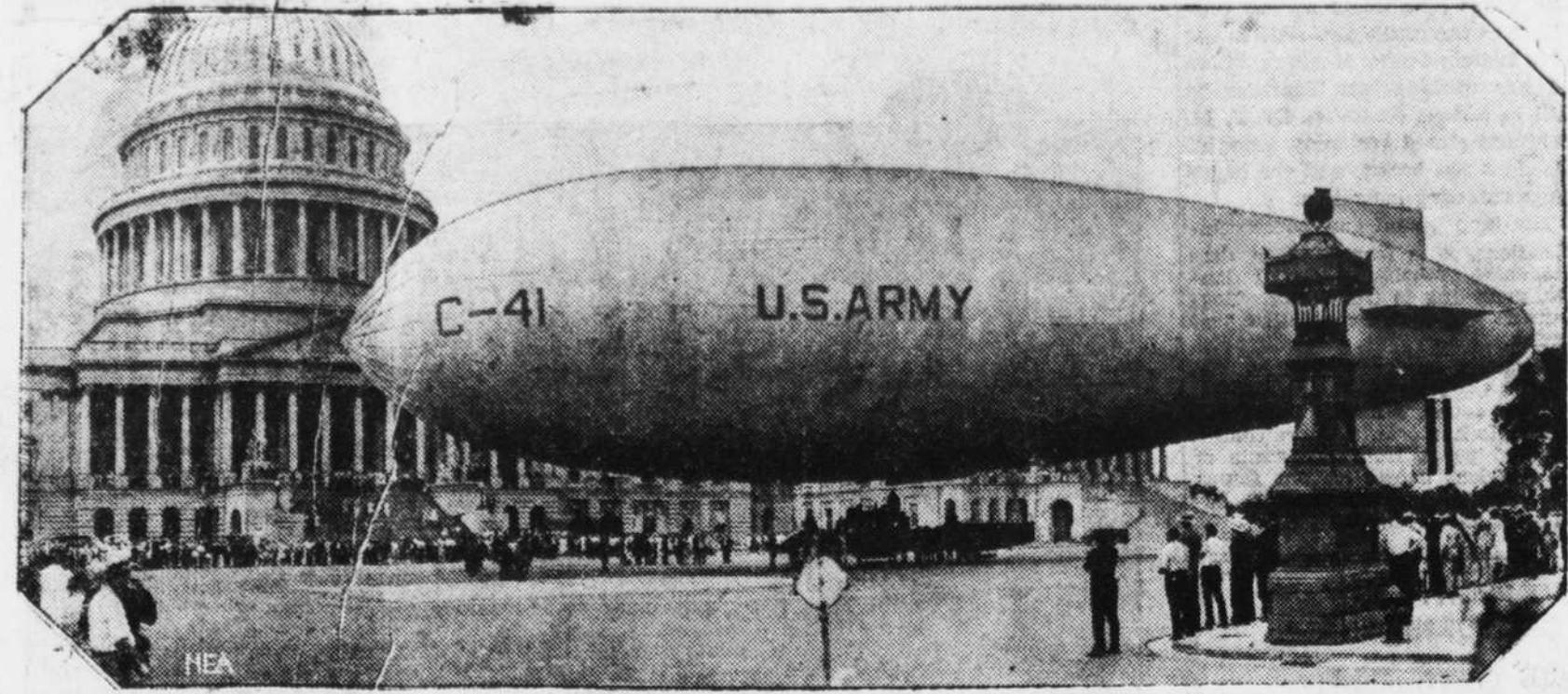

Soviet Rejects China Request For Conference

Russia Demands Establishing of 'Status Quo Ante' In Manchuria In Connection with Eastern Railway.

It was announced here Leo Karakhan, assistant commissar for foreign affairs, in charge of eastern affairs, has rejected flatly the written proposal from Chang Hsuen-Liang of Manchuria...

In connection with the rejection of Chang's proposal, the foreign office states that it substantially accepted the proposals but insisted that they come directly from Chang.

On August 1, the foreign office communique said, Chang made his direct proposals, first, calling a conference, second, that the disputed railway be regulated after the conference on a basis of the treaties...

U. S. To Tokio Airplane Race In The Offing

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 2.—(U.P.)—A possible three-circled race across the north Pacific from Puget sound to Tokyo, had Seattle aeronautical circles in turmoil today.

Telegrams were flying back and forth and flight backers of Harold Bromley, Robert Wark and Bob Martin set about straightening out preparatory details of three separate attempts with feverish energy.

Each flyer has set his tentative date of departure for some time before the end of the month. This means that it will be a race between airplane craftsmen and mechanics as well as pilots and ground crews.

Bromley is under construction in Burbank, Calif., where construction of a new plane is being rushed.

F. M. McNamee to Enter Law Here

Mrs. Pantages Is Out On Bail

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 2.—(U.P.)—Mrs. Alexander Pantages, wife of the theater magnate, was at liberty on bail of \$50,000 today awaiting trial for murder as the result of an automobile crash.

After listening to state evidence for two days, Municipal Judge William Frederickson decided late yesterday that Mrs. Pantages should be held to the Superior Court but should be released on bail due to her weakened physical condition.

The state maintained Mrs. Pantages was intoxicated when her automobile struck another car and caused the death of Juro Rokumoto, a Japanese. The liquor court was dropped, however, when she was held to answer to the murder charge.

Soviet Plane To Start Trip Moscow to N.Y.

MOSCOW, Aug. 2.—(U.P.)—The airplane "Land of the Soviet," with which Communist Russia hopes to show the outside world the prowess of its airmen and the practicability of its aircraft, will start from Moscow on a flight to New York, Monday, it was announced today.

Four aviators will make the trip. It is proposed to fly by leisurely stages across Russia and Siberia and the Bering straits to Alaska, and then to Seattle, San Francisco, Chicago, and New York—the total distance of 12,500 miles.

Crippled Lawyer Tries to Kill Self

SANTA CRUZ, Calif., Aug. 5.—(U.P.)—Amandus J. Paulsen, crippled lawyer, attempted to commit suicide here today and cured himself of paralysis of the legs, fingers and hands.

Paulsen was under treatment for several years here for injuries received when struck by a hit-and-run driver while he was on his way to open his new legal offices for the first time.

He attempted to end his life today by cutting his throat with a butcher knife, filling up a bathtub and turning on gas.

It is believed that the shock of the suicide attempt helped him regain the use of his limbs.

California Mussel Diet Kills Two Men

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 5.—(U.P.)—California coast mussels, pronounced dangerous to human life at this season of the year, had claimed two more lives today, despite generally broadcast warnings.

Thomas Veniza, 40, San Francisco, died in Sebastopol after eating mussels gathered at Bodega. Two companions also suffered from shellfish poisoning, but recovered after treatment.

Mangel Fernandez, 46, died in Sacramento after eating mussels on a visit to Bolinas Bay.

Air Squadron Starts Coast to Coast Hop

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—(U.P.)—Nine large Martin bombers took off from Langley field near here shortly after daybreak today for a transcontinental flight to Rockwell Field, Coronado, Calif., to determine the length of time required to make an air squadron from the east to west coast.

Several intermediate halts will be made. The squadron is commanded by Major H. J. Knorr.

Grocery Is Robbed On Opening Day

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 5.—(U.P.)—Four bandits helped celebrate the opening day of Ralph's Grocery store here today by robbing W. A. Russell, manager, of \$1,000.

Three bandits entered the store and forced Russell to open the safe while the fourth waited outside in an automobile.

Dora Koener of Glendale was in the store at the time and started to leave, but the bandit in the car ordered her to return inside.

Scout Log Cabin Preliminary Work To Be Started Soon

Dr. John P. Waggoner, engineer, who has spent much time at Mt Charleston with the boy scouts during their encampment there this summer, will plan the permanent camp ground for the boys this fall, it was learned yesterday from K. O. Knudson, scout executive.

The land, which will be deeded to the boys by agreement of E. W. Griffith and the Miller brothers, is located half a mile down the canyon from the present camp at Charleston, on the old mine road.

It is on a flat, and will have sufficient level space for drill ground, it is stated. Water will have to be piped only about 2,000 feet to the camp, according to Knudson.

The scouts' permanent log cabins will be built there within the next year, according to present plans.

Twenty Miners Killed In Japanese Blast

TOKIO, Aug. 5.—(U.P.)—Twenty miners are known to have been killed in an explosion in a coal mine at Otashima, on the island of Hokkaido, a dispatch received this morning said. Fifty-one others trapped in the shaft by the explosion, are believed to have been lost also, it was said.

Professors Scratch Their Heads When Confronted With Edison Quiz

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—(U.P.)—Thos. A. Edison's questions on chemistry would make a first-year college student scratch his head, while a diligent high school student might be able to pass the physics quiz, four university savants agreed today.

John M. Nelson, professor of organic chemistry at Columbia University and T. C. Taylor, his associate, solved the chemistry problems put in the test, and Robert van Nardorff, Columbia physics instructor, and Louis C. Fuller, holding a similar post in Hunter College, answered the physics test. The four other sections of Edison's quiz, dealing with general and catch questions, were not attempted by the professors.

Some of the answers given by the college teachers to Edison's science questions were:

Three very low forms of life?—Amoeba, spirobyra, yeast.

The airplane's most pressing future need?—Something about helicopters, to make landings in small spaces.

Which would make the best footwear, a bag of hot water or a bag of mercury?—Hot water, it retains heat longer.

Do echoes travel faster in winter or summer?—In summer.

On what physiological phenomenon is the success of motion picture projection dependent?—Persistence of vision.

Assume the increase in any colony of mice to be such that the number doubles every three months. How large will the colony be at the end of three years if we start with a pair?—The final generation will be 4,096 mice the original two raised to the twelfth power.
