By Williams Less Corruption Among U.S. Drys Says Lowman

Weeding Out Process Has Raised Morale, He Says; Sub-Committee Members Liberal on Prohi Question.

WASNY United Press Staff Correspondent WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—(U.P.)—Just as President Hoover's law enforcement commission announced the appointment of a sub-committee to consider the subject of lawlessness by governmental law enforcing officers, Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Seymour Lowman said in an interview that corruption in the federal prohibition service had been reduced to a minimum.

His statement was not in comment on the action of the law enforcement commission by a coincidence. When Lowman took office in August, 1927, he declared the service was "honeycombed with corruption and rampant with grafters," but today he declared the weeding out process had built up an organization with high morale. "We are getting a higher class of men for the position of agent than we did two years ago," Lowman said. "Those who always had a hand out for a bribe have been dismissed and punished."

Milk Bottling Room Installed

A new air-tight milk room for bottling of milk has just been installed at Harry Anderson's new creamery on east Fremont just beyond Fifth.

The bottling room which is 10 by 10, is adjacent to the refrigeration plant, and is one of the final installations before completion of the new plant. Anderson brings in milk from his own herd in the Moapa valley, about 200 gallons a day of it, besides a quantity of cream. Albert Wittwer has a refrigeration and storage plant and aerator in Logandale, and it is from there that Anderson brings the milk by truck.

The new plant here will be completed about August 15. It is now being used for storage and refrigeration.

New Barbecue Business Opening

A new barbecued sandwich business is being inaugurated today on the corner of Fifth and Fremont, the new barbecue pit having been completed late yesterday.

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Hanson and Jack DeLong, formerly of Hollywood, are running the stand formerly owned by Mr. and Mrs. Cisco, and are expanding the former root beer stand into a barbecue with coffee, pork and beef sandwiches, and various confections in addition to root beer.

It is a "drive-in" affair they explained yesterday.

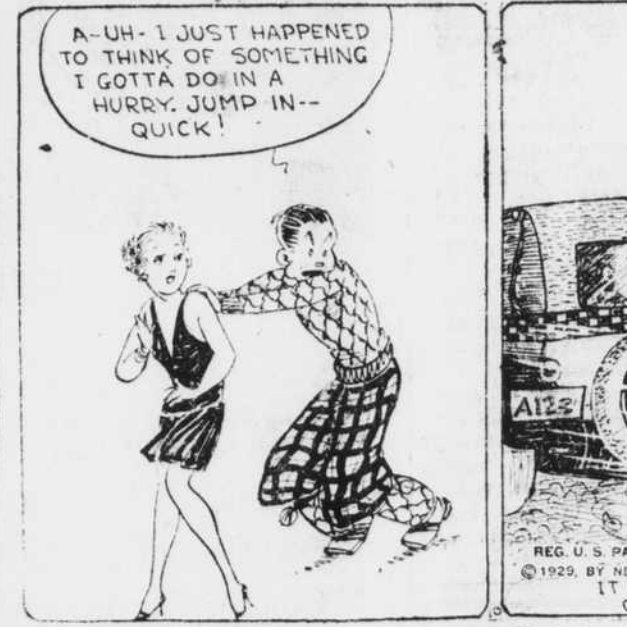

Mauretania Fails Record Attempt

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—(U.P.)—The Cunard liner Mauretania failed by more than four hours in an attempt to break the North German Lloyd Bremen's record of 4 days, 17 hours, 42 minutes for crossing the Atlantic from Cherbourg.

The former pride of the seas, slowed down by rough weather, reached Ambrose lightship at 10:36 a. m. She left Cherbourg at 12:52 p. m. Saturday.

The voyage was made in 4 days, 21 hours and 44 minutes, several hours better than the Mauretania's best previous time. The ship reached quarantine at 11:42 a. m.

L. A. Bandits Get Ice Co.'s Money

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 9.—(U.P.)—Two young bandits with revolvers concealed under newspapers held up Edward Dawson, messenger for the Associated Ice Company, and escaped with \$5,000 and Dawson's automobile.

The men leaped on the running board of the car when Dawson stopped for a traffic signal. The messenger was ordered to drive to an isolated district near some railroad tracks.

"Beat it across those tracks and don't look back," one of the bandits ordered. As Dawson complied with the command, the men drove away in his car.
