Boeing Plans 18 Airplanes On New Route

SALT LAKE CITY, July 17. (U.P.)—Eighteen passenger planes will be placed in operation on a passenger-air route between San Francisco and Chicago by the Boeing Air Transport company during August.

Nevada Expects Big Stimulus From Boulder Dam For Mining Industry

Southern Nevada, Clark County especially, has been called nature's chemical laboratory. Not in the metallic ores alone, such as gold, silver, copper, lead and zinc, but in the non-metallic minerals, such as gypsum, magnesite, borax, silica, lime and many others, Clark County has a store of wealth of unbounded possibilities.

Gypsum, lime and borax mining have already reached the stature of important industries. But it is obvious that with cheap power available, the output of both the metallic and the non-metallic minerals will be vastly increased.

Nevada, under the Boulder Dam Bill, has the right to contract for a portion of the power to be developed at Boulder Dam at the same price as any other contractee. Freighters Pay Calif. Million in Road Tax

SACRAMENTO, July 17. (U.P.)—Highway transportation companies paid taxes of \$1,155,166.36 to the state during the past fiscal year, an increase of 15.57 percent over the 1928 figures, according to a statement today by the board of equalization.

This is the first time that this tax has exceeded the million dollar mark since it was inaugurated three years ago. It is imposed in lieu of all other taxes—city, county or state—on motor vehicles.
