**Mikulich Seeks Hotel Material Cost Recovery**

As an aftermath of the Egyptian Ambassador hotel affair, S. M. Mikulich filed suit Tuesday against Morris Golden and J. H. Miller for \$3,363.29, plus interest on same from May 22, 1929 at 7 per cent, to compensate for money paid out by Mikulich to the Boulder Lumber company for lumber used on the building on Mikulich's property, which was never completed.

Mikulich leased the land, which is in Block 20, on Fremont street, for three years to the defendants of this action, who, according to the action, failed to pay for certain materials used in the construction of the building. Due to absence of posted notice on the land to the effect that lessor was not responsible for work, labor or materials, with duplicate recorded in the office of the county recorder, Mikulich was held, according to law, for this bill, and paid it, he alleges, the payment being by defendants in this action and in the nature of a loan to them.

He has sought to recover this amount from defendants, and failed, he alleges. The basis for his seeking to recover this amount from defendants, it is stated, is written specification in the contract that the defendants, in leasing the land, agreed to post such notice of exemption from responsibility on the part of the lessor before they commenced building. The work of building was started February 1929.

Attorney's fee in amount of \$100, and costs, are also asked by Mikulich, in addition to the principal and interest. Leo McNamee is attorney for Mikulich.

**Grand View Ad To Have Water**

The Public Service Commission is in receipt of an application for certificate of public convenience, by the Grand View Water Company, of Las Vegas, which asks for permission to furnish water to that tract of land known as "Grand View Addition" to Las Vegas.

The Grand View Water Company also submits a contract between itself and the Las Vegas Land and Water Company, whereby water will be sold by the Las Vegas Land and Water Company to the applicant, to be resold to consumers located in Grand View Addition.

If any interested party has any objection to the granting of this application, statement should be filed with the Public Service Commission within thirty days; otherwise the commission will proceed to grant the application, it has been announced.
