Virginia Lee Corbin Said to Have Left for East with Man; Has 'Come Up Missing' Before.

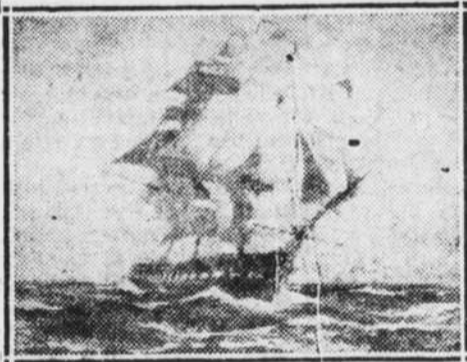

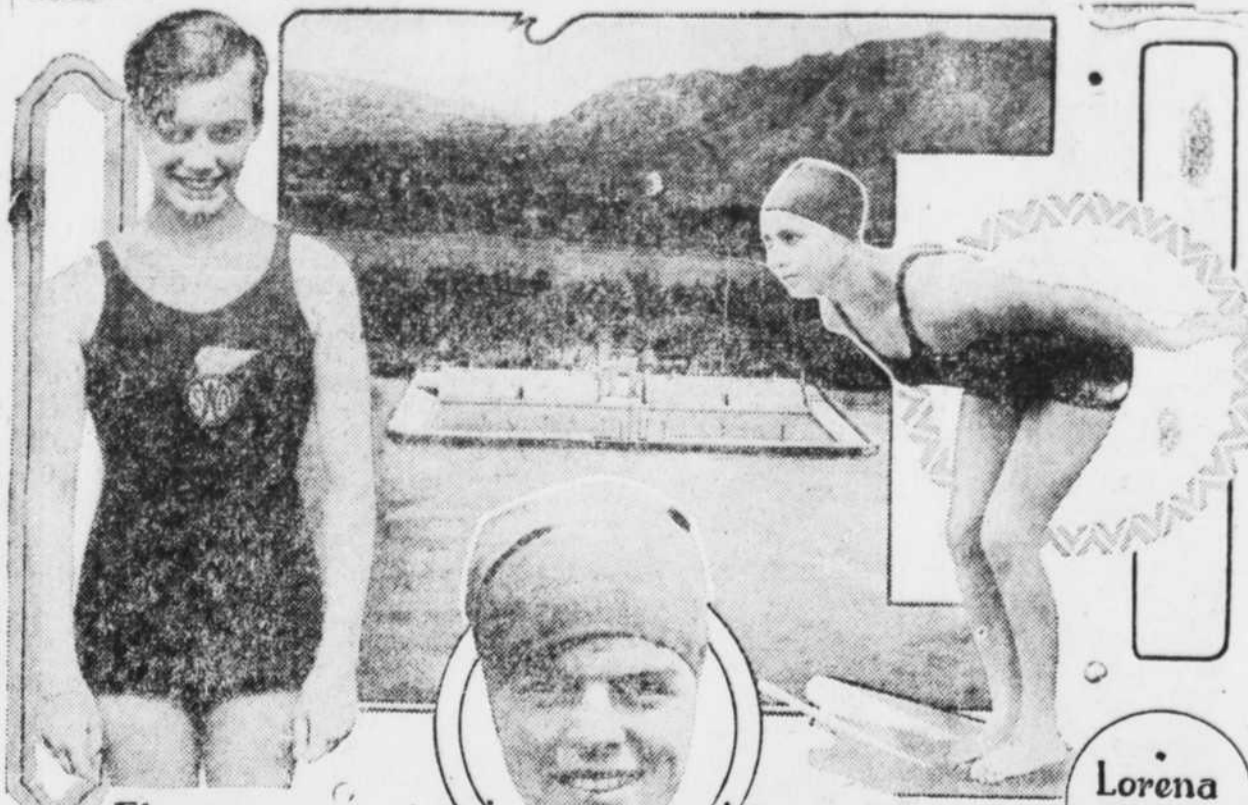

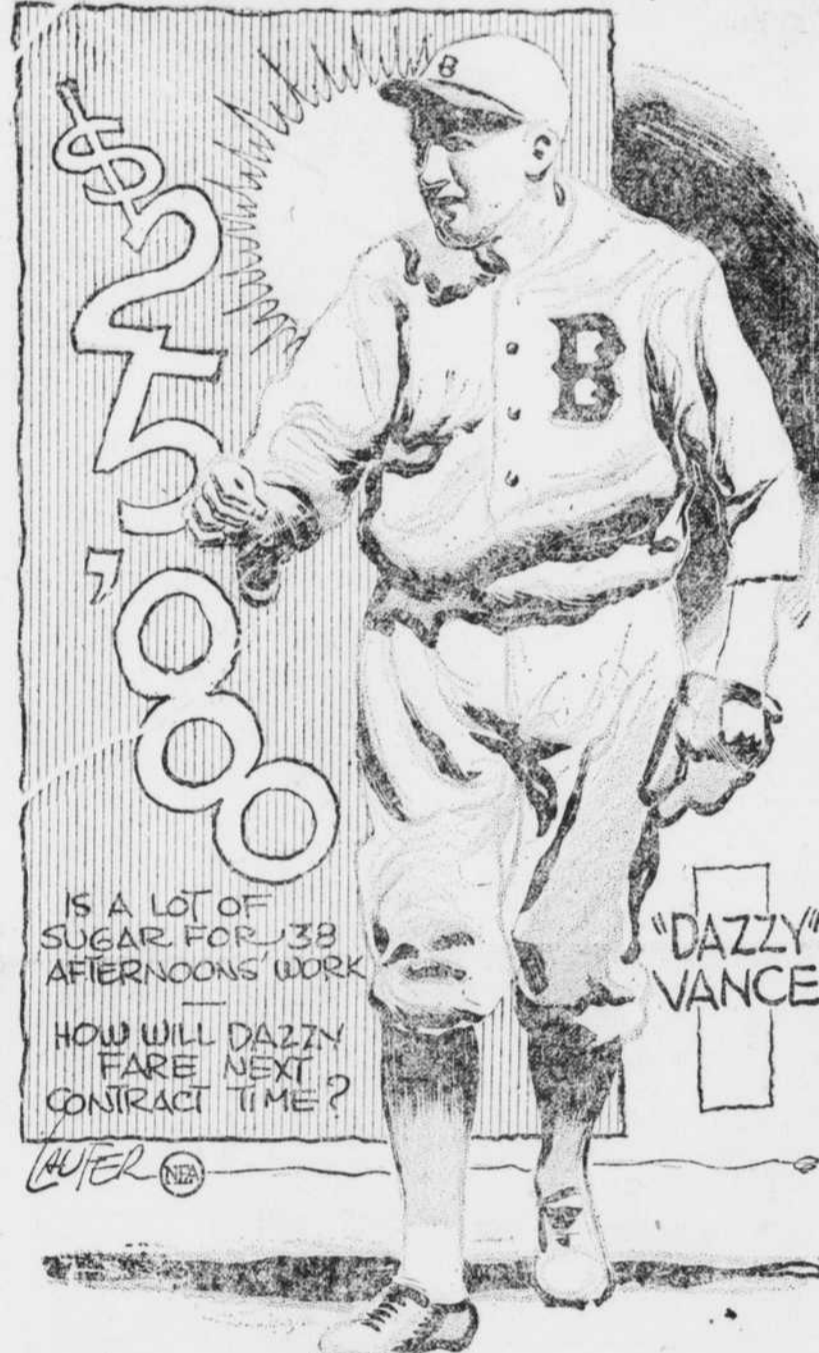

it was believed here that the world powers would lose no time in offering their services.

Great Britain was regarded as likely to lead the way. Ramsey MacDonald, British premier, is on the verge of offering to restore British-Russian diplomatic relations, severed now for two years. Any belligerent move by Russia would not only halt this intention but would prove greatly embarrassing to MacDonald. As in the United States, many in Britain are opposed to any sort of relations with Russia.

**Kellogg Pact May Help**  
Both China and Russia are signatories of the Kellogg pact. Russia has shown every intention lately of building up good relations with nations that have opposed her communist leaders. Russians, not only the government, but the people, were angered by the Chinese railway seizure, and the arrest of many Russian officials. They regarded the move not as aimed really at Communist propaganda, but against Russian participation in the railway administration. Therefore it was hoped here that some action might be taken at once to prevent further misunderstanding and recrimination between the governments involved.

**Chinese Accusations**  
BERLIN, July 18. (U.P.)—The Soviet note today declared that the Chinese government applied sharp criticism of the Soviet government policy instead of occupying itself with Russia's three demands contained in its first note. "The Chinese government furthermore accused the Soviet government of various machinations

**Russ Troops Patrol Chinese Border**

LONDON, July 17. (U.P.)—The Daily Mail's Shanghai correspondent tonight gave details of reported Russian troop movements on the Manchurian frontier. The correspondent quoted reports that a large force of Russians escorted by airplane are patrolling the border while cavalry was moving in Mongolia. The Chinese were said to outnumber the Soviets greatly but the Russian forces were well equipped. The correspondent said a government official at Nanking announced that China is determined to control the Chinese Eastern Railway, and will resist any military movements by Russia.

which are based on falsehoods," the Russian note complained. "It is untrue," the Russian note continues, "that several thousand Chinese citizens in Moscow or in the Soviet Union have been arrested or are about to be arrested. The Chinese citizens in Soviet prisons are those who have been sentenced by the court for ordinary crimes."

TOKIO, July 17. (U.P.)—Reports here today said the Chinese have cut the railroad both at Manchuria and at Paganochaya, severing all rail connections and communications between Manchuria and Siberia. The Chinese apparently fear the Soviets might use the lines to invade Manchuria.

The giants were helpless before the pitching of Sylvester Johnson and lost, 5 to 0, to St. Louis, at New York. The Cardinals scored two runs in the fourth on Johnson's home run and three in the sixth evening the series with the Giants at two-all.

Brooklyn took it on the nose twice, losing both ends of a twin bill to Cincinnati by scores of 5 to 3, and 7 to 2. Brooklyn sent two of its best hurlers, Vance and Morrison, to the mound in the two games but both were ineffective.

The Philadelphia Athletics maintained their eight-game lead in the American league by taking a 10-inning game at Cleveland, 7 to 5. The Athletics took an early lead but Cleveland rallied to force the game into extra innings.

PHILADELPHIA, July 17. (U.P.)—Chuck Klein, Philadelphia outfielder, holds a modern record for home runs today, when he hit his 27th and 28th homers of the season in the first and fourth innings of yesterday's game with the Cubs here. He became the first man to hit three home runs in as many trips to the plate since the turn of the century. He had hit a homer in his last time at bat on Monday. In 1894, Robert Lowe, of the Boston Braves, hit four successive home runs, the record.

The New York Yankees batted Vic Scirell for 16 hits and beat the Tigers, at Detroit, 11 to 7 Babe Ruth's big bat played an important part in the game. The Bambino cleared the bases with a powerful three-bagger in the first and hit a home run in the third with no one on base.

Chicago evened its series with Washington by beating the Senators, 6 to 5, in a 10-inning game at Chicago. The Sox sent Weiland, Dugan, McKain, Adkins and Thomas to the box during the game although Washington made only nine hits in the entire 10 innings.

Boston battered the Browns badly, at St. Louis, and emerged at the end of nine innings of play with a margin of 11 to 2. Milt Gaster held the Browns to six hits.

Loughran Ready to Defend His Crown Through Onslaught from James J. Braddock, Who Is Determined for K. O.

NEW YORK, July 17. (U.P.)—With a long siege of training behind them and a world's championship fight ahead, Tommy Loughran light-heavyweight titleholder, and James J. Braddock, young Jersey City challenger, departed today from quiet training nooks for the scene of their 15-round battle at Yankee Stadium tomorrow night. Pronounced in perfect physical condition by his handlers, Braddock left White Sulphur Springs, N. Y., confident of winning by a knockout before the tenth round.

**Has Weight Problem**  
On the eve of facing the most dangerous challenger in his reign as light-heavyweight champion, Loughran left Hoesick Falls, N. Y., confronted with the difficult problem of making 175 pounds at 2 p. m. tomorrow.

A special diet has been necessary to keep Loughran below 180 pounds the past few days and total abstinence of liquids will be necessary during the next 24 hours to enable the champion to make the weight.

**\$69,000 Mark Passed**  
With the seat sale, just the \$60,000 mark, Madison Square Garden officials predict the fight will attract a gate of between \$100,000 and \$150,000 and a crowd of more than 20,000.

Sorio couldn't seem to get started, which was probably Eddie's fault. Sal's notorious right requires a lot of timing, and Mack never gave him a chance to get started.

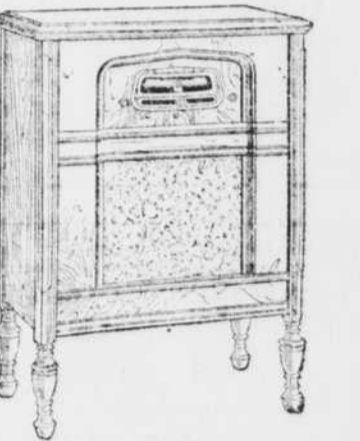
