place on Stewart near Main, sometimes called "Carl's warehouse" was burned to the ground last night along with what is sometimes called "Larry's Beer Joint."

Prompt and timely appearance of the fire department prevented the fire completely destroying Joe Haney's tent and awning shop, which was partially burned. A car which was in the shop was damaged seriously, neither the shop nor the car being protected by insurance, it is reported.

A lighted cigarette dropped somewhere in the alleged warehouse is believed to have caused the fire, which was reported immediately in order to extinguish the fire a stream of water had to be thrown over Tip Deal's place, which is nearby. Both Deal and Larry were fined for possession of intoxicants a short time ago.

Vegas Artesian Water Praised

Las Vegas' extensive artesian water area was praised yesterday by B. T. Ellsworth, of the Utah Nursery, Salt Lake City, who is in this city for a brief business visit with Oscar Potthoff, local agent for the nursery.

"Your city certainly has a resource in its water supply which it should appreciate," he said. "It has made it possible to make this city one of beauty through growth of trees and lawns. And it has capacity to bring about a great deal more beauty," he added.

"There is no limit to the possibilities for the planting of beautiful shrubs here. Most desert towns shun to pay from \$150 to \$7 an acre to maintain irrigation systems. This shows how much Las Vegas has to appreciate."

Ellsworth represents a firm agreed to be larger than all similar firms combined in the state of Utah. It occupies 160 acres in Salt Lake City, and employs 105 men in six different states, he said.

Two Notorious Oil Operators Hobnob In Prison Cell Now

WASHINGTON, June 25, (U.P.)—The District of Columbia jail houses two of the world's most famous oil operators today—Harry F. Sinclair and Henry Mason Day.

Sinclair is now an old resident, spending his sixth week in the big stone house, but Day joined him only last night. The two men who worked side by side to build up a gigantic oil business were sentenced for the same offense, contempt of court.

The charge grew out of their jury shadowing activities during the trial of Sinclair and former Secretary of the Interior Albert B. Fall for alleged conspiracy to defraud the government.

Strongheart, Dog of Fame, Dead

Hollywood, June 25 (U.P.)—Strongheart, that gallant police dog who emerged from the battle fields of Europe to lead an unprecedented invasion of the film studios by canine actors, is dead.

The end came yesterday after months of illness in which an operation had failed to bring hoped-for relief.

The great dog, who was beloved of children the world over, was the first animal to attain stardom on the screen, his success was the signal for an invasion by other four footed actors.

Strongheart was owned by Miss Jane Murfin, a scenario writer, who brought him to this country eight years ago. In motion pictures Miss Murfin was associated with Larry Trimble, who has acted as the dog's trainer and director.

Among Strongheart's best known pictures were "The Silent Call," "Brawn of the North" and "White Fang."

Trained in the kennels of the Berlin Police department, he had a splendid record in the German Red Cross during the World War.

Two Planes Will Seek Re-Fuel Mark In L. A.

LOS ANGELES, June 25, (U.P.)—Two airplanes crews at local airports were planning to take off either late this afternoon or tomorrow on attempts to break the world's endurance refueling mark.

Leo Nomis and Maurice Morrison will fly a Buhl Air Sedan in their attempt to better the present record of 172 hours held by Reg Robbins and James Kelly.

L. W. Mendell and R. B. Reinhardt were almost ready to start, but it was not expected that they would get into the air before tomorrow.

Later in the week Herbert J. Paly who recently set a solo endurance record will attempt a 30,000 foot altitude record. On July 4 Marjorie Crawford young and pretty aviatrix Homer Webb and an unnamed pilot expect to start after the Robbins-Kelly mark.

An airplane is roosting in a tall tree in Oregon, but happily for the natives it does not begin crowing at daybreak.—Indianapolis News.

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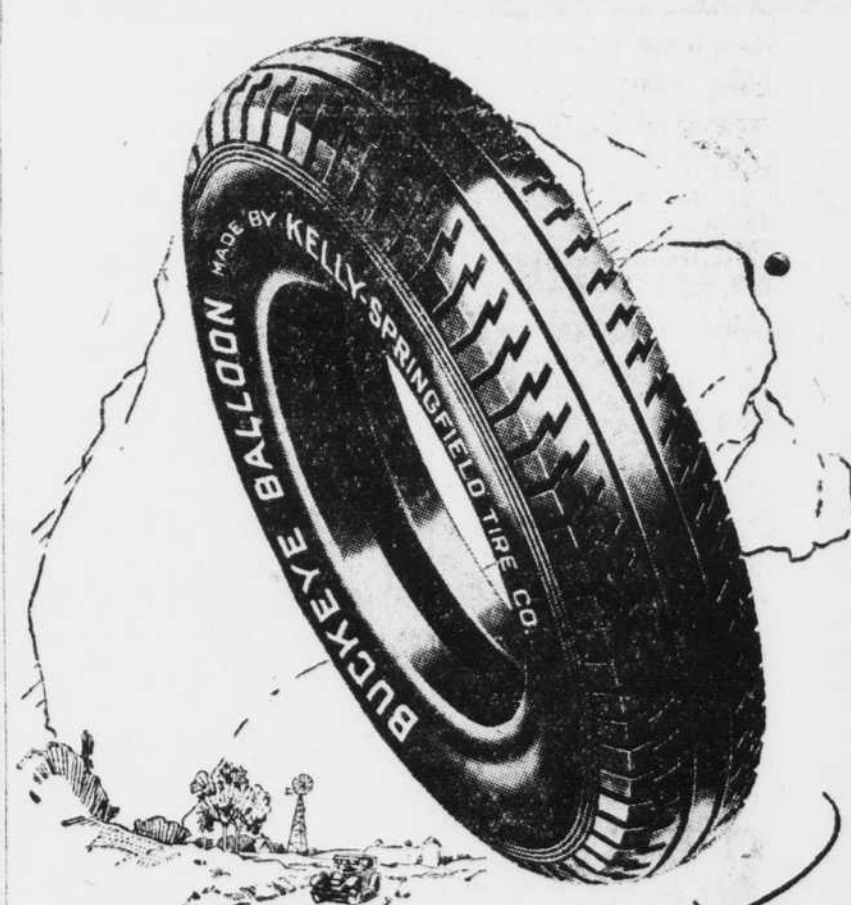
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
