Nevada Airlines Plans Extension Of Its Service

Line May Soon Be Made to Include Trips North from Reno to Seattle; Other Additions Pending.

Extension of Nevada Airlines service from Reno north by way of Alturas, California, and Klamath Falls, Oregon, to Seattle is being considered seriously by officials of the company, which is headed by G. Ray Boggs.

Possibility of making such line pay is being considered and data gathered, from which the company's heads will determine whether or not the plan is feasible at this time.

An aggressive policy of extension has been determined on by the company, the Reno-Las Vegas line having been instituted a few months after the establishment of the Reno-Las Vegas line.

Scouts Seek Thrills Above the Clouds

Blanket Burns as Boys Sleep on Charleston Mountain Climbers See Wild Animals

Camping near the top of Mt. Charleston, more than eleven thousand feet above sea level, furnished six boy scouts and their escort no end of fun Tuesday night when a party of eight climbed the mountain, rolled up in not nearly enough blankets and slept in a naturally sheltered nook near the summit.

The retiring officers of the previous two years expressed their appreciation of the support given them in the past and asked that their successors be given the same unselfish support.

At 2 o'clock in the morning, the blaze did not damage the boys sleeping thereunder, but did damage the blanket, to a considerable extent.

George Stone, Pat Mooney, Jr., and Norman Letchworth are the boys who had to make a mad scramble out from under when the fire was discovered if K.O. Knudson's memory served him right yesterday in recounting the adventures of his charges.

Knudson Leads Party
"K.O." who is scout executive, conducted the expedition, with Dr. John P. Waggoner and Ernest Moxart helping him to hold the boys down to a reasonable pace on their romp up the mountainside.

The other three boys who made the trip were Roston Barnum, George Hardman and Jimmy Hardy. One of the chief objects of interest to the boys was the fact that the nearer the top they got the more marine fossils they found, showing that the mountain had at one time been submerged. Most of them took back pocketfuls of fossils.

From the camping place near the summit the boys could see in the darkness, lights from Charleston camp, where 21 boy scouts have camped during the past week, the lights of automobiles moving along the Tonopah road, the lights of Las Vegas, and several of the airplane route beacons, turning round and round.

From the top, bright and early and cool Wednesday morning, the party saw Mt. Whitney and Death Valley, in California, the Parumung valley, and the canyon of the Colorado river.

An early start was made by the party Tuesday morning. All arose twice on the ascent, according to Knudson.

Other trips to the summit of the mountain will be made before camp breaks up, August 10, it was stated. Two more boys, Neil Anderson and Elbert Bailey, will go up to Charleston today, according to plans of the two carry water for day.

Watchman Makes "Bonor"
The beds were made on foxtail pine boughs, and when dark came a fire was made, a watch being kept all night.

The watchman who allowed the blanket to catch fire was not very popular among some of the rest, for the air was extremely cold and none of the blankets could be rightly spared. Some of the party succeeded in sleeping well for only a few hours, because of the cold.

"A bunch of us slept together," said Knudson yesterday, during a visit in town, "and when I crawled in at one side of the bed Roston Barnum went out at the other."

Prisoners Scarce In County This Month, Say Records

Whether the midsummer lull in the boom to the Gateway to Boulder Dam has driven away the lawless element, or whether the hot weather keeps said lawless element devoid of energy to commit depredations, the fact remains that there have been fewer prisoners by far lodged in the county jail this month, than during many a month past.

There have been, in fact, only two boarders in the bastille during the month thus far, as compared with a minimum of ten during any of the previous six months.

In March, at the height of the boom, and when Uncle Sam conducted his dry raid here, 38 were quartered with the county during the month.

February, April and June were next, with 15 prisoners each. In January there were 13, in May 10, and in December, just as the boom started, there were only four.

"The Stranger's First Impression of the City Is Based on Its Appearance," and "Keep Your City as You Would Your Home," "A Healthy City Means Contented People," were other signs exhibited in the parade.

The painters' union, the carpenters, the plasterers and others were well represented.

The Engler Interests represent, in addition to the Las Vegas Disposal company, headed by Mr. Hempstead, the Spanish Stone company, a construction company, a public market company, and various other enterprises which have been and will be launched here.

Sheriff Will Go To Chicago For Forgery Suspect

Harry Colvin Refuses to Waive Extradition; Sam Gay Probably Will Make Trip to Serve Papers.

Sheriff Sam Gay probably will go to Illinois to get Harry Colvin, accused of forging checks on the Tower Market here a short time ago, it was learned yesterday.

Colvin was caught in Chicago several days ago, and refuses to waive extradition, according to a wire received by Sheriff Gay from Illinois officials yesterday.

The case has been continued to August 9, at which time the Clark county sheriff probably will serve extradition papers in Chicago for the former bookkeeper, who is accused of passing several checks aggregating several hundred dollars in Las Vegas cafes.

The extradition papers will be obtained from Governor Fred Bazaar and then presented at Springfield, capital of Illinois, before being served in Chicago.

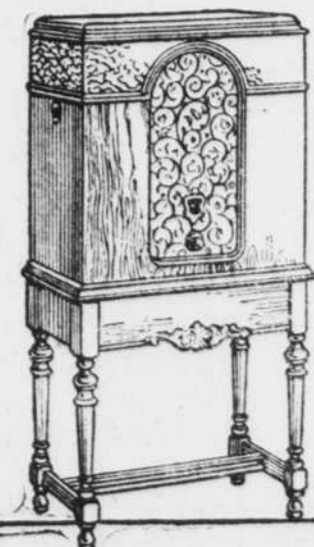
