

Fishermen Tell of Seeing Famous Lake Champlain Sea Serpent

Ingenious 'Talkie' Sleuth Captures Lindbergh's Voice

SAN FRANCISCO, July 17. (AP)—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh defied all reporters and cameramen when it came to his marriage, but an enterprising San Francisco sound camera man today has \$300,000 worth of Lindbergh's voice, without Lindbergh's consent.

"The voice that has never been filmed" was registered at an estimated value of \$2,500 a foot through means of a microphone under the coat of J. L. Hermann, who mingled with the crowd when the famous aviator visited Mills field Monday. Another picture operator cranked away on a track.

Lindbergh eventually discovered the trailing wire from Hermann's clothing, and registered his indignation in uncertain terms. Hermann had very little to say—he had what he went after.

Huge Hoover Letter Read To Realtors

A message from President Hoover to Harry H. Culver, president of the National Association of Real Estate Boards, was delivered by airplane to Mr. Culver at the twenty-second annual convention of the national association held recently in Boston, Massachusetts. The message reads:

My dear Mr. Culver:

I cordially share your view that an outstanding opportunity for public service awaits the realtors in the field of stimulation of home ownership, which is so vitally related to the health, happiness and civic pride of our people.

This letter of greeting was sent by air mail from Washington, D. C., to Atlantic City, New Jersey, where it was rewritten on a giant Underwood typewriter in letters six inches high on stationery 15 by 9 feet. Said to be the largest communication ever to go out over the presidential signature, the message was brought from Atlantic City to Boston in a nine-foot mailing tube strapped to the side of a special Roosevelt biplane.

Mr. Culver unfolded and read the message at a general session of the convention. The Association replied with a telegram of greeting to President Hoover.

RIVER STILL DROPPING

WILLSBORO, N. Y., July 17. (AP)—Three young fishermen, still excited over their experience, insisted today they had seen the famous Lake Champlain sea serpent, whose existence has been affirmed and denied by a confusing combination of fact and fancy during the more than 300 years since the lake's discovery.

Thomas Bridge of Willsboro village and two companions, Davis Riley and Wesley Quimby, were fishing at the mouth of the Boquet River Sunday when what appeared to them to be a huge serpent or fish thrust its head high above the surface of the lake. The monster began shaking its head violently, lashing the water into a sea of foam.

Terrified by the spectacle, Bridge did not stop running until he had reached the village, two miles away. Riley and Quimby also retired precipitately but said there could be no mistake about what they had seen. The water was disturbed for acres around they said.

The serpent has been something of a legendary figure in this section, and the last time he was reported seen was 20 years ago when he allegedly appeared between Point Henry and Crown Point.

Auto Stage General Offices Moved to S.F.

LOS ANGELES, July 17. (AP)—General traffic offices of Pickwick stage system and three affiliated lines will be transferred from Los Angeles and Oakland to San Francisco within the next few days, it has been announced.

In addition to Pickwick, Sierra Nevada stages, Auto Transit Co., and California Transit Co. will be moved to San Francisco, where they will be consolidated with the general traffic of the Southern Pacific Motor Transport Co., at 20 Steuart street.

The centralization in San Francisco is one of the first developments brought about in the Pacific coast territory by the recent \$20,000,000 merger of Pickwick, Yellowway, Greyhound and Southern Pacific Motor Transport company lines.

Announcement of the change was made this afternoon by T. B. Wilson, president of the holding company for the merged lines.
