 HOLLYWOOD, July 30.—And, gentlemen, it's going to take more than a "cave-man" from Broadway to tell Clara Bow when she will get married.

Yesterday, Harry Richman, New York stage actor and night club owner, announced to the world at large that his "he man" tactics had won the "It" girl of the screen and that he would marry her before September 12.

Boulder Dam Gold Placers Force at Work

 LOS ANGELES, July 29.—Returning to Los Angeles from Las Vegas, Nevada, headquarters of the Boulder Dam Gold Placers, Inc., President Mark Musgrove states the company has a force of men, employed at its gold placer diggings below the Grand Canyon on the Colorado River, surveying and grading the site for the installation of the giant hydraulic equipment as soon as machinery can be landed on the ground.

This equipment, Musgrove asserts, assures the handling of about 2500 cubic yards of gold-bearing gravel daily. The bar, he says, is about 100 feet in depth, and an experienced gold placer mining operator, according to Musgrove, panning 100 samples of the gravel, reports an average gold content of 30 cents per cubic yard.

Company holdings embrace about 200 acres in the section mentioned, the river cutting through the property, making it accessible for economic operation.

Big German Ship Returns Home

BROOKLYN, N. Y., July 30.—(U.P.) The North German Lloyd liner Bremen, holder of the record for a westward Atlantic ocean voyage, left for home early Saturday after a cruise estimated by police at 35,000 persons had gathered to witness the sailing.

Captain Leopold Ziegenbein, the skipper, told reporters he probably would "take it easy" on the eastward passage and land at Cherbourg about 7 o'clock Wednesday morning, adding that there was no use getting to that port sooner, since French officials would not "handle a ship earlier in the morning."

If the ship lands according to plans, it will lower the eastern voyage record by about 8 hours.

Both the western and eastern passage records were held by the Cunarder Mauretania until the Bremen landed here Monday morning 4 days 17 hours and 34 minutes after leaving Cherbourg. The average speed for this crossing was in excess of 28 knots.
