Center Parking Ordinance Gets First Reading

Traffic Will Move Next To Curbs To Compact New Paving If Proposed Measure Is Passed.

Cars will be parked in the middle of the streets recently paved instead of along the curbs, beginning about a month from now, upon passage of an ordinance read for the first time at Tuesday afternoon's meeting of the city board.

For a period of 60 days after the passage of the ordinance cars will be left standing parallel to the curbs, and with left hand wheels not more than two feet from the center of the street.

This is for the purpose of getting the edges of the pavement packed as the centers of the streets have been packed, it is explained. The oil-bound gravel needs a certain amount of rolling, and this must come from regular traffic, after the steam roller goes over the paving.

Cars will be allowed to park next to the curbs only long enough for unloading of passengers or freight. Penalties for violation of the ordinance will be \$2.50 to \$10 fine and one and one-fourth to fifty days.

Tile Company Opens New Plant

The Lay-More tile is an entirely new departure in the construction of building of almost any type, being exceptionally well adapted for use where weather conditions require well insulated walls. At the present time a crew of eight men is employed. It will be three weeks before the new tile will be ready for delivery as it requires twenty-one days to properly cure each tile. The Desert Construction Company anticipates an extensive building program for Las Vegas this fall and expects to double the present force of men in the very near future.
