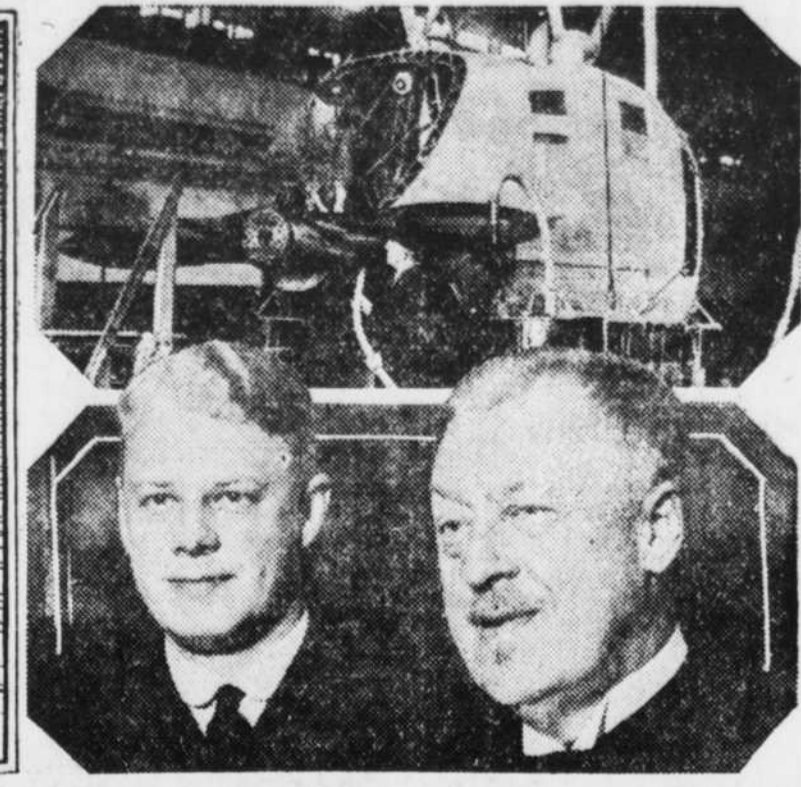
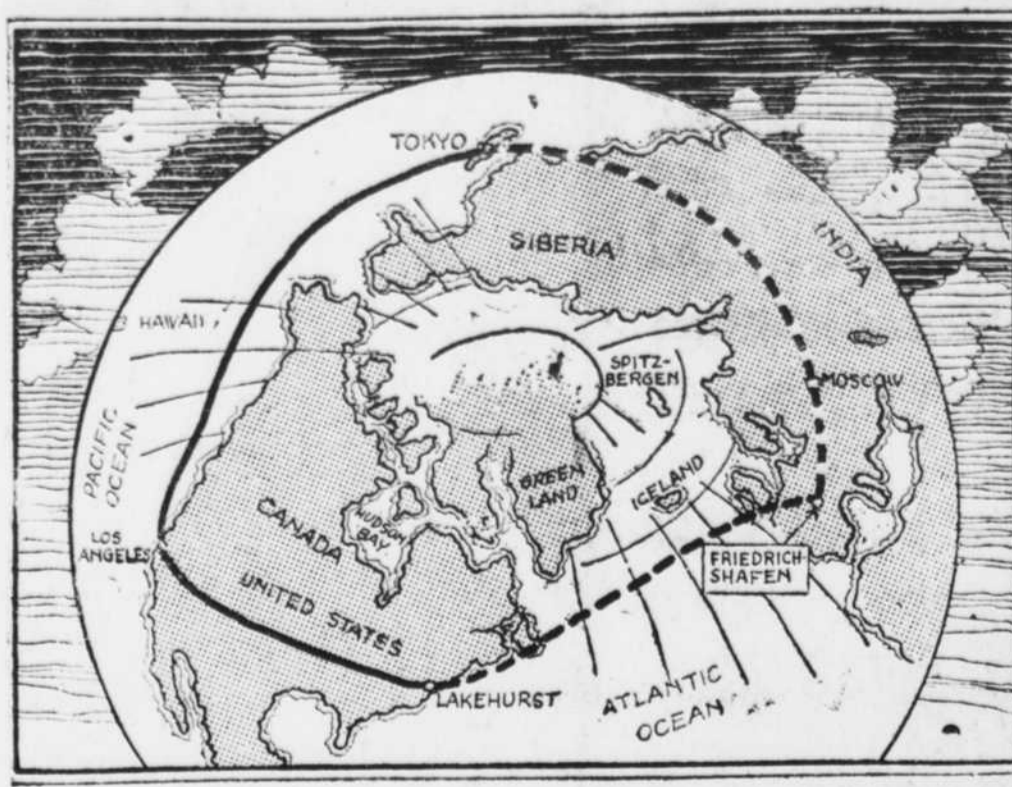
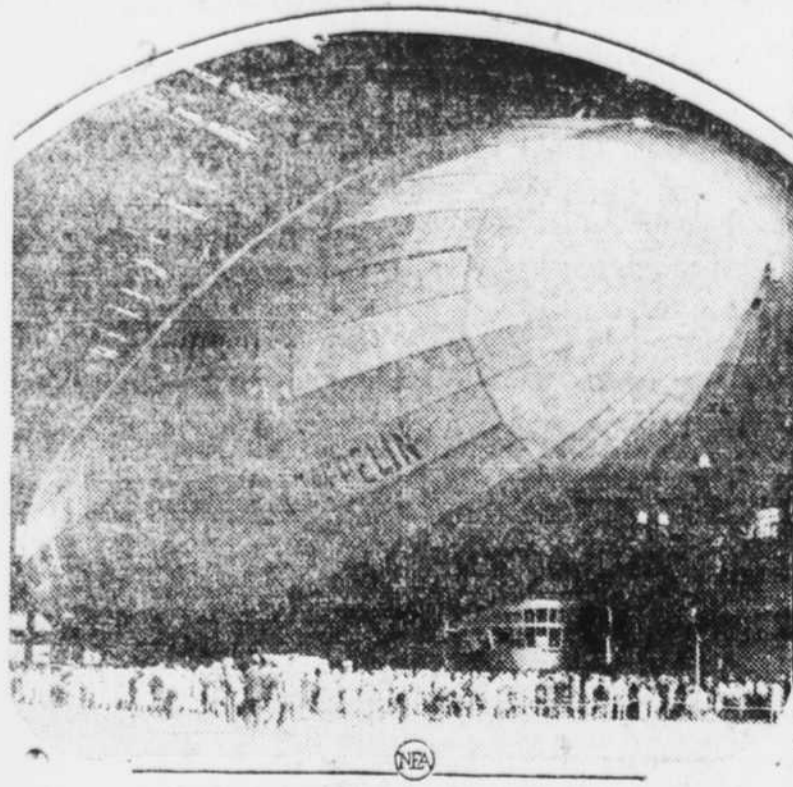


AROUND THE WORLD IN FOUR HOPS WITH THE MIGHTY GRAF ZEPPELIN

Red Cross Girl Slain With Knife

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 19.—(P)—Miss Egie M. Ashmun, executive secretary of the San Francisco chapter of the Red Cross, was slain this afternoon by a Mexican, David W. Licarraga, 34, as she left her offices. Licarraga has been arrested charged with the murder. The man, brandishing a long knife, attacked the woman and severed her jugular vein. She died en route to the hospital. Police learned Licarraga had been haunting the Red Cross offices asking about government aid.

The time made by the huge dirigible was far better than even Dr. Hugo Eckener, commander of the flight, had expected, for before setting out on the flight the commander had stated that he expected to make the trip in 120 hours if conditions favored.

The territory covered by the Graf never before had been traversed by a dirigible. Little was known of meteorological conditions along the route. Even the soviet savants could furnish but meagre information about weather conditions. Dr. Eckener virtually had to explore the whole route and map out his own lanes. In aviation circles here Dr. Eckener's feat was regarded as one of the outstanding bits of pioneering recorded in aviation history.

Wild Reception
The reception was the most wildly enthusiastic ever received by the Graf, long accustomed to enthusiastic receptions after history-making flights.

The landing field was crowded with thousands of persons and the areas outside the field were packed with many thousands of others. Some of the people had waited throughout the night and through the long hours of the day.

They were bivouacked, campfire, for a long distance around the field. They did not mind the rain which fell through the early hours of the morning. They were oblivious to everything except the news which was broadcast throughout the country that the Graf was over Japan.

New hundreds continued to arrive throughout the day and to swell the already huge crowd which was in the vicinity. The streets of the city also were filled and the squares were the gathering places for other thousands. The whole city was in a turmoil and the only conversation was about the great airship which was coming from the west.

Ellis Bound Over For Theft Trial

Senate Convenes For 3 Minutes

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—(P)—By a gentleman's agreement the senate convened and adjourned today in less than three minutes time, establishing a new record for brevity so far as recent history is concerned. The convening of the senate was a mere formality, as it was agreed not to transact any business until after September 4, to give the finance committee more time to complete work on the house tariff bill.

CHINA, RUSSIA RIFT GROWING

(Continued From Page One) confirmed reports that 10,000 Soviet soldiers were marching on Hailar, an important Manchurian town near the western boundary line. Other reports said the Russians were surrounding Manchuli.

MOSCOW, Aug. 19. (U.P.)—Another warning to China to cease attacks on Soviet soil by invasion of White Russians from Manchuria to Siberia was transmitted to Nanking today through the German embassy. A similar warning was sent to the Manchurian government on Sunday, it was revealed.

The note cited a long list of "invasions" and firing across the frontier as well as alleged attacks on Soviet gunboats. Both civilian and soldier casualties were listed.

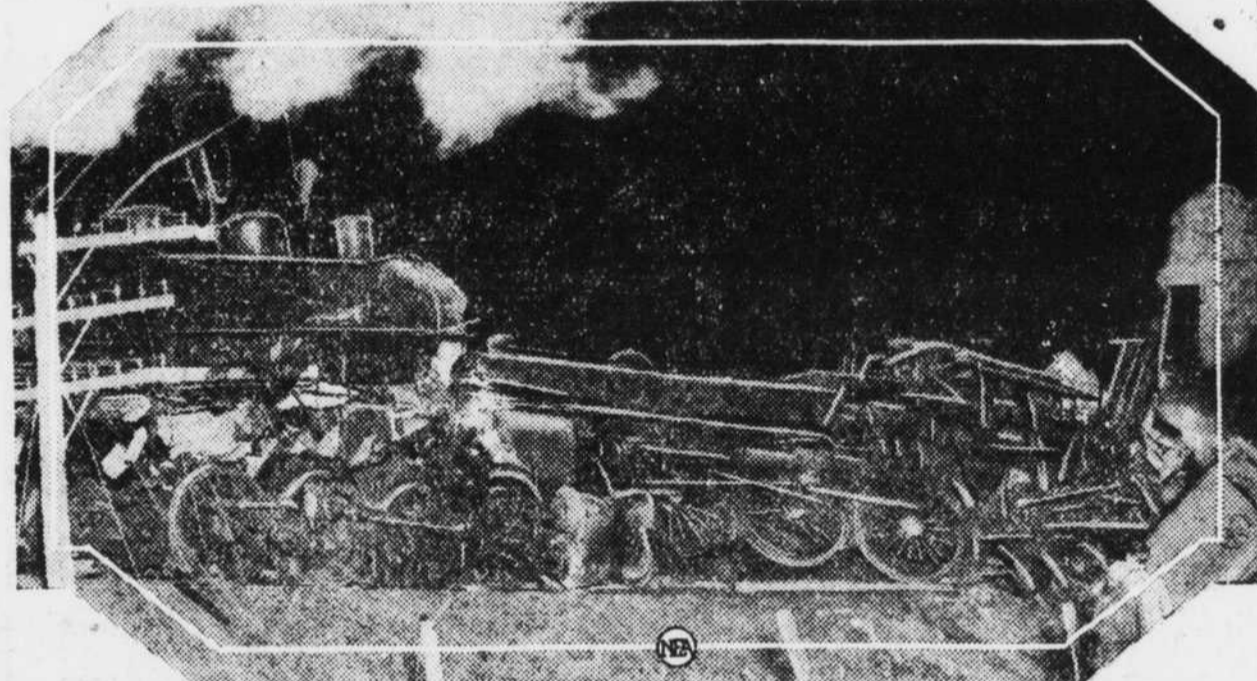
The foreign office said that Soviet soldiers had entered Chinese soil, but asserted the advances across the border were merely in pursuit of Chinese who had been invading Russian territory and then fled.

(Continued From Page One) dollars in the costs of the aqueduct by the various routes," said Mr. Imbertson, "but the upkeep and other factors may more than overbalance this. So that it's still a problem which route will be chosen. There will be less lift, if the route from the dam site is used which would lower the pumping cost. For the routes beginning further down the river there would be lower initial cost, because of the shorter length, but there would be a

greater pumping cost. And so it's a question of which will be more economical in the long run, and it will have to be figured out very carefully." **24 Men Near Dam Site**
The party encamped nearest the dam site has its camp seven miles above the river on the Las Vegas road, and comprises about 24 men, while there are 15 men at the camp near Nelson and 30 in Searchlight. The boys had plenty of excitement during the recent "cloud-burst" in these camps, having had great difficulty in keeping things dry and the tents habitable.
