Body of Torch Victim Found

NEWARK, N. J., Aug. 9.—(U.P.)—The body of a man, burned to a crisp, was found in the rear seat of a new Packard sedan at the city dump tonight, the second frightful torch murder victim in recent months.

The place where the body was found is only 300 feet from the new express highway which leads past the Metropolitan airport through the dump to Elizabeth.

The clothes were burned completely from the body. Two empty five-gallon gasoline cans were found in the badly burned car, one of them torn open as if it had exploded. Police said there was no question however, that it was a case of murder.

There were no license plates on the car. The engine number apparently had been obliterated deliberately and police said it would be difficult if not impossible to make it out.

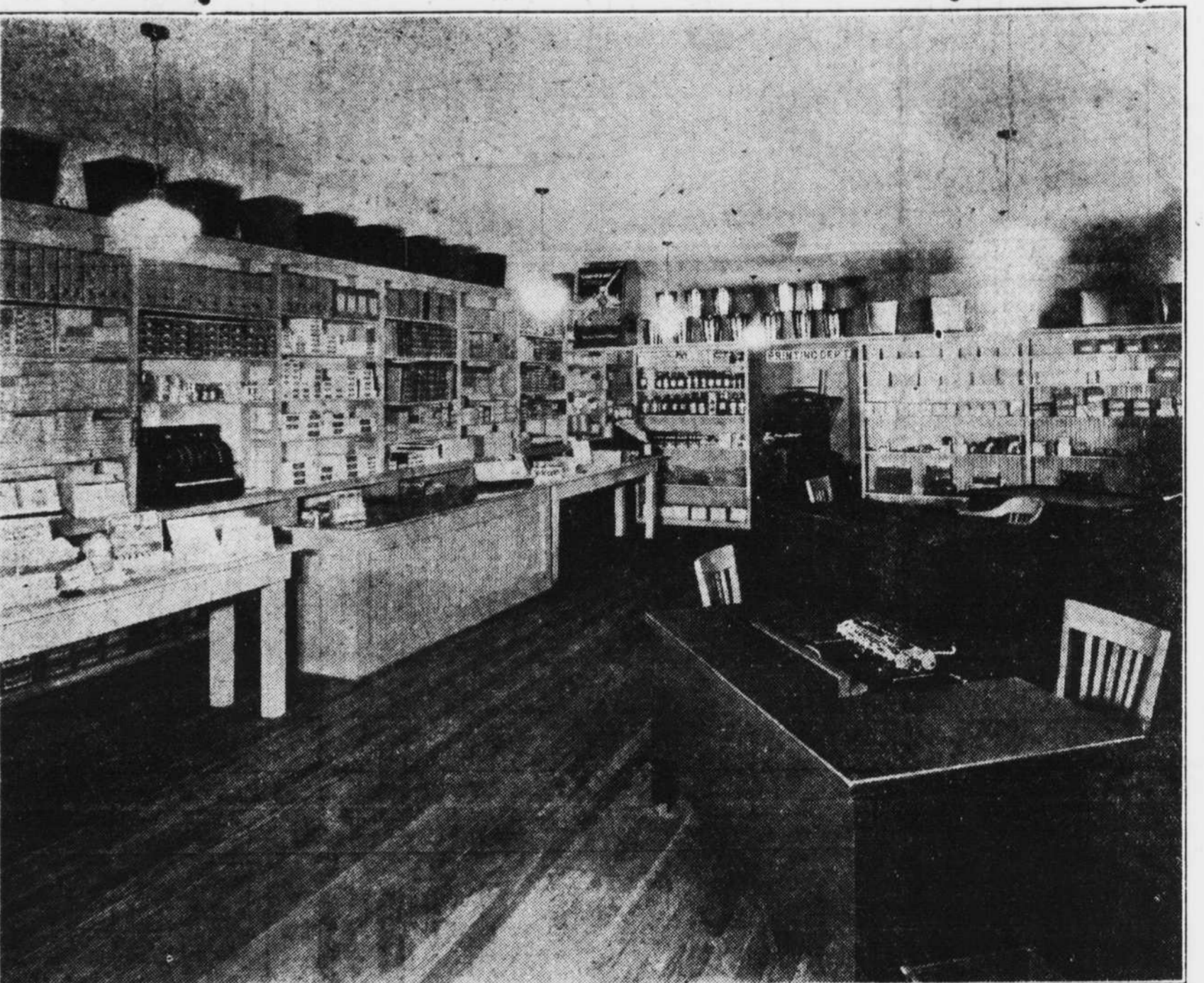
C. D. Breeze was attorney for the defendants, while J. R. Lewis represented Mr. and Mrs. Hefner.
